This responds to your request for the views of this Department on the enrolled joint resolution, S.J. Res. 66, "To authorize the erection of a monument to the dead of the First Infantry Division, United States Forces in Vietnam."

We recommend that the joint resolution be approved by the President.

S.J. Res. 66 would authorize the Society of the First Infantry Division-First Division Memorial Committee to erect, at no cost to the United States or the District of Columbia, a monument to the dead of the First Infantry Division, United States Forces in Vietnam on public grounds in the District that have been already set aside for memorial purposes of the First Infantry Division. The design of the monument would be subject to approval of the Secretary of the Interior, the National Commission of Fine Arts, and the National Capital Planning Commission. The monument is to be maintained by the Secretary of the Interior under the provisions of the Acts of August 25, 1916, and August 21, 1935.

The Secretary of the Interior has approved the establishment of the National Capital Memorial Advisory Committee in order to coordinate designation of memorials in the Nation's Capital. The Committee's charter calls for it to establish criteria for the memorialization of people and events on Federal lands within the Nation's Capital and to examine each memorial proposal for adequacy and appropriateness.

On December 10, 1973, the Committee recommended favorably on S.J. Res. 66, inasmuch as the memorial proposed therein would be errected adjacent to the existing First Division Memorials, located south of State Place and east of 17th Street, N.W., on land already set aside for memorial purposes, at no cost to the Federal Government.

The Committee on House Administration, to whom was referred the joint resolution (S. J. Res. 66), having considered the same, report favorably thereon without amendment and recommend that the joint resolution do pass.

By unanimous consent the Committee adopted a motion to report

Senate Joint Resolution 66.

Senate Joint Resolution 66 would authorize the Society of the First Infantry Division—First Division Memorial Committee to erect a monument to those members of the Division who lost their lives in the Vietnam conflict. The monument would be located on federal land in the District of Columbia adjacent to the existing First Division World War I and World War II monuments. (The Division did not participate in the Korean conflict.)

The United States would incur no expense with respect to the erection of the monument. As is customary for monuments on federal land, the Secretary of the Interior would be responsible for the maintenance and care of the monument in question, once erected. The design and plans for this monument would be subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Interior, the National Commission of Fine Arts, and the

National Capital Planning Commission.

Subsequent to the Senate's approval of the joint resolution, the Committee on House Administration requested departmental reports on the legislation from the District of Columbia, the National Commission of Fine Arts, the National Capital Planning Commission, and the Department of the Interior. All have indicated that there is no objection to this measure. The Department of the Interior's Capital Memorial Advisory Committee, newly created to ascertain the desirability of proposed placements of monuments on federal land, has thoroughly scrutinized this legislation and has recommended favorably thereon.

SEC. 2. The design and plans for such monument shall be subject to the approval of the Secretary of the Interior, the National Commission of Fine Arts, and the National Capital Planning Commission.

SEC. 3. The Secretary of the Interior shall be responsible for the maintenance and care of any such monument, in accordance with the provisions of the Act entitled "An Act to establish a National Park Service, and for other purposes", approved August 25, 1916, and the Act entitled "An Act to provide for the preservation of historic American sites, buildings, objects, and antiquities of national significance, and for other purposes", approved August 21, 1935.
