EVENTS OF PAST WEEK

Following allegations that Bo used his position as Secretary of the Army improperly, he asked to be temporarily relieved of his responsibilities. In keeping with FEC regulations, I have been appointed Vice Chairman with full operational responsibilities, although Bo retains his title and is legally responsible for PFC actions during this period.

GENERAL CAMPAIGN ORGANIZATION

Bill Russo and Martin Shinn have been moved from Florida to North Carolina, and B. Oglesby has been assigned to Wisconsin. Cliff Humphrey, who has been concentrating on Virginia, will work on Maryland this week and Don Fierce will begin on Tuesday to follow up in Kentucky.

STATE CAMPAIGN ORGANIZATIONS

ALASKA - Although the Anchorage precinct caucuses give Reagan the lead in delegate count going into District Convention in April, PFC Chairman Mike Colletta and Executive Director Jerry Abramcyzk are still optimistic (Nola thinks too much so) in predicting we will take all 19 delegates at the State Convention. They base the predictions on caucuses other than Anchorage, in particular Fairbanks, Juneau and Kenai.

Mike Colletta has spent the weekends flying to these outlying districts and believes our votes are there.

ARKANSAS - On March 12 a Press Conference was called for the purpose of announcing the filing of your candidacy. A delegation of farmers, headed by Romeo Short, had collected the \$2,500 filing fee and Short gave an exceptional off-the-cuff statement in support of your farm program. The Conference received excellent coverage. A mailing to 6,000 Republicans was also sent on Friday over Guy Newcombe's and Dorothy Webb's signatures. Tom Morgan has been hired as the Arkansas PFC Field Coordinator.

<u>INDIANA</u> - Don Cox filed on Friday the necessary papers to put you on the ballot. This included petitions signed by 500 registered voters in each Congressional District.

KENTUCKY - Following a nine-hour meeting in Lexington last Tuesday, Ed Terrill reports an encouraging start on the organization. Hal Rogers, an elected Commonwealth Attorney for Pulaski and Rockcastle, has accepted the Chairmanship, which will be officially announced March 18.

Mrs. Huda Jones, GOP Candidate for Secretary of State in 1975 and strongest vote-getter on the ticket, will serve as Chairman of Women's Activities. She is a big plus as she is Past President of the Women's Federation and currently Secretary of the State Central Committee. Hal, by the way, was the Campaign Manager, so the two of them bring us a good, statewide organization.

Ed Middleton, GOP National Committeeman, has been a great help and is way out in front for you. He personally stopped the State GOP intention to invite you and Reagan to their State Convention on April 24, as it was an attempt to embarrass you, knowing your chances of acceptance were slim. Instead, they have sent a general invitation to the Committee to send a representative, which we will do.

Congressman Carter supports you 100% but is keeping quiet until their March 31 filing deadline. It is rumored, confidentially, that Louie Nunn has threatened running a candidate against him if he endorses the President, so Tim Lee wants to play it quiet for now.

At present Rogers wants Thruston Morton, Tim Lee and Gene Snyder to be Honorary Chairmen, announced possibly in early April.

MISSOURI - Following a lengthy conversation with Ed Terrill, Governor Bond and PFC Chairman Gene McNary have held a series of meetings across the State developing the PFC organization. Bond had been a reluctant supporter due to some internal misunderstandings in the State but is fully on board now and working with McNary.

<u>NEBRASKA</u> - The filing deadline for delegates was March 12. However, since there is no fee and it's easy to get on the ballot, numerous people have filed with the Secretary of State. This list will be sent this week.

Charlie Keating has been hired as Field Coordinator and 50 of the 93 counties have been targeted as "key." Of these, 30 have strong County Chairmen. Bill Barrett has opened two offices - in Lincoln and Omaha.

NEW JERSEY - The State Legislature gave final approval to the seven at-large and four per Congressional District delegate selection process. Senator Case announced the seven at-large slate, which includes Senator Case, Congressmen Rinaldo and Fenwick, Charlie Landman, GOP Chairman Webb Todd, PFC Chairman Tommy Kean and Monmouth County GOP Chairman Ben Danskin. Ed Forsythe reportedly was upset with this arrangement, as he felt he was in charge of the at-large selections, which he had been prior to the legislative changes. However, he had been playing games, pushing for an uncommitted or 50/50 slate, which was not agreeable to us nor to the other members of the delegation. Ed will run as a District delegate.

