Vatterson, an suppose to your letter of aug, 27, 76: We have printed materials and papers, but to answer your quistions concirming the United Tites Council of Vachie West it is simple to say to you that aur work is to do all the things for which many attac groups (here) are well funded to do, but do not: as their non-participation increased, ours arganization grew, dating back to 1971 when the Sacramento Andian Center was first funded under O.E.O. Our half-hearted attempte to be funded were rejected, and while there was some dissappointment, we have

been able to retain autonomy and build power in our friedom from fundings guidelines," The primary funded duction groups here use a preference system for Native California dudians, and that, of course, encludes 80% of the Indian community in this state from aide, jobs, benefite, or (even) social rapport. We are approx. 3000 andian people who are refugues in the mest, fung pushed to this place since 1800 as aur homelande were invaded and wars of conquest were waged against aur Nationa. Our members are from approp. 40 tribes, each of which has suffered the wellknown appressions, broken treaties, confiscations, and colonialistic take over of this lands and lines. The first group of note to arrive here was lead by treck and Isalage mise people, including Lequayah, in 1809, when

the Treaty of Hopewell was flagrantly violated and barbarity against the Mushogean and eastern nations grew to fearful proportions. athere came when the white man, John Ross, was subsidized to impose dictatorship on the Nation in Indian Territory, Still athers came during the scandalaus years of the rape of dudian Nations by the paleticians in the Hickopoo andian offair. as land in the Plains is confiscated, and in the desert, descerated - as Black musa more fled before the onslaught: They continue to some as their lands and this peace and rights are taken from Them. Our program' is simply the natural actions of a tribal extended - family. unit: we keep andian " alive, in frequent gatherings, and advocacy as well as preforming the sollal services which refugues require in

a strange, unfriendly land. We are pushed to this western waters and can go no further; together, we are the bundle of sticks which cannot be broken. Our primary drive is to help get aur prople educated, and we are responsible for getting hundride of aur members into college, aiding them, and encouraging them to stay there, assisting lach ather with studies, papers, problems of discrimination which are built in in any standard set of studies. Our work is doubly hard this year due to the gross insults which pound us in every quarter under the ruse of "Di-Centennial!" We have scholars, medicine people, hild religious teachers, and all manner of traditional aids who function far the right reasons, old may reasons, and not for " pay " (which we don't have). Our elected touncil-prople are from

R. FORD seven different andian Nations, and a supplemental emques of 21 are from ather dudian nations. We have an annual I pring Festival, and these people are chosen at that time. We have sent representative Cat their aun expense across america this summer, to meet with many trikes, Nations, and groups, at has been enlightening to us, and we feel we are unique as we found no such body with like goals and work. Like the Jewa and the old-way Hope, we keep aur needs simple and they are met and we go on, a ferring each day that the Quat Spirit works in the offairs of man and unwerse, and that the time our anciente spoke of, is here. We are therefore probably the most continted your of chidians in this land today seeing that we have placed and

Trust in the proper powers, and we have saught knowledge rather than gold, and we are prepared for the upheavals, holacauste, at any ather vast mustations of geology, or psychology that may come. We are contented and emofraid, and, as such, we are pretty good people, having many friends in all races who now turn to us for assurance in a world going berserts with fear. dt is good, for this are good people in every race and every avenue of life. We publish a numsletter from time to time to let prople know what is happining in the world, since the large subsidized midia is not allowed to do so. dt is an aut-ofpochet paper, free to interested persons, and is little more than a headline report and bibliography to assist reduce where they can

still attain true reparting of the affairs we have montimed. We have great mail and reader sesponce, and these are also sources of clipping and reports of events not widely arculated. We have historians and scientiste and well-trained brains to aid us in emberstanding what is going on from the bits and pieces of information which came from a mide field. as any goal is knowledge, and an work is by fair exchange, we avoid high erine of fraud, stealing, and ather acts so common in every fuld and strata of society. We therefore feel we are among the best citizins of the land, abiding by the laws of "Caesar" and the laws of aur dudian ethics of ald . Time is on aur side and The Suit Spirit is our frind. V.
