FORD'S ELECTION IMPACT

President Ford expended a great deal of energy campaigning for Republican candidates across the country, but the results of the Nov. 5 election showed his efforts had little effect on their fortunes.

The President's campaign itinerary after Labor Day took him into 20 states on behalf of 33 Republicans running for House and Senate seats and governorships, according to the White House log. Of those candidates, there were five Senate winners, two governors and no House winners—although political observers discounted Ford's influence in most of those races. (*Ford schedule, Weekly Report p. 2968*)

One Senate race in which the President's appearance might have been important, it was thought, was the one between incumbent Republican Robert Dole of Kansas and his Democratic challenger, Rep. William R. Roy. Early predictions favored Roy, but Dole squeaked by with 51 per cent. Other winning senators Ford campaigned for were Republican incumbents Richard S. Schweiker (Pa.), Henry Bellmon (Okla.) and Robert W. Packwood (Ore.), and Jake Garn (R), who defeated Rep. Wayne Owens (D) in Utah.

There were no House victories in which Ford could claim an obvious influence. Many of the candidates he campaigned for appeared doomed from early in their races.

A particularly painful loss to Ford was the defeat of Republican Paul G. Goebel Jr., running in Michigan's 5th District, which Ford represented for 25 years. The winner was Democrat Richard F. Vander Veen, who had won a special election in February to fill Ford's seat.

"A lot of his good friends lost," said Ford's press secretary, Ron Nessen, after the election. Among those friends were at least three House incumbents Ford campaigned for—Stanford E. Parris (Va.), Robert B. (Bob) Mathias (Calif.) and Wiley Mayne (Iowa)—all defeated by Democrats.

Two of the governors Ford stumped for won close races. His impact was discounted in the case of Governor-elect James J. Rhodes (R Ohio), who passed up an appearance with Ford in Cleveland to attend a fund-raiser in another part of the state. Ford may have helped incumbent Gov. William G. Milliken of Michigan win re-election, state observers said.

The President warned repeatedly in his campaign appearances that election of too many Democrats would result in a runaway, "veto-proof" Congress. The House party split came out at 291-144—giving the Democrats the necessary two-thirds to override vetoes if they all stuck together, which was considered unlikely. In the Senate, the breakdown was expected to be 61-39, short of a two-thirds margin for Democrats.

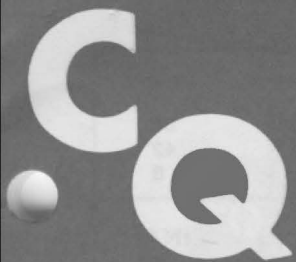

PURPOSE

Informal, wide-ranging discussion of the state of the Party, with emphasis on rebuilding efforts in the Southern States and prospects for the 1976 elections.

BACKGROUND, PARTICIPANTS & PRESS PLAN

- (a) Background: Several times a year, the four regional state chairmen's associations meet in Washington or their own areas. This is one such group, probably the most vocal, and one such meeting. Originally, the Southern State Chairmen invited the President to meet with them to review the '74 outcome and look ahead to '76. I suggested instead an informal session here in a relaxed atmosphere (drinks will be offered). The Southern State Chairmen represent, of course, a predominantly conservative influence within the Party.

ELECTION RESULTS IN THE SOUTHERN STATES

- (a) Governorships: We dropped one and picked up one. In Tennessee, retiring Republican Winfield Dunn was replaced by Democrat Ray Blanton. In South Carolina, Republican Jim Edwards was elected to replace retiring Democrat John West. Otherwise, Democratic incumbents and/or candidates were elected in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Oklahoma, and Texas. We have only two incumbent Republican Governors in the South, Holshauser (North Carolina) and Godwin (Virginia). No net change.
- (b) Senate Seats: We dropped both incumbent seats up for election, Marlow Cook in Kentucky and the Ed Gurney open-seat in Florida. Loss of two.
- (c) House Seats: In Alabama, we held all three Republican seats. In Arkansas, we held our one seat. In Florida, we picked up the Gunter open-seat and held our other four. In Georgia, we lost our only incumbent seat and thus were wiped out. In Kentucky, we held both our incumbent seats. In Louisiana, we held our one incumbent seat and may have picked up the former Rarick seat (Henson Moore leads by 14 votes). In Mississippi, we held both our incumbent seats. In North Carolina, we held two seats and lost two others (Mizell and Ruth). In Oklahoma, we lost our only seat (Camp). In South Carolina, we held one seat, lost one (Young), and were unsuccessful in two open races.

- (c) House Seats (continued): In Tennessee, we held three of our seats but lost two others (Baker and Kuykendall). In Texas, we held three seats and lost one (Price). In Virginia, we held five of our incumbent seats and lost two others (Parris and Broyhill). The net loss was either 8 or 9, depending on the Louisiana outcome.
