This responds to your request for our views on the enrolled bill H.R. 4269, "To amend the Organic Act of Guam and the Revised Organic Act of the Virgin Islands."

We have no objection to Presidential approval of the enrolled bill.

Section 1 of H.R. 4269 would amend the Organic Act of Guam (48 U.S.C. 1421 et. seq.) to provide that, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the clerk hire allowance and reimbursable transportation expenses allowed Members of the U.S. House of Representatives under Federal law shall be extended to the Delegate from Guam to the U.S. House of Representatives.

Section 2 of the enrolled bill would amend the Revised Organic Act of the Virgin Islands (48 U.S.C. 1541 et. seq.) to extend this same allowance to the Delegate from the Virgin Islands to the U.S. House of Representatives.

In the Department's legislative proposal to the 92nd Congress which created these Delegate positions, we sought no distinctions between Delegates and Members with regard to allowances and reimbursements.

In practice, the limited clerk hire allowance has proved inadequate for a variety of reasons, including the fact that because of their isolated and insular locations, the governments of Guam and the Virgin Islands rely more heavily on the offices of their Congressional representatives in their Federal relationships than do state and local governments on the mainland. Additionally, since neither Guam nor the Virgin Islands has representation in the United States Senate, the Delegates' staffs must review legislation as it proceeds in the Senate as well as in the House of Representatives. In addition to the routine Congressional functions, the workload in the offices of the island Delegates must include specialized monitoring of complex legislation in alien affairs, taxation, maritime matters, trade, and, in the case of Guam, military installation policy and planning.

The representation envisioned by the Congress with the creation of the Delegate positions has been impeded also by the existing restriction on travel allowances. In order that the residents of Guam and the Virgin Islands become familiar with the functioning of their recently acquired democratic representation, there is a need for frequent meetings with constituents that at least equals the needs in the Congressional districts that have had a traditional voice in Federal affairs for

COMMITTEE AMENDMENTS

Two technical amendments are recommended by the Committee. Both correct typographical errors in the bill.

Cost

Full Clerk hire and travel allowance for the two Delegates would be provided at nominal additional cost to the Government: \$73,047 clerk hire for each Delegate per annum; \$23,800 annual travel for the Guam Delegate; and \$4,844 annual travel for the Virgin Islands Delegate.

INFLATIONARY IMPACT

The Committee staff estimates the bill would have no inflationary impact.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORT

Since H.R. 4269 involves internal matters in the Congress, it was unnecessary to secure departmental reports on the legislation.
