





He said at that time that, "We have to be on the right side morally, and the right side morally is to be for majority rule." Secretary Kissinger's Lusaka speech reflects this statement.

It is precisely because we want to avoid a bloodbath that we are pressing Rhodesia, and urging South Africa to do the same, to negotiate a speedy, peaceful change to majority rule but with protection of minority rights. We believe such an approach promises a future of shared economic prosperity, about which you are rightly concerned. Majority rule achieved only after a long and bloody guerrilla campaign would be one in which minority rights would be swept away.

Accordingly, the United States is exerting its leadership in taking a strong stand in favor of peaceful, negotiated transition to majority rule in Rhodesia. If we do not take significant action in this direction, the Soviets and Cubans will have continued pretext for intervention in southern Africa -- something we all wish to avoid.

President Ford summarized his policy regarding selfdetermination in southern Africa in Tyler, Texas on April 28:

Let me summarize the objectives of our program in Africa. Number one, we strongly believe today, as we have over the 200 year period of our history, in self-determination by people of a country. That is how we got our freedom --self-determination.

In Re: Denial of Television Time to Ronald Reagan

Dear President Ford:

As a lawyer and a law professor, I was very distressed at the denial of television time to Governor Reagan in order to present his views to the American public. Time on only one network after a hassle was insufficient.

I am writing you because I am sure you may want to use your influence to have the networks be a little bit more equitable. Regardless of who wins the contest between you and Ronald Reagan for the Presidency, it would very seriously impair the effectiveness of the Office of the President were it to be generally felt by the American public, or even by a small but significant portion of it, that the victory that either of you won had not been won as the result of a full and fair presentation of the issues of the campaign before the American public.

I am going to send a copy of this letter to the presidents of the three broadcasting networks, ABC, NBC, and CBS. I will also send a copy of it to my senators and congressmen and to the members of the Federal Communications Commission. I will probably also send it to the Chairman of the House and Senate committees responsible for regulation of the broadcasting networks.

I have been very concerned for many years, even thirty-five years or so, about the unfairness of regulation of public broadcasting as it applies to political activity. Although I am relatively young, in my early fifties, I still recall as a high school student the efforts of President Roosevelt and Chairman Fly to transform the broadcasting medium in the United States into an instrument of government propaganda much like what was being done in that period in Nazi Germany, Fascist Italy, Communist Russia, and, to some extent, the British BBC. In other words, the instrument of broadcasting was to be deformed so that it would present only an official and "responsible" point of view.

President Roosevelt and Chairman Fly did not succeed in their efforts in this regard. Nevertheless, certain residues of this type of thinking have still permeated the regulatory laws of the FCC.

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The view that broadcasting is an monopoly and consequently that access to the

airwaves should be restricted "in the public interest" is an erroneous one. There are more broadcasting stations in the United States than there are daily newspapers, and, in fact, probably even more than there are weekly newspapers. The result has been a false regulation of the broadcasting industry under the theory that the content of its programs, particularly as regards to comment on public issues, must always be "fair" and "balanced." This is, in many ways, because of the highly competitive situation in the broadcast industry, like trying to regulate the paper pulp industry under the theory that the paper business is a monopoly and that, therefore, those who publish newspapers should have to get a licenses or buy their paper from licensed paper manufacturers to assure a printing of news in the public interest.

The result has been, first, a misapprehension of the industry as a monopoly, and, secondly, the enhancement of such monopolistic characteristics as it has by making it responsible to print only fair and balanced news presentation in the public interest.

This, therefore, gives official types of opinion, or at least the opinion which is favored by the dominant opinion groups in the United States who also dominate the media, an unfair advantage and opportunity to repress views and opinions which they find unsuitable.

As a result, we, in effect, have a sort of unofficial propoganda ministry in the United States through the type of regulation of the broadcast industry.

I remember, for example, about twenty years ago when one of my friends bought time on WKBO, the radio station in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, which is owned by the Stineman family, who were influential in Pennsylvania Republican circles, that they refused to sell time to a group which was critical of President Eisenhower. This was pure repression of opinion for political purposes. Since the views of my clients at that time were unpopular, they were unable to buy radio time from any other radio station and were unable to renew their contract with WKBO.

The pretext of WKBO was that the material presented was controversial and might impair the renewal of their radio license. I did bring the matter before the Common Pleas Court in Pennsylvania and lost the case. However, this is a perfect illustration of how our existing radio regulations, with the aid of ill-informed and unsympathetic courts, are able to supress unpopular opinions on the broadcasting media.

