## State Campaign Organization

Alabama A very successful dinner was held in Gadsen at which Senator Griffin spoke on your behalf. Senator Griffin stayed overnight so that he could attend the next day a state workshop which explained responsibilities to delegates and alternates. Ed Terrill attended this conference to conduct the workshops.

County Chairmen and volunteers are busy gathering names and addresses in preparation for a telephone campaign and a direct mail effort.

The Reagan organization has announced plans for Mr. Reagan to visit the state on April 15-16, and has a scheduled appearance in Montgomery on the 15th.

Alaska Our Northwest Regional Coordinator was in the state for a week attending District Conventions and meeting with PFC personnel, delegate candidates, and party leaders. Her current estimate is that we will have a majority of delegates, although there is some inclination that Alaska will not endorse either candidate unless there is an overwhelming majority.

The Reagan organization's strength is centered in Anchorage area.

There is considerable sentiment against any form of gun control and against Secretary Kissinger.

Arizona Mr. Morton visited Phoenix during his southwestern trip to meet with our state leadership here on April 4th.

It is estimated that Mr. Reagan currently has more than 60% of the state delegates going to the state convention. However, 12 of the 29 delegates, who will go to the National Convention, will be selected in Congressional Districts. We hope to pick up at least eight delegates in this process.

We are also trying to develop a third state of uncommitted delegates to dilute their effort. A concerted effort by the State Congressional delegation appealing for a balanced ticket to the Convention in the interest of party unity would be of great assistance.

### Arkansas

We have continued collecting mailing lists here and now have more than 8,500 names in preparation for a mass mailing. The grain embargo continues to be a sensitive and negative issue here. In addition, support from Congressman John Paul Hamerschmidt, who is currently unopposed, would help our effort here a great deal.

The Reagan organization still has no visible signs of activity.

California There are now 38 counties with chairmen. In addition, there are 37 county steering committees, with 460 total people involved. Volunteer recruitment to date consists of 57,000 letters sent to volunteer lists, and an additional 10,000 pieces mailed through special committees. There have been 34 home receptions as well, and headquarters have opened in San Diego, Orange, Palo Alto, and Sacramento. A youth program has been initiated and it will focus on working volunteers into our state phone campaign. There are leaders for all of our 21 phone banks throughout the state, and meetings to organize the phone program will be held on April 13th in Los Angeles and April 14th in San Francisco.

Idaho Plans for the final sixty days of the campaign have been established. This past week the state's direct mail list was compiled, and a state newsletter and general mailing will be sent on April 19th. The 100 target precincts in the state are all in 9 counties, whose chairmen have begun organizing for precinct walks which will begin this coming week.

Mr. Reagan's scheduled trip to Idaho was cancelled due to lack of funds.

Indiana There are 20 storefront headquarters that have opened throughout the state. In addition, 102 phones have been installed and computer lists with 268,000 voter names have been distributed. There will be a twenty day effort for voter identification and a get-out-the-vote effort on primary day.

Elliot Richardson was well received at an April 8th fund raiser in Fort Wayne, and other advocate events are being planned.

New Mexico Current estimates are that we should take between 17 and 19 of this state's delegates to the National Convention. It is anticipated that the Reagan organization will begin to organize in the precinct meetings, as they have not been active to date. These meetings will begin April 26th.

Ohio As a result of Mr. Reagan's failure to qualify in 9 of the state's 23 Congressional Districts, we have been able to concentrate on those 14 Districts where there is a race. The State GOP Central Committee has also decided to enter just the candidate's name on the ballot rather than the delegate's name, which makes the system a winner take all by district.

A meeting was held this week between representatives of the PFC National staff and the Ohio PFC staff to discuss delegate selection and campaign visibility.

Pennsylvania Secretary Coleman spoke at an April 7th reception to kick-off the campaign. The attendance and press coverage were excellent. The support for Mr. Reagan, which had been strong in the 6th District, has begun to waver due to Reagan's decision not to run in the primary. They have also been some indications that Congressman Bud Schuster may be coming aboard.

#### South Carolina

The District Conventions were held this week, and Governor Edwards remains firmly committed to carrying all 36 delegates and 36 alternates for Mr. Reagan. John Bourne attended these conventions in an effort to gain some strength by suggesting each district elect one Ford delegate, one Reagan delegate, and one uncommitted. To date, only the First District agreed to this idea. Further appeals by mail have been sent to all delegates elected to the State Convention.

