-- The programs we proposed for FY 1976 (\$2,290 million) and FY 1977 (\$1,840 million) are adequate to meet Israel's needs for U. S. assistance to manage its security and economic problems through all eight quarters of calendar years 1976 and 1977. Therefore, the U. S. does not need to provide additional "transitional" quarter assistance to Israel.

-- Although the President would like to be able to do more for our allies and friends, he is convinced that the total level of funds already requested in FY 1976 are adequate to meet the requirements of the recipients without placing unacceptable strains on our budget in a period of austerity at home. In view of pressing and unmet needs in other areas of the budget, such an increase in funding for FMS and supporting assistance in the transition quarter is not warranted.

-- Both the House Appropriations Committee and the House Budget Committee concur in the adequacy of our current funding proposals without adding money for the transition quarter.

-- If the bill is vetoed and we operate under the continuing resolution, which the President signed April 1, and which extends through September 30, aid to Israel and Egypt will be cut to less than one-third that provided in the bill passed by the House, i. e., instead of the \$2.2 billion for Israel in the House bill, Israel could receive only approximately \$600 million under the continuing resolution.

Dear Colleague:

Quinn
We are soliciting your support for the position of the House conferees on H.R. 12203, the foreign aid appropriations bill. The Senate would bust the budget with nearly \$800 million in foreign aid programs for the Middle East and we are recommending that the House keep within the levels in the House-passed bill, which provides for the essential needs of all Middle East countries with due regard for our own budgetary restraints. We are convinced that the House levels fully meet Israel's security and economic needs.

Let's look at what you are faced with. H.R. 12203, without the budget-busting money, is a \$5.6 billion foreign aid spending bill for FY 1976. It includes a \$2.2 billion foreign aid program for Israel and almost \$700 million for Egypt. Jordan is scheduled to receive over \$200 million, and Syria \$80 million. No doubt pressures on many of you to support the FY 1976 foreign aid bill are great.

Within a few weeks you will be asked by these same groups to vote for the FY 1977 foreign aid bill. The budget estimate for this FY 1977 foreign aid bill is over \$5.2 billion. This bill will include a \$1.8 billion foreign aid program for Israel, a \$750 million program for Egypt, over \$200 million for Jordan, and \$90 million for Syria.

Let's add it up. Your votes are already being solicited for a total of \$10.8 billion for foreign aid for FY 1976 and FY 1977. Now, in addition, some groups are asking you to vote for the Senate version which adds almost \$800 million in unrequested programs for these Middle East countries which are already scheduled to receive the lion's share of foreign aid: Israel, over \$4 billion; Egypt, almost \$1.5 billion; Jordan, over \$400 million; and Syria, almost \$200 million.

Enough is enough! The President has stated that the additional money is not justified, either in Israel, or in the Arab countries. The argument that there is a gap in our foreign aid programs for the Middle East in the transition quarter is unfounded: the FY 1976 and FY 1977 programs fully fund CY 1976 and CY 1977 programs in these four countries. The President will veto the 1976 foreign aid bill, and we, the Congress, will be accused again of busting the budget, this time on foreign aid.

Let us make one final point. We need a bill the President can sign, because, on a continuing resolution, the key programs for Israel and Egypt are cut to less than one-third of the level in the bill. This is clearly not enough, and, after a veto is sustained, we will have to vote a foreign aid bill at a level the President will sign, but only after the Congress has voted to bust the budget.

Let's exercise a little common sense, and vote to sustain the House position.

Reasons to support Chairman Passman on motions to insist on House position on amendments Nos. 36, 37, 52, and 53 on H.R. 12203 Conference Report.

Vote expected Tuesday, April 13.

1. The President strongly opposes Senate action adding nearly \$800 million in program terms (\$623 million in appropriated funds) to his budget request for foreign military sales credits and security supporting assistance for the transition quarter. If these funds are included, the President will veto the bill.
2. Security assistance levels requested for FY 1976 are adequate to cover the transition quarter. This determination was made after rigorous study and analysis designed to arrive at a balanced, adequate program sufficient for the essential needs of our friends in the Middle East.
3. We firmly believe the programs we proposed for FY 1976 (\$2,290 million) and FY 1977 (\$1,840 million) are adequate to meet Israel's needs for assistance from the United States for all eight quarters of calendar years 1976 and 1977 in order to manage the security and economic problems facing Israel. Therefore, the U.S. does not need to provide additional, "transitional" quarter assistance to Israel.
4. If the bill is vetoed and we operate under the continuing resolution, which the President signed April 1, and which extends through September 30, aid to Israel and Egypt will be cut to less than one-third that provided in the bill passed by the House, i.e., instead of the \$2.2 billion for Israel in the House bill, Israel could receive only approximately \$600 million under the continuing resolution.