The present regulation of radio stations to create balanced presentation of the news or to guarantee all candidates equal time is so much hogwash. If the newspapers were to be considered as having the duty to sell time at reasonable prices

and conditions to all who applied for it and were relieved of the responsibility of libel and slander responsibility for those who bought time for political opinion purposes, it would make a freer expression of opinion possible.

The present laws on libel and slander are just as ridiculous as making the pulp manufacturers, such as International Paper Company and Georgia Pacific, responsible for what the New York Times and the Chicago Tribune print on the paper they buy from these particular paper manufacturers.

In any event, as it applies to your particular case and to the NBC, CBS, and ABC, the refusal to sell Ronald Reagan television time, which is his most effective political weapon, just after he had done what nobody else had done for a generation, to beat an incumbent President in a state Presidential primary, smacks very much of totalitarianism and the type of official direction of the news media which would be what one might expect in countries like Fascist Italy, Nazi Germany, and Communist Russia. It is not entirely atypical of the type of monopoly of broadcasting which we get in France with its left-wing domination, albeit anti-government, media, and likewise in Great Britain with its left-wing bias in the BBC. In any event, the result has been that views which the media do not approve of, whether with the connivance of the White House or against it, simply do not have a reasonably equal opportunity to be broadcast, and so, consequently, the entire democratic process of the election of a President, which depends on uninhibited and unimpaired free speech, is frustrated.

Now I am a professor, as I indicated. I teach at law school and reach about three law students a year in my law school courses, and I also teach at the undergraduate level and reach another three or four hundred students. What am I to tell my students about the broadcasting laws when we come across situations where we discuss free speech? We all know about free speech in the classroom and academic freedom. But I am afraid, under the present state of our broadcasting laws, and the dominance of our media by certain types of political and social opinion, that I would have to tell them that there is an official point of view and an official type of propaganda line which is antidemocratic and that the theory of our democratic form of government is impaired and distorted by the type of media control and domination which we have. And I would be compelled to say that the recent attempt to supress Governor Reagan's use of television is a perfect example.

Now I know that you wouldn't want to be elected President under circumstances where the democratic process was impaired and you could not say that you were elected as a result of a free and full and complete discussion of all of the relevant current issues. Consequently, I am hoping you will use the influence of your office to reform the broadcast laws and to make the entire public broadcasting system much freer. As I indicated, such a reform would have the following points principally:

1 - That all members of the public should have the right to buy time at reasonable prices and under reasonable terms;

- 2 That the broadcasting stations should be relieved of liability for slander and libel for the time bought for the express purpose of the expression of political and social opinions; and
- 3 That the entire concept that all radio stations are obliged to present a balanced presentation of the news should be eliminated.

I might comment a little bit on the obligation of radio stations to present a balanced presentation of the news and fair comment. First of all, the presentation of the news by the existing networks is neither balanced nor fair, but, even assuming that it were, the obligation of radio stations and television stations to present fair comment would not be any more justified than to impose a similar obligation upon our daily newspaper press since the daily newspaper press is far less competitive and much more monopolistic than the broadcasting industry.

As a further illustration of the type of unjust oppression which occurs in the United States in repression of free speech was the hounding of the Reverend Dr. Carl McIntyre off the air on WUXR in Media, Pennsylvania. I realize Dr. McIntyre's religious, and political, and social views are offensive to many people. But the same can be said for a lot of the views, sex shows, soap operas, and contest shows on the television networks and stations which are highly offensive and certainly often of very little cultural value. Dr. McIntyre's monopoly of one station should be balanced by the fact that there are other stations in the metropolitan Philadelphia area which present different points of view. What you have done in this particular case is to hound a particular individual off because he was unpopular whereas you let other views which are offensive to many segments of the community, and just as much so as Dr. McIntyre's views, continue their broadcasting because their offensive views happen to be in accord with the particular prejudices and biases of the Federal Communications Commission, the broadcasting industry, and, I am afraid I must say, a majority of Congress and the Executive administration of the federal government.

But this is only to demonstrate that we do not have free speech in the United States.

I believe I have expressed my views at sufficient length, and I am looking for your leadership in reform of the grievous threat to our free speech and to the corruption of our democratic political institutions.

We certainly hope that Mr. Holder will change his mind and support the President in Kansas City, but because the Kentucky Republican Party adopted a rule of proportional representation, based on the primary results, our opponent has a near equal share of Kentucky's 37 delegates.

The President appreciates your taking the time to write to him directly, and thanks you for your personal support of his candidacy. He is confident that November 2 will be a banner day for Republicans from the courthouse to the White House.
