Attached for your consideration is H.R. 13172, the Second Supplemental Appropriations Act for 1976 and the Transition Quarter. The enrolled bill provides supplemental appropriations of \$9,393,791,970 for FY 76 and \$2,647,057,180 for the transition quarter for all cabinet departments and many agencies.

A detailed discussion of the enrolled bill is provided in Jim Lynn's memorandum and bill report at Tab A. Although not indicated in the bill report, the enrolled bill contains the \$25 million in disaster assistance for Italy and funds for the Office of Science and Technology.

OMB, NSC, Max Friedersdorf, Counsel's Office (Lazarus), Bill Seidman and I recommend approval of the enrolled bill.

Highlights

- The net change would be much higher except that Congress deferred consideration of three requests totalling \$956 million. These requests will probably be reconsidered in fiscal year 1977.
- Your requests for HEW programs are increased by \$913 million. Many of these are necessary increases due to reestimates of program activity.

Recommendation

I recommend that you sign the enrolled bill. Some of the funds in this bill are needed quickly. We will submit our recommendations to you later on rescission and deferrals of amounts in the bill which are not needed right away--or will never be used.

Discussion

The enrolled bill includes Administration requests for:

- ° Several activities deferred from regular 1976 appropriations bills, generally due to the lack of legislative authorization at the time;
- ° The unabsorbed portion of civilian, military, and wage board pay increases effective in fiscal year 1976;
- ° Claims and judgments rendered against the United States;
- ° Numerous other program activities which were, subsequent to passage of regular 1976 appropriations bills, either requested by you or added by the Congress.

In this bill, the Congress effected an overall decrease of \$522 million from your 1976 request. This representation is,

however, misleading because there are reductions included that will probably be reconsidered in fiscal year 1977.

- ° Reductions of \$503 million for the ERDA synthetic fuels commercial demonstration fund and \$213 million in Defense requests for the conversion of the U.S.S. Belknap due to lack of authorization, and;
- ° a decrease of \$240 million for an additional U.S. contribution to the Inter-American Development Bank to allow both houses of Congress proper time to consider the request if resubmitted as a 1977 budget amendment.

If these decreases are disregarded, a congressional increase of \$434 million is shown in 1976. Additionally, when a congressional increase for the off-budget housing for the elderly or handicapped program is taken into account, the increase becomes \$694 million.

For the transition quarter, your requests are increased by a total of \$256 million. The considerations discussed above have no effect on this figure.

The effect of the overall budget authority changes in this bill will be to reduce spending in 1976 by \$177 million, but there will be increases of \$239 million in the transition quarter and \$437 million in 1977. There will be a decrease of \$47 million in 1978.

The remainder of this analysis discusses the major changes made to your requests. The discussion is in terms of budget authority changes for both 1976 and the transition quarter. Any other changes are minor and result in a net reduction of \$1.3 million.

MAJOR INCREASES

Department of Health, Education, and Welfare

The most substantial changes to your requests were for HEW programs, resulting in a net increase of \$914 million. Of this amount, education programs accounted for \$545.6 million. This is composed primarily of the following items:

- ° An increase of \$386.8 million above your request is provided for the basic educational opportunity grants program. Due to higher than expected participation rates in FY 1976-1977, average awards would be reduced by 50% over the current academic year if no further funding was provided. You had proposed that this additional \$386.8 million come from reprogrammings and transfers from other educational programs. The Congress rejected this approach and, instead, provided new budget authority to fully fund the basic grants program.
- ° For grants to States for the education of handicapped children, \$90 million in unrequested funds is provided. The additional funds will support screening and diagnosis, as well as the provision of direct educational services to approximately 752,000 children during the coming school year.

- ° In order to assist school districts in implementing massive court-ordered desegregation plans, \$33 million in unrequested funds for emergency school aid is provided to be targeted on areas (such as Boston, Louisville, and Detroit) which encounter special problems.
- ° For payments to school districts impacted by Federal activity, an unrequested \$24 million is included by the Congress. The additional funds are to meet "hold-harmless" provisions authorized by the Education Amendments of 1974.
- ° Unrequested funds of \$11 million are provided for elementary and secondary education. These funds are to help States assume a greater responsibility for efforts to improve reading achievement, support the purchase and distribution of books to children through the Reading is Fundamental project, assist States in developing and coordinating bilingual education, and provide assistance to States which have developed plans to equalize education expenditures.

An increase of \$248 million is provided for Medicaid. Several State legislatures are presently considering proposals to increase Medicaid expenditures. The need for this additional amount was included in the most recent quarterly report to Congress by HEW on fund requirements. In its report, the Senate Appropriations Committee directed "that the Department strengthen its capacity to provide more accurate and timely cost estimates for public assistance."

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- ° \$40.3 million for community services for the aging and for demonstration of new techniques of service delivery;
- ° \$14 million for the training of professional personnel to enter or re-enter the field of aging programs;
- ° \$7 million for Multipurpose Senior Centers and Multi-disciplinary Centers of Gerontology--both with large growth potential;
- ° \$3.6 million for rehabilitation services and facilities;
- ° \$2.8 million for research and demonstrations.

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- For programs of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse, and Mental Health Administration, unrequested funds of \$21.2 million and an additional 175 positions are included. The Congress provided these funds to support the continuation costs of alcoholism community projects, which are scheduled for renewal, and to meet staffing shortages at St. Elizabeths Hospital alluded to by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.
- An unrequested \$18.3 million has also been included for Health Services Administration maternal and child health formula grants to States to cover continuation costs of grants scheduled for renewal.

