



# Discussion

Legislation to temporarily suspend the duties on certain dyeing and tanning materials was first enacted in 1957. This duty-free treatment has been extended, with various changes and additions, on a number of occasions, the most recent extension having expired on September 30, 1975. The enrolled bill would simply extend for approximately 3 years, until June 30, 1978, the recently expired duty suspension. The suspension would apply to articles entered after September 30, 1975. Duties would be suspended on imports from countries accorded most favored nation status as well as from countries without such status.

The dyeing and tanning materials covered under H.R. 7715 consist of extracts used primarily to convert rawhides into leather and to thin fluids used in rotary drilling operations. Most of these extracts are not produced domestically, and the limited U.S. production is insufficient to meet demand. Continued suspension of the applicable duties will benefit the domestic leather and oil-drilling industries who depend upon imports for virtually all of their supplies.

In reply to your request of September 29, the following report is submitted on the enrolled enactment of H.R. 7715 an act "To extend until the close of June 30, 1978, the period during which certain dyeing and tanning materials may be imported free of duty."

The Department recommends that the President approve the act.

The act extends the current duty free status of certain materials necessary for the tanning and treatment of leather from September 30, 1975 until June 30, 1978.

The materials covered in tariff item 907.80 are necessary for the leather industry. They do not compete with or displace domestic producers of the products. 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# EXTENSION OF EXISTING DUTY ON CERTAIN DYEING AND TANNING MATERIALS

# REPORT

#### [To accompany H.R. 7715]

The Committee on Finance to which was referred the bill (H.R. 7715) to extend until the close of June 30, 1978, the period during which certain dyeing and tanning materials may be imported free of duty, having considered the same, reports favorably thereon without amendment and recommends that the bill do pass.

#### DESCRIPTION OF PROVISIONS

Subsection (a) of the bill amends the termination date for item 907.80 in the Appendix to the Tariff Schedules of the United States (TSUS) from September 30, 1975 to June 30, 1978 to extend the existing suspension of duties on certain dyeing and tanning materials.

Subsection (b) of the bill applies the amendment to articles entered, or withdrawn from the warehouse, for consumption after September 30, 1975.

#### GENERAL STATEMENT

The existing suspension of duties on dyeing and tanning extracts has been extended with various changes and additions since it was originally enacted in 1957. The last extension was enacted on August 16, 1973 by Public Law 93-101 for a 3-year period from September 30, 1972 to September 30, 1975.

Both the column 1 rates of duty (applicable to imports from countries accorded nondiscriminatory (MFN) tariff treatment) and the column 2 rates (applicable to imports from countries not accorded MFN treatment) are suspended. The dyeing and tanning materials covered by the duty suspensions consist of canaigre, chestrut, curupay, divi-divi, eucalyptus, hemlock, larch, tara, mangrove, myrobalan, oak, quebracho, sumac, urunday, wattle, and valonia, provided for under items 470.23, 470.25, 470.57, and 470.65 of the TSUS. Logwood extracts under TSUS item 470.15 were added to the coverage in the last extension of the duty suspensions. The column 1 rates range from duty-free to 6 percent ad valorem; the column 2 rates of duty are 15 percent ad valorem on all items.

There has been little or no domestic production of most vegetable tanning and dyeing extracts for many years. The only vegetable tanning material which has been produced in the United States in significant quantity is chestnut tanning extract. Domestic availability has steadily declined, however, with the continued decline in the availability of chestnut trees. Consequently, the United States depends on imports for virtually all its requirements of vegetable tanning extracts.

Imports totalled about 57 million pounds valued at about \$7 million in 1974. Of the principal items, imports in 1974 of chestnut, divi-divi, and hemlock were about 18.5 million pounds valued at \$2 million, mainly from France, Italy, and Canada; imports of quebracho were 23.7 million pounds valued at \$3 million, mainly from Argentina; and imports of wattle were 13.1 million pounds valued at \$1.5 million, mainly from South Africa. The vegetable tanning and dyeing extracts are used mainly by the leather industry to convert raw hides and skins into leather and by the oil well drilling industry as a thinner for fluids used in rotary drilling operations. No unfavorable comment was received by the committee from the general public on this bill. No executive agencies objected to this bill.

