While serving in the Navy, Mr. Cabal had married a U.S. citizen on July 27, 1970, who bore him two sons. Prior to her death in an automobile accident on November 25, 1974, Mrs. Cabal had submitted an immediate relative immigration visa petition in his behalf which was approved January 6, 1971, and


forwarded to the American Consul in Nassau, where he was to complete his application for the visa. (Because Mr. Cabal's entry into the U.S. was by military assignment and, therefore, not under the provisions of the Immigration and Nationality Act pertaining to inspection and admission of aliens, he is ineligible for adjustment of status.) However, Mrs. Cabal's death resulted in an automatic revocation of the approved visa petition, upon which Mr. Cabal had not completed his application for permanent residence, and rendered him ineligible under immigration law for preferential treatment on the basis of his marriage.

Mr. Cabal resides in Jacksonville with his two sons and is employed by the Weyerhauser Company. However, he has been ordered to leave the United States by February 1, 1977 and his return to the United States would be delayed several years because he would be chargeable to the nonpreference portion of the numerical limitation for immigrants and conditional entrants from the Eastern Hemisphere. Approval of the enrolled bill would simply restore immediate relative status to Mr. Cabal and permit him to resume his application through the U.S. Consul in Nassau for admission into the U.S. for permanent residence.
