To grant permanent residence to two alien physicians who entered the United States on temporary visas for the furtherance of their medical training.

Discussion

The beneficiaries of these two enrolled bills are alien physicians from Western Hemisphere countries who had been admitted to the United States on temporary visas to allow them to complete their advanced medical training in this country. Although on temporary visas, both physicians are practicing medicine in States which do not require permanent resident immigrant status or citizenship as a condition to obtaining a license to practice medicine. Both have been recruited by hospitals in Mississippi; however, they are unable to practice in Mississippi because Mississippi law requires that physicians practicing in that State be permanent residents or U.S. citizens.

The medical services of both Drs. Briseno and Lopez are critically needed by hospitals in Bay Springs and Jackson, Mississippi, respectively, because of their particular medical skills. Dr. Briseno, a citizen of Mexico, is a skilled physician and surgeon currently practicing medicine in Illinois; the Bay Springs, Mississippi hospital has had to close its surgical unit because of its recent loss of the services of two physicians. Dr. Lopez, who is a citizen of Nicaragua, is a specialist in the field of neonatology (newborn infants), currently practicing in a Pennsylvania hospital; Hinds General Hospital in Jackson, Mississippi faces having to close its nursery if a qualified physician such as Dr. Lopez does not take a position.

The Immigration and Nationality Act does not permit Western Hemisphere natives to adjust their immigration status while in the United States. Accordingly, both physicians would have to return to their respective countries and wait several months for an immigrant visa; this would seriously jeopardize the availability of certain medical services in the two Mississippi hospitals. The enrolled bills would grant both physicians permanent resident immigrant status upon payment of the required visa fee. In addition, both enrolled bills direct the Department of State to make an appropriate reduction in the number of preference visas available to the doctors' respective countries.



[To accompany S. 3682]

The Committee on the Judiciary, to which was referred the bill (S. 3682), for the relief of Doctor Oscar J. Briseno, having considered the same, reports favorably thereon without amendment and recommends that the bill do pass.

PURPOSE OF THE BILL

The purpose of the bill is to grant the status of permanent residence in the United States to Doctor Oscar J. Briseno. The bill provides for the payment of the required visa fee and for an appropriate visa number deduction.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

The beneficiary of the bill is a 32-year-old native and citizen of Mexico who entered the United States six years ago on an exchange visa to further his medical training. Dr. Briseno is a highly skilled physician and surgeon who is licensed to practice medicine in Illinois. However, he cannot obtain a license to practice in Mississippi until he becomes a permanent resident alien and files a declaration of intent to become a United States citizen.

Dr. Briseno's medical expertise is urgently needed at Jasper General Hospital in Bay Springs, Mississippi. The hospital serves 25,000 people and has recently lost the services of two of its physicians. The surgical suite at the Jasper General Hospital has been forced to close due to lack of surgical services.

The Committee is in receipt of numerous letters of recommendation

in behalf of Dr. Briseno, examples of which follow:

DEAR SENATOR EASTLAND: In accordance with the conversation with Mr. Ed Laughron of your Staff and Mr. Lee Harrson, Jr., of Bay Springs, Mississippi, concerning Doctor Oscar J. Briseno.

We are in desperate need of the services of Dr. Briseno and find he cannot obtain a Mississippi License due to the requirement that he

must have filed a Declaration of Intent for U.S. Citizenship.

Dr. Briseno has been in the U.S. under a J-1 training visa for the past 6 years and has a license to practice medicine in Illinois. The J-1 program numbers are P11 380 and P3 4510. He has applied to the District office in New Orleans for a H-1 Visa; unaware of the requirement to have filed a Declaration of Intent in order to obtain a Mississippi License. He has re-located his family to Bay Springs, Miss., and a new clinic has been constructed for his use. Dr. Briseno has three children, who were born in this country and are U.S. Citizens.

Senator, we need your support and action to assist us in being able to use the services of Dr. Briseno. He is an exceptionally well trained physician and vou are aware of the severe problems faced by rural communities in obtaining the services of qualified physicians. Our community only has 3 practicing physicians for a population served in excess of 25,000. We have had to close our surgical department and O.B. Departments in the hospital due to the lack of adequate physicians. Dr. Briseno intends to do general practice and surgery which will greatly assist the citizens of this area.

I am enclosing several documents to support our request for assistance. If you need further information, please call on me. The citizens of Jasper County and the surrounding areas will greatly appreciate

your attention to this matter.

An Act

For the relief of Doctor Oscar J. Briseno.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That, for the purposes of the Immigration and Nationality Act and section 21(e) of the Act of October 3, 1965, Doctor Oscar J. Briseno shall be held and considered to have been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence as of the date of the enactment of this Act upon payment of the required visa fee. Upon the granting of permanent residence to such alien as provided for in this Act, the Secretary of State shall instruct the proper officer to reduce by one number, during the current fiscal year or the fiscal year next following, the total number of immigrant visas which are made available to special immigrants as defined in section 101(a) (27) (A) of the Immigration and Nationality Act.