#### COSTS OF CARRYING OUT THE BILL AND EFFECT ON THE REVENUES OF THE BILL

In compliance with section 252(a) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1970, the following statement is made relative to the costs to be incurred in carrying out this bill and the effect on the revenues of the bill. The Committee estimates that the extension of the existing suspension of duties on certain dyeing and tanning materials provided by the bill would not result in any additional loss in revenues or administrative costs.



# EXTENSION OF EXISTING DUTY ON CERTAIN DYEING AND TANNING MATERIALS

#### REPORT

#### [To accompany H.R. 7715]

The Committee on Ways and Means, to whom was referred the bill (H.R. 7715) to extend until the close of June 30, 1978, the period during which certain dyeing and tanning materials may be imported free of duty, having considered the same, report favorably thereon without amendment and recommend that the bill do pass.

#### DESCRIPTION OF PROVISIONS

Subsection (a) of the bill amends the termination date for item 907.80 in the Appendix to the Tariff Schedules of the United States (TSUS) from September 30, 1975 to June 30, 1978 to extend the existing suspension of duties on certain dyeing and tanning materials.

Subsection (b) of the bill applies the amendment to articles entered, or withdrawn from warehouse, for consumption after September 30, 1975.

#### GENERAL STATEMENT

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Favorable reports have been received from the Special Representative for Trade Negotiations and from the Departments of Commerce, State, and Treasury. The International Trade Commission submitted an information report.

Public hearings were held by the Subcommittee on Trade of the Committee on Ways and Means on April 23 and 24, 1975, on dutyfree entry and temporary duty suspension bills. During these hearings favorable testimony and written comments were received on H.R. 6147, a bill similar to H.R. 7715. No objections to this legislation have been received by the committee from any source.

Your committee believes H.R. 7715 to be meritorious and unanimously urges its approval.

#### EFFECT OF THE BILL ON THE REVENUES AND VOTE OF THE COMMITTEE IN REPORTING THE BILL

In compliance with clause 7 of rule XIII of the rules of the House of Representatives, the following statement is made relative to the effect on the revenues of this bill. Your committee estimates that the extension of the existing suspension of duties on certain dyeing and tanning materials provided by the bill would not result in any additional loss in revenues or administrative costs.

In compliance with clause 2(1)(2)(B) of rule XI of the rules of the House of Representatives, the following statement is made relative to the vote by the committee on the motion to report the bill. This bill was unanimously ordered favorably reported by the committee.

#### OTHER MATTERS REQUIRED TO BE DISCUSSED UNDER HOUSE RULES

In compliance with clauses 2(1)(3) and 2(1)(4) of rule XI of the rules of the House of Representatives, the following statements are made.

With regard to subdivision (A) of clause 3 relating to oversight findings, your committee advises that in its review of the present economic situation with respect to dyeing and tanning materials, it concluded it would be desirable to enact legislation to extend the existing suspension of duties on imports of certain dyeing and tanning materials for an additional temporary period, by reason of the considerations outlined above in the General Statement.

In compliance with subdivision (B) of clause 3, your committee states that the changes made in present law by this bill involve no new budgetary authority or new or increased tax expenditures.


With respect to subdivisions (C) and (D) of clause 3, your committee advises that no estimate or comparison has been prepared by the Director of the Congressional Budget Office relative to H.R. 7715, nor have any oversight findings or recommendations been submitted to the committee by the Committee on Government Operations with respect to the subject matter contained in thebill.

In compliance with clause (2)(1)(4) of rule XI, your committee states that extension of the temporary suspension of duties on imports under this bill would not have an inflationary impact on prices and costs in the operation of the general economy.