OREGON - Nola held extensive meetings with Craig Berkman and Vic Atiyeh and signed off on a statewide campaign plan. Phone banks for Portland, Eugene, Salem and Medford will begin on April 15 with the capability of making 100,000 calls. All the Oregon press (with the possible exception of The Hebo News, circulation 200) are editorially supporting you. The May 24 primary is winner-take-all, and Nola predicts a 60/40 vote victory. Reagan organizers have indicated they will do little in the State.

CAMPAIGN '76

Radio spots for Illinois have been cut by Senator Percy, Congressmen Findley, McClory, Derwinski, Anderson and Michel, and by Dick Ogilvie. TV and radio spots are running at maximum levels in six media areas. Radio spots also were taped by Governor Holshouser and Congressman Jim Martin of North Carolina. A "Jobs" pamphlet has been completed and is attached at TAB A.

MISCELLANEOUS

YOUTH ACTIVITIES - By everyone's account, the press coverage of Son Jack's tour of Illinois was exceptional. The most interesting observation came from Donald Totten, Reagan's campaign manager in Illinois who said, "Even Jack (Ford) gets great press when he campaigns here."

The California Ford Youth campaign had its kick-off Saturday, March 13, with a dance for hundreds of high school students in Southern California. The California campaigners hope to recruit the students who attend the dance as volunteers for their June 8 primary effort.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES (Continued)

We now have a Wisconsin youth coordinator and field team working on organizing high school and college campuses in the State. The Reagan people have already mounted a youth campaign in Wisconsin and Reagan has made four campus appearances there.

Alabama's youth campaign is having its statewide organizational meeting on Sunday, March 14. Students throughout the State who are supporting you will be registered to vote in the May 4 primary. High schools and colleges will be organized to maximize the student vote.

Idaho, Pennsylvania and North Carolina have a majority of the colleges in their respective states organized for Ford.

RADIO ACTUALITIES

During this period, 30 individual actualities were prepared and fed to radio stations in Florida, North Carolina, Illinois, Texas and several regtional networks. A total of 408 telephone calls were made to stations with 239 actual feeds.





Unemployment Off Sharply in January as the Recovery From Recession Continues

New York Times front page headline, February 7, 1976

The steady rise in employment that began in mid-1975, and the simultaneous cooling of inflation, make the best economic news the American people have had in years.

They are also outstanding proof that President Ford's courageous, common sense approach to these two basic economic problems is paying off. The nation is well along on the road to recovery from the worst recession in 40 years.

Real Johs vs. Make-Work

Recovery is well along the road because of 2 distinction President Ford has insisted upol the distinction between real, well-paid jobs with a future, in business and industry, and the temporary, tax-supported make-work jobs that are a panic button often pushed by the big spenders in Congress.

In February, 1976, another public works bill to provide jobs at the taxpayers' expense was passed by Congress. President Ford referred to it as "an election year pork barrel." He vetoed the bill, and his veto was upheld. It would have cost as much as \$60 per taxpayer, \$25,000 per job.

The ruinous cost of massive government job programs has been contributor to a long series of Federal budget deficits and, in turn, to inflation. It all adds up to more taxes and more money out of your pocket.

President Ford knows this. And, as he pointed out in his State of the Union message, "Five out of six jobs in this country are in private business


How to Create Real Johs.

President Ford's tax proposals are specifically itended to provide incentives that will make it possible for business to add more jobs, steady

He asks that Congress enact changes in Federal tax laws that will speed up plant expansion and the purchase of new equipment. And, he wants concentration of this job-creating tax incentive in areas of the country where the unemployment rate still runs above 7 percent.

To increase jobs in the housing industry, President Ford asks for additional assistance that will spur construction for 500,000 families.

The President's overall economic policies have already resulted in lower interest rates and in making mortgage money more readily available. These, too, are powerful stimuli for more housing starts.
