WEEK ENDING MAY 22, 1976

State Campaign Organizations

South The President's support in the upcoming primaries (Kentucky, Tennessee, Arkansas) was buoyed by the Michigan/Maryland victories and Reagan's statements on TVA. Kentucky PFC Chairman Hal Rodgers has adequately pinpointed the key districts for get-out-the-vote operations. Tennessee PFC is working very hard to capitalize on last week's developments. Despite Party leadership support, the Arkansas electorate with Wallace cross-over is not encouraging. Virginia mass meetings demonstrate strong Reagan support, especially in the 10th district. National Committeeman Stanhagen, State Chairman McMath are working for the Reagan forces. Joel Broyhill is of little help.

Northeast On Saturday, Pennsylvania released 88 delegates for Ford with 8 leaning. New York scheduled to announce on Monday. Vermont convention elected all Ford delegate slate (18). Rhode Island prospects encouraging with Mayor Cianci way out front and rallying his supporters. New Jersey program well in place with support of County Chairmen critical to President receiving all the delegates. Massachusetts delegate slate chosen. Connecticut State Chairman Fred Biebel continues to remain neutral but groundwork being laid for successful convention.

Midwest Ohio campaign apparatus in place with emphasis on grass roots support for the delegates through 75 phone bank telephones and a newsletter to 30,000 Republicans. Rogers Morton and Governor Rhodes met with the delegates/alternates and 19 key county chairmen on Wednesday. The Governor and state party apparatus continue their strong support. Indiana finalizing delegate slate with Don Cox and Governor Bowen in disagreement. In Illinois, Dick Ogilvie playing hard ball

concerning 5 at-large delegates to convention. Missouri strategy is to go after all 19 at-large delegates at the convention with Governor Bond leading the delegation to Kansas City. The vote will be close. Problem areas include Gene Taylor's 7th district where Reagan won 155 to 35 in the caucus and Fred Whaley's 3rd district (St. Louis) where Whaley is playing games. At present, Ford-17 national delegates, Reagan-12 delegates. Whaley-undecided.

Great Plains Kansas convention results were Ford-30, Reagan-4. Senator Dole played a key role for the President. Oklahoma was a total loss, but Paula Unruh remained most cooperative. Minnesota continues its district caucuses with the President taking a commanding lead. South Dakota appears evenly split. Two field men were sent in to assist. Iowa's prospects are promising with an independent poll of delegates showing 48%-Ford, 29%-Reagan, 23%-Undecided.

Mountain Colorado PFC reports three major and nine minor county conventions took place with Ford receiving a slight lead on committed delegates. The undecideds will make the difference. PFC operatives were assigned to all the conventions with a mailing sent to all the delegates. Idaho PFC was frustrated by cancellation of media budget and Presidential visit, but vote differential as a result would have been minimal. In Montana, PFC executive committee similar to Michigan's is being formed. Recent delegate poll in Utah shows Ford trailing Reagan 35% to 40% with 25% undecided. Utah PFC hopeful that Presidential visit, letter, and constant delegate contact can reach the approximate 600 undecided delegates.

Southwest All PFC operations shut down or cutting back substantially (i.e., New Mexico). No information on Nevada due to upcoming primary.

California PFC focusing on Presidential visit and advocate program for early June.

Northwest Alaska convention held with Ford winning 18 out of 19 delegates. No further activity in Washington. Oregon plans finalized for get-out-the-vote operation.

Administration

As political and financial workload decreases, the PFC headquarters staff has been continuously consolidated in order to emphasize delegate monitoring program.

Advocates

Administration officials organized and programmed by congressional district for visits to California, Ohio, New Jersey (see attachment).

Convention

PFC Washington convention staff met with office personnel in Kansas City to finalize procedures for operation there.

Delegate Monitoring

Staff has perfected procedures for obtaining delegate information with a letter going out from the Chairman asking for pertinent biographical information. They met with various individuals concerning convention strategy and made contact with various state delegations.

Finance

As of May 24th, thirteen states had surpassed their established fund-raising goal. 73% of the national goal has been attained.

Legal

Counsels provided background for challenging delegate slates in Virginia, Arizona, Ohio and Missouri. Established liaison with RNC to review all contests and challenges between 1948 and 1972.

Press

Normal press relations conducted, Radio service activity was the most productive since its inception; 48 individual actualities were fed to 1,168 stations in 10 states.

Research

The Research Division has completed updates and added new issue areas to the '76 FACTBOOK. Materials are being held in abeyance until funds are available for printing and national distribution. Limited copies are being made available to selective campaign spokesmen. The PFC portion of the national survey commissioned by the National Committee has been finalized. In terms of ongoing activities, the President's trip briefing materials, Reagan research, and issue support to the remaining six primary states continues.

Special Voter Groups

Youth Director is finalizing program proposal for convention activity. Ethnic activity centered around RNC Heritage Groups Convention which was very supportive. Any Reagan support appeared headed off by excellent Administration representation (Kobelinski, Kuropas, Morton).

Treasurer

A total of \$272,434.17 was received in contributions this past week, bringing to \$9,795,699.51 the amount of money received to date. There is currently a balance of \$183,858.62 on hand. A full Treasurer's Report is attached at TAB B.
