

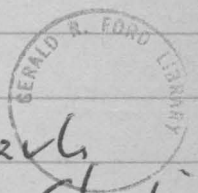

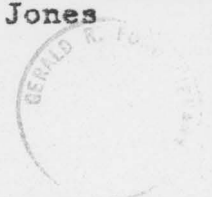

She is one of the people Cicely Tyson spent time with when Cicely Tyson was studying for her part in the "Autobiography of Jane Pittman".

Pearl Williams will be honored in conjunction with a celebration of the Foster Grandparent Program's 10th Anniversary. Also, May is National Senior Citizen's month.



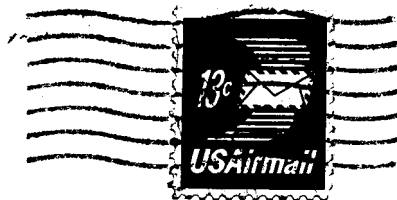

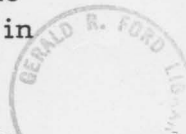

SAN DIEGO ZOO

The San Diego Zoo, now over 50 years old, maintains the world's largest collection of wild animals. Over 5,000 specimens of 1,400 species are currently on display.

Many of these are considered rare or vanishing species. They include the beautiful Okapi from deep in the Congo rain forest; Przewalski's Horse, the prototype of today's domesticated horse; the giant Galapagos Tortoise, Golden Marmosets, Pigmy Chimps, Proboscis Monkeys, Indian Rhinos, Golden-shouldered Parakeets, and many others. Whenever possible, animals are exhibited in settings closely approximating their natural habitats.

Last year more than 3 million persons visited the Zoo, maintaining its position as San Diego's leading tourist attraction. The original animal collection was gathered from a scattering of specimens left in Balboa Park at the close of the 1915-16 Panama-California International Exposition. The 100-acre Zoo has been in its present location in Balboa Park since 1922.

In May of 1972, the San Diego Wild Animal Park was opened to the public, 30 miles north of the downtown Zoo. A long-time dream of Zoo officials, the Park is an 1,800-acre preserve for 1,000 animals roaming in large herds in an environment closely approximating their native homelands.

ZOOLOGICAL SOCIETY HISTORY

The Zoological Society of San Diego was incorporated as a non-profit organization in 1916 by Harry M. Wegeforth, M.D., and several friends. While the Society's major purpose was to manage the zoological garden, it was also created to provide instruction, entertainment, scientific research, wild animal conservation and educational programs. The Society transfers to the City of San Diego ownership of all animals, equipment and property, but retains management of the Zoo and the Wild Animal Park.

Dr. Wegeforth served as president of the Society until his death in 1941. His work was carried on by Mrs. Belle J. Benchley, director from 1927 through 1953, and from that date until 1972 by Charles R. Schroeder, D.V.M. Donald J. Kintner, Sc.D., was named director upon Dr. Schroeder's retirement.

What Dr. Harry imagined in the early days was made a reality by the generosity of many philanthropists. A number of the Zoo's structures and outstanding animal exhibits were given by Miss

Ellen Browning Scripps and the Foundation bearing her name, established after her death in 1932. The Foundation has made grants-in-aid for researchers at the laboratory of the Zoo hospital and research activities continue to expand.

EDUCATION PROGRAM

Education is a major facet of Zoo activity. The Elmer Otto Education Center was completed in 1966. The educational program ranges from kindergarten through college levels, including Zoo orientation seminars for teachers. Discussion tours are designed to fit specific study or course needs and are arranged in advance by contacting the Education Department at the Zoo.

225,000 students from public, private and parochial schools are annually admitted free to enjoy a learning experience in the finest possible observational laboratory. A 72-passenger bus is used exclusively to transport an annual total of 25,000 second-grade students from San Diego City and County schools for guided Zoo lectures. Such school bus service has been carried out since 1926.

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All school classes coming to the Zoo that do not require a special study plan arranged by a Zoo teacher, book through the Group Sales Department.

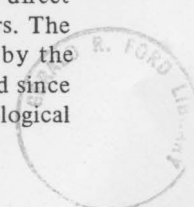

More than 30 million Americans said to be hungry, malnourished

By JONATHAN WOLMAN

Hard times have brought hunger and malnutrition to millions of Americans.

