The Committee on Armed Services, to whom was referred the bill (H.R. 11144) to amend title 10, United States Code, to enable the Naval Sea Cadet Corps to obtain, to the same extent as the Boy Scouts of America, obsolete and surplus naval material, having considered the same, report favorably thereon with amendments and recommend that the bill as amended do pass.

The amendments are as follows:

Strike all after the enacting clause and substitute the following new language:

That (a) section 7541 of title 10, United States Code, is amended—

(1) in the first sentence, by inserting immediately before the period at the end thereof the following: ', to the Naval Sea Cadet Corps for the sea cadets, and to the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League for the young marines'; and

(2) by striking out the second sentence and inserting in lieu thereof the following: 'The cost of transportation and delivery of material given or sold under this section shall be charged to the Boy Scouts of America, to the Naval Sea Cadets, or to the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League, as the case may be.

(b) The catchline and the chapter analysis item for section 7541 are amended by inserting immediately after 'Boy Scouts of America' the following: "Naval Sea Cadet Corps, and Young Marines of the Marine Corps League."

Sec. 2. The amendments made by the first section shall take effect on the date of the enactment of this Act.

Amend the title so as to read:

"To amend title 10, United States Code, to enable the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League to obtain, to the same extent as the Boy Scouts of America, obsolete and surplus naval material.

#### EXPLANATION OF THE AMENDMENTS

The amendment, which is in the nature of a substitute, would amend Section 7541 of Title 10, United States Code, which authorizes the Secretary of the Navy to (1) give obsolete material not needed for naval purposes and (2) sell other material that may be spared to the Boy Scouts of America for the sea scouts. The bill, as introduced, would extend this same authority to the Naval Sea Cadet Corps. By the amendment we would also include the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League.

The title of the bill is amended to reflect the fact that the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League are also included in this bill.

#### PURPOSE OF THE BILL

Section 7541 of title 10, United States Code, authorizes the Secretary of the Navy to (1) give obsolete material not needed for naval purposes and (2) sell other material that may be spared to the Boy Scouts of America for the sea scouts. H.R. 11144 would amend this section by adding the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League as eligible recipients of the benefits of the section.

#### EXPLANATION OF THE BILL

At the present time the Boy Scouts of America have, under the authority granted by Section 7541 of Title 10, United States Code, the authority, as determined by the Secretary of the Navy, to receive obsolete material not needed for naval purposes and to buy other materials that may be spared.

This bill would give the Secretary of the Navy the authority to give such obsolete material not needed for naval purposes and to sell other materials that may be spared to the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and to the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League to the same extent as the Boy Scouts of America. As authorized by Section 203(j)(2) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended (40 U.S.C. 484(j)(2)), the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League, as well as the Boy Scouts of America, have been designated as educational activities of special interest to the Armed Services and are therefore eligible to receive donations of surplus property.

This would place the three organizations on an equal par in receiving and being able to purchase this property. Whenever such property is provided, the cost of transportation and delivery would be charged to the organization receiving such property.

#### FISCAL DATA

Enactment of the proposed legislation will have no effect upon the budgetary requirements of the Department of Defense.

#### COMMITTEE POSITION

The Committee on Armed Services, on June 20, 1974, a quorum being present, unanimously agreed to report H.R. 11144, as amended, to the House and strongly recommends its enactment.

Section 7541 of title 10, United States Code authorizes the Secretary of the Navy to (1) give obsolete material not needed for naval purposes and (2) sell other material that may be spared, to the Boy Scouts of America for the sea scouts. H.R. 11144 would amend this section by adding the Naval Sea Cadet Corps as eligible recipients of the benefits of the section.

The Naval Sea Cadet Corps is presently authorized to purchase any item of enlisted naval uniform clothing that may be spared under the provisions of 10 U.S.C. 7541a. By including the Naval Sea Cadet Corps in 10 U.S.C. 7541, the Corps will be permitted to purchase, in addition, "other materials" that may be spared as well as receive donations of obsolete material. As authorized by section 203(j) (2) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended (40 U.S.C. 484(j)(2)) the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League as well as the Boy Scouts of America have been designated as educational activities of special interest to the Armed Services and are therefore eligible to receive donations of surplus property." However, the Department of the Navy, on behalf of the Department of Defense, certainly has no objection to the addition of the Naval Sea Cadet Corps to 10 U.S.C. 7541.

