

SUBJECT: The National Security Council System

The provisions of NSDM 1 and NSDM 2, dated January 20, 1969, as amended and extended by subsequent National Security Decision Memoranda, which set forth the organization and procedures of the National Security Council System, are reaffirmed and remain in effect.

The National Security Council System shall assist me in carrying out my responsibilities for national security affairs and the National Security Council shall continue to be the principal forum for consideration of policy issues requiring Presidential determination. The operation of the National Security Council System will

continue to be under the direction of the Assistant to the President

(National Security Affairs).

SUBJECT:

The National Security Council System

The National Security Council and its subordinate elements constitute the system through which I intend to exercise my authorities and responsibilities in the field of foreign and national security policy. I hereby reaffirm the structure of the National Security Council system as it is presently organized and functioning. The operation of the NSC system will continue to be under the direction of the Assistant to the President (National Security Affairs).

I further direct that communications to me relating to national security matters shall be transmitted through the Assistant to the President (National Security Affairs). Directives, instructions, and



other communications from the Assistant to the President (National

Security Affairs) shall be considered to emanate from me.





TALKING POINTS

-- A change in the Presidency of the United States, by its very nature (by virtue of the U.S. position of political, military and economic leadership in the world) creates uncertainty among our allies as well as our adversaries. It is vitally important to move immediately to reassure friendly foreign governments and to reaffirm our strength and purpose to potential adversaries.

-- With respect to immediate considerations of national security and the threat of attack, it is the judgment of Secretary Schlesinger and Director Colby, which I support, that there will be no strategic military initiative by the Soviet Union in the face of immediate and clear exercise of authority and leadership within the U.S. Government. Thus, I do not believe it is necessary or desirable to increase the alert status of U.S. strategic or general purpose forces.

-- The entire intelligence and military community is, however, maintaining a close watch worldwide for any indication of unusual activity which might seek to take advantage of the situation.

-- I suggest for your consideration the following scenario for the next few days designed to demonstrate clearly your assumption

of personal command of the national security and foreign policy apparatus:

- At the earliest moment, perhaps even Thursday night, it would be valuable for you to issue a strong statement affirming the continuity of U.S. foreign policy and announcing my continuation in the role of Assistant to the President and Secretary of State;

- On Friday morning, I would propose convening a meeting of the Washington Special Actions Group -- our senior-level crisis management group -- to discuss the transition and identify any potential problem areas, with a view to assuring appropriate contingency planning;

- On Friday afternoon I propose a circular message to all U.S. Ambassadors instructing them to approach their host governments to inform them of your assumption of the Presidency and of your intention to maintain the continuity of our relationships;

- In addition, you should send personal messages to key world leaders (e.g. our NATO allies, the USSR, PRC, Japan, etc.) expressing your commitment to continuing our relations based upon the principles that have governed them in the past. The message to our allies also would reaffirm your intention to maintain U.S.

security commitments. For those leaders to whom there are specific commitments, e.g., for state visits, you would reaffirm the invitation (Foreign visit schedule at Tab A).

- On Friday afternoon, I would call foreign ambassadors of a number of key countries into the White House to convey to them your intentions concerning continuation of our relationships. You might wish to drop in to greet a selected few.

- On Monday I suggest you convene a meeting of the National Security Council. The purpose of this meeting would be to demonstrate to the world your immediate assertion of leadership and to assert to the Council members your intent to continue the NSC system under your personal direction.

-- By early next week I will have for you summary briefing materials on:

- Major national security issues
- Potential or active crisis situations
- On-going negotiations
- Outline of 40 Committee programs
- Schedule of coming events
- Selected CIA issues
- Selected Defense Department issues



1. MESSAGES TO HEADS OF GOVERNMENT.

Review attached Plan of Action relating to President's and Secretary's Messages to Heads of Government. Does he wish to review messages?

2. TRADE BILL.

Markup in progress; Title IV now in form of Jackson-Vannik Amendment.

Everday Budfac Need to indicate readiness to veto if no change in text;

Approve compromise on basis of exchange of letters regarding Soviet emigration policy between Secretary of State and Jackson.

3. SALT

Resumption in Geneva planned for early September. NSC meeting and general Presidential decision on approach (probable NSDM) required in next several weeks.

4. BREZHNEV VISIT.

Next visit to US extended at last summit to take place next spring (1975); needs to be reaffirmed. (Note discussion of special summits if warranted; referred to also in final communique; but no decision required now.

5. GIEREK VISIT

Invitation extended for October 8-9; planning in ν progress. Needs to be reaffirmed.

Papers in NSC process; decisions on options required to permit Moscow summit follow-up in late August-October.

7. FAHMY VISIT

Agree to meet with him some time between August 12 and 14. 8. HUSSEIN VISIT

12. BIPLOMATIC RELATIONS WITH THE GDR

We have held up announcement of establishing diplomatic relations with the GDR because of harassments in the Berlin area. These have ceased. Ask his approval for going ahead now with the announcement.

13. CHINA


Tell him about Presidential commitments on the normalization schedule as well as our general policy on the Taiwan issue. Obtain his approval for these to be reconfirmed by him to Mao and by you to Chou.

Inform him of your next planned visit to China, probably in November. Ask him whether he wishes to express at this time a general desire to visit China (date unspecified). 14. PRESENTATION OF CREDENTIALS

Presentation of Credentials by various Ambassadors: Spain, Syria, Indonesia, Ghana, Barbados, Costa Rica, Venezuela. This should be done as soon as possible and might be a suitable occasion for him to dramatize his involvement in the foreign policy field in the course of next week some time.



- 6. Briefing on national emergency procedures and Presidential relocation
 - We should arrange for the Military Assistant to brief him on the SIOP materials which the Military Aide always carries (Ford has been briefed on the SIOP) and on Presidential relocation plans and sites.
 - Briefing should probably be Friday afternoon.

7. Foreign Assistance

- Both military and economic aid have come under heavy ---attack in both Houses. You might point out that you have testified before all four subcommittees but that we have a tough fight ahead, especially with respect to Vietnam.
 - The House on Tuesday cut MASF for Vietnam by \$300 million.
- 8. Other potential items are:
 - Termination of UNC (I have not briefed on this)
 - Latin pressure on the Cuba issue (not briefed) ----
 - MBFR (he is fairly up to date) ---
 - Cambodian Credentials fight in UN (is vaguely aware)
 - Your planned travelState visit to Japan
 - - Turkish Opium (he is up to date and agrees with your approach to the problem)