Texas Our organization here continues to be strong, with an emphasis on the delegates' efforts on their own behalf, and a campaign to educate voters to vote all four times in the delegate selection process.

Mr. Morton was in the state to meet with PFC leadership and businessmen to discuss the campaign, and his trip here was well received and attended, with stops made in Ft. Worth, Midland and Houston.

Stu Spencer and Skip Watts visited Texas last week to review the campaign plan and outline the major goals for the final three weeks of the campaign. A number of PFC national specialists have been sent to Texas to supervise various projects, including the phone banks, delegate candidates races, Young Texans and special group appeals to those who may vote in the GOP primary (Mexican-Americans, Senior Citizens, Democrats).

Your visit to Texas was a major success. The media in the state was quite good; our volunteer programs are expected to benefit also.

Stu and Skip made presentations to staff and delegate candidates on techniques for running their campaigns as congressional races, with steering committees, scheduling and publicity, and recruitment of volunteers for the "Four For Ford" district races.

The Advocate Program has been established and a dynamic Young Texas program has produced many youthful volunteers to date. Jack Ford's schedule will be very helpful in this respect.

As you know, Texas is not a true primary but it is our assessment we can approach winning a majority of the Congressional District delegates by going after new voters and sympathetic Democrats.

Utah Our organization, with most of our County Chairmen on board, has more depth than the Reagan group, and current estimates are that we have a 60-40 edge in delegate strength.

Mr. Reagan spoke in Salt Lake City where he was well received by a crowd of approximately 600 people. He stated that dismissing Secretary Kissinger would be his first act as President.

Vermont Fred Smith's appointment as State PFC Chairman received state-wide news coverage. An executive committee is now being assembled which will include Senator Stafford and Congressman Jeffords. Smith plans to have named County and major Town Chairmen within the next two weeks.

Wyoming An April 9th Reagan luncheon scheduled for Casper has been sold out. Mr. Reagan was also scheduled to speak at the University of Wyoming.

### Treasurer's Report

A total of \$213,569.02 was received this past week, bringing contributions to date to \$7,937,602.22. The total funds balance as of April 8th was \$551,207.12. A copy of the Treasurer's Report is attached at TAB A.

### Finance Committee

A total of 10 states have now exceeded their individual quotas, and 58.1% of the national quota has been achieved.

The Finance Committee is beginning the distribution of label emblems recognizing donors of \$100 to \$999 and those who have given \$1,000.

The first category consist of over 8,000 individuals who have given \$100 to \$999. These donors are considered members of the "President Ford '76 Silver Club. A sample lapel pin is attached.

The second category consists of donors of \$1,000, who now number over 2,300. Individuals who have contributed \$1,000 to the campaign are enrolled as members of the "President Ford '76 Gold Club" receive a lapel pin identical in design to the pin attached but executed in gold. Attachment TAB B

## Press

In the last week 23 individual actualities were prepared and fed to radio stations in Wisconsin and Texas and to several regional networks.

Individuals fed through the system include: President Ford, Rogers Morton, Senator Tower, and Stu Spencer.

There were 98 feeds sent to Wisconsin and 166 to Texas.

The percentage of stations taking the feeds for the week was 94%

This week we set up an additional feeding capability in PFC Headquarters in Austin, Texas and provided the PFC with 95 additional stations to cover, thereby covering virtually every station in the state of Texas.

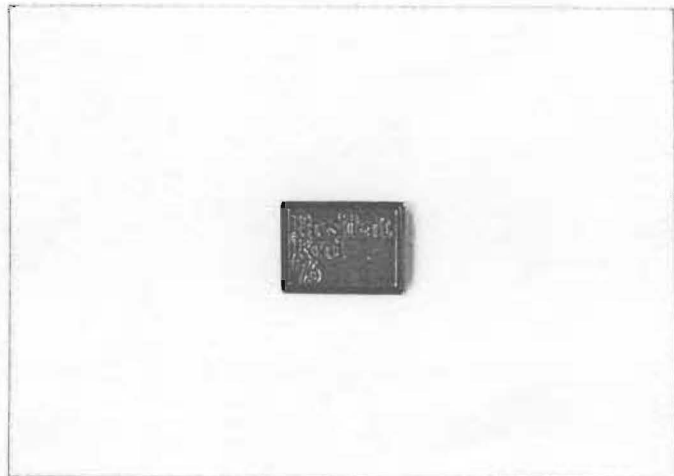