A smaller increase--but troublesome on policy grounds--is the \$4 million provided for Rogers Memorial-Capitol Hill Hospital. The additional funds would bring the Federal share of the project to 96% or \$21.7 million. We have traditionally opposed inequitable and preferential individual awards through the legislative process in light of existing national programs for construction and renovation in which all institutions compete for Federal support.

Department of Agriculture

For the Department of Agriculture, the Congress has increased your requests by a total of \$280.4 million, primarily as follows:

- Based on current projections by the Department of Agriculture, no additional funds will be necessary for the food stamp program until 1977 if the regulations reforming the program are implemented on a timely basis by the States. A lawsuit enjoining the regulations is expected soon. This could result in added outlays in excess of \$200 million in the transition quarter. The Congress includes \$200 million in this bill to become available in the transition quarter for use if necessary. These funds may be carried over for use in 1977.
- In order to finance the special milk program during the transition quarter, the Congress has included unrequested funds totaling \$24 million. This program was proposed for rescission in fiscal year 1976 at the time of transmittal of the 1977 budget. The rescission proposal was rejected by the Congress.
- Your request for child nutrition programs is increased by \$20.2 million. This includes \$14.4 million for school food service equipment and \$5.8 million for State administrative expenses.

- In order to provide immediate relief for wind erosion conditions in the Great Plains States, \$15 million in unrequested funds is included for cost-sharing contracts under the agricultural conservation program.
- For emergency assistance to repair damage to watersheds as a result of major storms which have occurred during the past year, the Congress provides \$12.3 million in unrequested funds.
- An increase of \$5.2 million is included for the Agricultural Research Service. This amount is to cover facilities construction costs at the Plum Island Animal Disease Center and the Clay Center, Nebraska facility.

U.S. Postal Service

An increase of \$21.6 million is provided to support the extended phasing-in period for full postage rates to certain classes of mailers. In its report the Senate Appropriations Committee expressed its concern "with the failure of the President to include within his recommended totals the funding to support the extended phasing-in period."

Department of Transportation

Ten million dollars in unrequested funds is provided for the expeditious reactivation of Coast Guard resources to commence enforcement of the Fishery Conservation and Management Act of 1976.

Department of the Treasury

For activities of the U.S. Customs Service, the Congress has provided an additional \$8.7 million. It is for an additional 300 personnel to help process the increased flow of visitors and cargo into the country and to permit the opening of new ports of entry.

Corporation for Public Broadcasting

An increase of \$8.5 million will fund larger grants to public radio and television stations, as well as expand such activities as program production, minority training, audience and program research, and development costs for the Satellite Interconnection Project.

Department of the Interior

The Congress provided a net increase for the Department of the Interior of \$8.3 million. The major element is an \$8.9 million increase for National Park Service land acquisition in Texas, Michigan, and Oklahoma.

Department of Labor

The Congress provides \$5 million in unrequested funds to finance the Mountain-Plains Family Education and Employment program. The funding is provided to assure that there will be continued Federal assistance for the program's operational phase.

Executive Office of the President

Although a small money item in this bill, you have opposed the establishment of a new Office of Drug Abuse Policy. The Congress provides \$250,000 for this purpose. An issue paper on this subject is being prepared for your consideration.

Department of Housing and Urban Development

An additional \$260 million in loan funds for the housing for the elderly or handicapped program (Section 202 of the Housing Act of 1959) is provided. Given the availability of housing assistance subsidies for elderly persons under other Federal programs, the increase in program level is not warranted.

MAJOR DECREASES

International Financial Institutions

In addition to the deferred action on your request for the Inter-American Development Bank discussed earlier, your request for the African Development Fund was reduced by \$10 million. The amount provided equals the anticipated 1976 contribution.

Veterans Administration

For the Veterans Administration, the Congress has reduced the request by \$215.8 million, primarily as follows:

- A \$200 million reduction for readjustment benefits is because recent statistics indicate fewer GI bill beneficiaries are training than previously anticipated.
- A reduction of \$10 million in funding is to capitalize new inventory and undelivered orders in the supply fund.

Department of Defense-Military

Although the Congress deleted \$213 million requested for the conversion of the U.S.S. Belknap for lack of authorization, they provided a related request of \$8 million for the completion of design work. Requests for military personnel retirement pay and for special and operational rations were reduced by a total of \$26.4 million.

Energy Research and Development Administration

In action on your ERDA requests--other than the deferral of action on the synthetic fuels commercialization program mentioned earlier--the Congress effected a net decrease of \$24 million. This is composed of (1) an increase of \$16 million in unrequested funds to reinstate excess funds which were reprogrammed from coal research and development into the magnetohydrodynamics (MHD) program, and (2) a decrease of \$40 million no longer required for the weapons program due to recent reprogramming actions.

Department of State


Your request to provide emergency assistance for unexpected urgent refugee and migration needs is decreased by \$15 million. However, an additional \$5 million is presently included in the conference version of the 1976 Foreign Assistance Appropriation Bill.

Federal Energy Administration

Your requests to meet the requirements of the Energy Policy and Conservation Act (Public Law 94-163) are reduced by \$12.9 million. The Senate Appropriations Committee in its report to the Congress states that FEA should utilize existing funds to a greater degree to finance these responsibilities.

Recommendation

That you sign the enrolled bill. Although the bill includes a number of undesirable increases, a veto would not be prudent since the bill contains funds that are needed quickly. We will submit recommendations for rescission and deferral proposals at a later date.