The Young Marines of the Marine Corps League should also be authorized to receive obsolete materials and to purchase material to the same extent as the sea scouts and the Naval Sea Cadet Corps. It is therefore recommended that the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League be included in H.R. 11144 together with the Naval Sea Cadet Corps.

This report has been coordinated within the Department of Defense in accordance with procedures prescribed by the Secretary of Defense.

The Office of Management and Budget advises that, from the standpoint of the Administration's program, there is no objection to the presentation of this report on H.R. 11144 for the consideration of the Committee.

The Committee on Armed Services, to whom was referred the bill (H.R. 11144) to amend title 10, United States Code, to enable the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League to obtain, to the same extent as the Boy Scouts of America, obsolete and surplus naval material, having considered the same, reports favorably thereon without amendment and recommends that the bill do pass.

PURPOSE OF THE BILL

This bill would amend section 7541 of title 10, United States Code to permit the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League to receive obsolete material not needed for naval purposes and to buy other naval material that may be spared at a price representing its fair value. Such material is already available to the Boy Scouts of America. In all cases, the cost of transportation and delivery of such material would be charged to the recipient

organization.

At present, under the authority of section 484(j) (2) of title 40, United States Code, the Naval Sea Cadets, the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League and the Boy Scouts of America have been designated as ". . . educational activities which are of special interest to the armed services. . .". As such, they are all eligible to receive surplus material from the Department of Defense. This bill would simply bring the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League under the authority for the donation of obsolete naval material and the sale of naval material which can be spared (section 7541 of title 10, United States Code).

THE NAVAL SEA CADET CORPS AND THE YOUNG MARINES OF THE MARINE CORPS LEAGUE

The Naval Sea Cadet Corps is a federally chartered, nonprofit, educational and training organization for youths 14 to 18 years of age. It is sponsored by the Navy League of the United States. Financial support for the organization comes from the Navy League, private contributions, and a small enrollment fee paid by each cadet. Nonmonetary support, in the form of excess training materials, use of facilities on a not-to-interfere basis, surplus uniforms, et cetera, is provided by the Navy and to a lesser extent by the Coast Guard. All adults involved in the program are unpaid volunteers except for a small paid staff—normally five persons—at the Naval Sea Cadet Corps headquarters. There are over 150 Naval Sea Cadet units, representing approximately 5500 Sea Cadets across the United States.

The Young Marines of the Marine Corps League is made up of about 5,000 youths between the ages of 8 and 17. Whereas the Sea Cadets is a separately chartered institution, the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League is a subsidiary of the Marine Corps League, which is a nationally chartered institution, and therein lies some differences in administrations and the interface between the services and the organization themselves. However, the general purpose of the programs and the way they are administered at the local level are very similar.

#### FISCAL DATA

Enactment of the proposed legislation will have no effect upon the budgetary requirements of the Department of Defense.

#### DEPARTMENTAL POSITION

The Department of the Navy, on behalf of the Department of Defense, as well as the Navy League of the United States favor the enactment of this legislation, as is shown by the following letters which are hereby made a part of this report.

As authorized by section 203(j) (2) of the Federal Property and Administrative Services Act of 1949, as amended (40 U.S.C. 484(j)(2)), the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League as well as the Boy Scouts of America have been designated as educational activities of special interest to the Armed Services and are therefore eligible to receive donations of surplus property However, the Department of the Navy, on behalf of the Department of Defense, certainly has no objection to the addition of the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines to 10 U.S.C. 7541.

## An Act

To amend title 10, United States Code, to enable the Naval Sea Cadet Corps and the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League to obtain, to the same extent as the Boy Scouts of America, obsolete and surplus naval material.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That (a) section 7541 of title 10, United States Code, is americal.

(1) in the first sentence, by inserting immediately before the period at the end thereof the following: ", to the Naval Sea Cadet Corps for the sea cadets, and to the Young Marines of the Marine Corps League for the young marines"; and
(2) by striking out the second sentence and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "The cost of transportation and delivery of material given or sold under this section shall be charged to the Boy Scouts of America to the Naval Sea Cadets, or to the Young

Boy Scouts of America, to the Naval Sea Cadets, or to the Young

Marines of the Marine Corps League, as the case may be.".

(b) The catchline and the chapter analysis item for section 7541 are amended by inserting immediately after "Boy Scouts of America" the following: "Naval Sea Cadet Corps and Young Marines of the Marine Corps League."

Sec. 2. The amendments made by the first section shall take effect on the date of the enactment of this Act.
