STATE CAMPAIGN ORGANIZATIONS

ROCKY MOUNTAIN AND PACIFIC STATES - SPECIAL REPORT

Subsequent to the Illinois Primary, Skip Watts conducted a meeting in Denver of the Regional Coordinators from the Rocky Mountain, Southwest and Pacific States. Excluding California, the States under discussion amount to about 160 convention delegates.

At this meeting Skip reviewed the overall strategy for these States (Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Utah, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Washington, Oregon, Alaska and Hawaii). The strategy is designed to win as many of the precinct, county and state conventions as possible in addition to the primaries in those areas. The Texas strategy will be discussed this week when Skip travels to Austin.

It is our intention where feasible to bolster PFC organization to include volunteer professional field assistants for each coordinator in convention states, campaign managers for primary states, more storefront headquarters, state newsletters, advocate schedules, additional materials for distribution and, in some cases, phone operations. All of these additional activities are premised upon budgetary consideration, but no state will be written off to Reagan forces.

Following the Denver deliberations, Skip met with John Kerwitz of Illinois who was formerly associated with Young Republicans and the National Citizens for Reagan in 1968 and who also helped us in Illinois this year. John agreed to assist our Regional Coordinators in those Western States by providing expert convention manpower in those states.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN AND PACIFIC STATES - SPECIAL REPORT (Continued)

A further review of the Wyoming campaign was conducted by Skip in Casper with former Governor Hathaway, PFC Chairman Vince Horn and Regional Coordinator Bob Flanigan. Hathaway's greatest fear to date has been the election of a delegation committed to Reagan. However, the recent precinct caucuses and county conventions have resulted in a delegation of balanced commitments to the State Convention on May 8. It is currently believed that the Wyoming delegation to the National Convention will favor Reagan 11 to 6. If we play "hardball" in Wyoming we could reduce the margin to 9 to 8, but we would have to do so without the cooperation or support of Hathaway, who believes that your continuing victories in the primaries and elsewhere, plus the mounting delegate count on your behalf, will erode Reagan's favored position over time.

INDIANA

Starting date is April 12 for Indiana's phone bank operation. Plans are complete for installation of 85 telephones at eight phone banks, with 173,000 the number of calls to be made. Skip Watts and Jon Holt met with Don Cox, State Chairman, as well as the 11 Congressional District Coordinators. Out of 92 county chairmen to be appointed, 35 who represent the larger population counties are on board. Average Republican vote in Indiana primaries is a 400,000 turnout, and we have targeted 1,028 precincts which represent 328,000 of that number. The top counties contain 800 of the targeted precincts and the remaining targeted vote is contained in 27 other counties. Plans also call for direct mail activity to farmers and senior citizens as well as a general direct mailing to a computer list of 150,000 households.

IOWA

The new Co-Chairman in Iowa is Mrs. Stephen (Dawn) Roberts, who ran the Governor's Campaign in Polk County.

MICHIGAN

We now have PFC Chairmen in all 19 Congressional Districts. Precinct delegates pledged to you will file before March 26, and the showing will be excellent. There is no organized Reagan activity in the State. In Kent County some 250 delegates will file who are pledged to you, and only one is filing on behalf of Governor Reagan.

NEW MEXICO

The Vice President spoke at a Lincoln Day Dinner in Albuquerque and was well-received by the 1,000 guests. Prior to the dinner he met with 40 leaders of the PFC and did a great job in talking about the Campaign.

UTAH

Ellis Ivory, GOP National Committeeman who, until now, has been neutral, has written to Governor Reagan saying he is supporting you and will not be the Governor's State Chairman!

VIRGINIA

Cliff Humphrey's work in Virginia is paying off. Stan Parris is serving as State Coordinator but in fact is acting more in the role of co-chairman. Walter Craigie will serve on the State Advisory Committee and lend his name and support to the Virginia PFC organization, but he does not wish to be co-chairman. Stan, Cliff and Ed Terrill are on top of the job of putting together delegates to county and district conventions.

Congressmen Wampler, Daniel and Robinson are assisting in their districts. We hope to announce office openings in Virginia shortly. Mills Godwin has said we can use his name in all press announcements as working closely with the PFC in setting up the organization.

Kenny Klinge still heads up the Reagan organization, but support is waning and they must work hard to keep slippage at a minimum.

WISCONSIN

Campaign strategy is on track for phone banks, direct mail, newspaper and "Get Out the Vote" plans outlined in Report #32. The 17 phone centers kicked off officially on March 15 involving 100 telephones which will reach 250,000 households in targeted Republican areas throughout the state. Of the 24,480 calls made so far, 33.7% were for you - these calls are from registered voter lists which include Democrats.

TREASURER'S REPORT

This week we raised \$543,555, including \$220,277 in matching funds. The total now is in excess of \$6.5 Million, while total disbursements of \$6.1 Million have been made to date.

TREASURER'S REPORT (Continued)

Since the closing date of March 18, an additional \$430,000 is expected, including \$253,000 received Friday, March 19, and approximately \$167,000 before the deadline at Midnight on March 22. (TAB A)

FINANCE

Nearing the halfway mark for the National Quota, the 'Thermometer' now stands at 47.1%, with 11 states at 80% and over. (TAB B)

MISCELLANEOUS

Radio Actualities - During the past week 176 actual feeds were made as a result of 243 calls. Some 42 calls made were not fed because of non-availability of equipment or personnel, or because stations had material from other sources. In several instances regional and national networks were fed actualities of more significance.

Federal Election Commission regulations require separate reporting of funds raised by sale of tickets to each dinner, luncheon, rally or other fund-raising event. To assure compliance with this regulation, IT IS ABSOLUTELY ESSENTIAL THAT STATE CHAIRMEN ASSIGN SPECIFIC FOUR-DIGIT IDENTIFICATION NUMBERS TO EACH EVENT. The first two digits should be your State code number. Immediately advise Bob Moot, the National Treasurer, of the number assigned, the event to which it applies, the date of the event and the Chairman's name. The Treasurer's office telephone number is area code 202-457-6600.

F E C - MATCHING FUNDS AUTHORITY

After March 22, 1976, the Federal Election Commission will no longer have the authority to make certifications to the Secretary of the Treasury of entitlement to matching funds as a result of the Supreme Court's decision in Buckley v. Valeo, and the extension of the stay granted by the Supreme Court on February 27, 1976. If the Commission is restructured, which we expect sometime in the future, it will then be permitted to certify to the Secretary of Treasury the entitlement of matching funds. As soon as this restructuring takes place we will inform you.

1. The list of names, with or without phone numbers, but in all cases with addresses.
2. A copy of the letter that was sent to each list.
3. The expected average contribution per name. (Whether or not the names are \$1,000 or \$100 potentials).
4. Any additional information that you might deem appropriate, or additional instructions. We will call in the name of the person who signed the solicitation letter.