Government nutrition experts estimate that at least 30 million persons — 15 per cent of the U.S. population — are eating less than they should or are not getting the right kind of food. They say the problem is getting worse because government food programs aren't keeping pace with inflation and recession.

Interviews with nutrition-

early 1974. That's a jump of 41 per cent. One Ford administration official says wryly: "It is the nation's largest growth industry."

The government will spend \$9 billion this year to help feed people, but because assistance is entangled in red tape and because President Ford proposes to cut most food aid budgets, critics say the administration is trying to sabotage its own food programs.

The Department of Agriculture (USDA) estimates

The AP survey shows that many Americans are sacrificing protein to save money, and nutritionists say they fear the economic decline is reversing the six-year government war on malnutrition.

The problem is centered in industrial areas hit hard by layoffs, in "gray ghettos" where old people live, and in traditional poverty pockets in the South and the Northeast.

The victims are among the 23 million chronic poor — 11 per cent of all Americans who never seem to make a living

wage; senior citizens living on a fixed income; and the recently unemployed or working people unable to outearn inflation.

Inflation — 28.9 per cent in 1973 and 1974 — has driven the federal poverty level up, covering now a family of four with an annual income of \$5,040 (it was \$3,743 in 1969) and a person living alone on an income of \$2,360 (up from \$1,757).

Born in Lithuania, a premature baby, Ms. Wigmore was literally laid outside the door to die by her parents. Rescued by a grandmother, she was raised on seeds and grasses because of poverty, and she says she didn't know anything about the "good things" in life until she came to this country.

Over here she gorged on rich pastries and made herself sick.

That did it! She's been back to grains and grasses and sprouts ever since.

Starting with \$200, she's bought a \$200,000 structure in Boston, where she writes and promotes her health ideas.

"It's non-profit, non-sectarian," she says. She tries to combine the physical, mental and spiritual side of people,

with accent on the physical "because religions seem to stress the other two aspects."

Ms. Wigmore claims that young people on drugs have come to her and have been regenerated through the eating patterns she suggests. "The body can heal itself when the person eats properly."

Radish greens, buckwheat — all are part of her diet. She welcomes an occasional avocado, but reports that "I lived for seven months on 25 cents a day to prove it could be done". She also has recipes for "live" (unbaked bread) and other goodies. Eventually she

BUT IT MUST BE UNDERSTOOD THAT LOVE FOR THE UNIVERSAL CREATOR COMES FIRST AND FOREMOST, so that at no time will anyone lean upon anything LESS THAN DIVINE GUIDANCE WITHIN.

Tenet Number Seven

LEARN THE TRUE NATURE OF MAN'S SPIRITUAL MAKE-UP. There are Laws governing man's Love Nature which is representative of the Trinity of God within man's spiritual center. Man must learn BALANCED CONTROL which comes about by utilizing the knowledge that stems from the heart or soul experience of each manifested lifestream, so that DIVINE LOVE will be able to guide the SOUL QUALITIES INTO PERFECTION.

Tenet Number Eight

GAIN PROPER UNDERSTANDING OF POWER. Power of a nuclear invisible nature must now be understood, and WILL POWER of a human nature must be coordinated and properly controlled. 



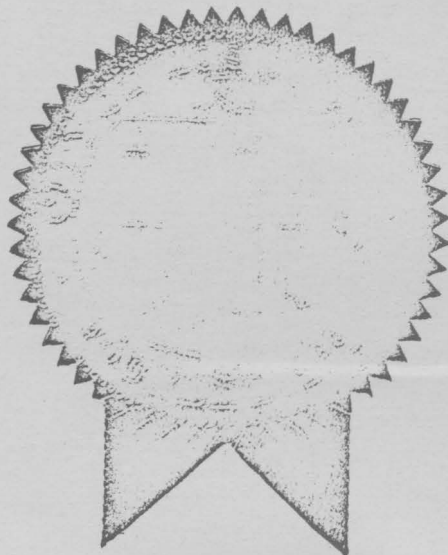
WHEREAS, it is the intent of some, to divide us by the credo of hate; it is our intent to Unite the American People by a Bridge of Love, and