REASONS TO OPPOSE THE CONFERENCE REPORT ON S. 2662

1. This legislation contains an unprecedented web of restrictions on the Administration's ability to carry out our security assistance programs. While the President supports a greater congressional role in U.S. foreign policy, there must be a line drawn on congressional encroachment on his Constitutional authority to implement that policy.

2. The recent past has demonstrated how congressional interference in foreign policy can be counter-productive (e.g. the effect of the Jackson-Vanik amendment on emigration from the Soviet Union) or damaging to our bilateral relationships with key countries (e.g. the Turkish arms embargo, the Jordan HAWK sale).

3. The bill contains the following provisions whereby the Congress can block or terminate actions proposed or taken by the Administration through concurrent resolution:

- FMS sales of over \$25 million (in current act).
- FMS or commercial sales of major defense equipment over \$7.0 million.
- Military assistance for a country which Congress determines to be in violation of internationally recognized human rights.
- Transfers to third countries of defense articles provided under this and prior foreign assistance legislation.
- Military assistance for a country which the Congress finds has violated any condition of the assistance.

Such provisions not only raise serious constitutional questions but also create a situation in which the President's ability to implement American foreign policy can be arbitrarily obstructed causing severe damage to United States' credibility.

4. The bill would place a \$9 billion annual ceiling on U.S. arms transfers. Such a provision represents an unprecedented restriction on the United States' ability to respond to the legitimate security requests of our friends and allies. Furthermore, it would create great uncertainties for U.S. businesses, perhaps ultimately forcing them to forego exports or transfer business over to third country affiliates.



5. This legislation expands the scope of the Nelson-Bingham amendment to include FMS or commercial sales of major defense equipment over \$7 million. Without addressing the questionable constitutionality of the congressional veto, we have seen over the past year how acrimonious Congressional debate of arms sales under the Nelson-Bingham procedures can poison the atmosphere of our relations with important friends and allies, even if a sale is ultimately approved. With the expanded authority provided by the new legislation, nearly every significant arms sale will be subject to this kind of harmful initiative.

Such expansion of existing statute is unnecessary. The Administration has consulted extensively with the Congress on arms sale policies and has tried to keep members informed, to the extent practicable, of all major military sales, as extensive consultations on the C-130 sale to Egypt demonstrated. The President is committed to continue this policy of consultation and cooperation with Congress.

6. While the intent and ultimate purpose of the human rights provisions in this bill are supported by the Administration, it must be questioned whether legislation is the best way to achieve our human rights objectives and whether the entire U.S. relationship with another country can wisely be based upon one single issue, particularly one which is so subject to emotional judgment.

Further, the process by which Congress requests and then considers reports on the human rights situation in a particular country to ascertain whether assistance should be terminated will create periods of great uncertainty which alone will be harmful to our relations with important allies. Even an eventual decision not to restrict arms sales will do little to lessen the damage we can expect in our relations with countries important to our national security.

7. In a similar vein, the anti-discrimination provisions could not only prove counter-productive but are also unnecessary. The Administration is strongly opposed to any policies of a foreign government which discriminates against U.S. citizens. The President has stated this publicly and, last November, issued an Executive Order setting forth his policy directives in this regard. It is far preferable to wait and assess the impact of these efforts before imposing restrictive legislation.

The United States cannot hope to eliminate discrimination or any other domestic policy of a foreign government through legislative fiat. Such an approach can only make our overall efforts to seek modification of such policies far more difficult.

8. The legislation provides for the termination of Grant MAP and MAAGs after FY 77 unless specifically authorized by the Congress. The MAP program is an extremely important part of our overall security assistance program. It has served the national security interest of the United States by enhancing the stability and strengthening our bilateral relationships with key countries around the world.

The Administration has attempted to reduce grant assistance in countries which have proven they can assume a greater share of their security burden. Nevertheless, the continued availability of an acceptable amount of MAP is critical to our ability to provide needed military assistance to poorer countries, and provides us with a valuable quid in retaining important base rights world-wide.

9. The elimination of MAAGs is self-defeating. They provide the kind of control over FMS administration and third-country transfers which Congress increasingly demands. MAAGs are also invaluable in establishing good military liaison with and providing expert military advice to the country to which they are assigned.

10. The legislation terminates for 180 days the President's authority to restrict trade with North and South Vietnam, thus removing an important element of negotiation for an accounting for our MIAs.

11. The bill contains a myriad of reporting requirements which are sure to cause an unnecessary bureaucratic nightmare to prepare and for the most part will go unread.

Arms Export Control Act of 1976

- 1) Congressional power by concurrent resolution:
 - a) To block an FMS sale of over \$25 million (in current act).
 - b) To block commercial sale of defense articles over \$25 million.
 - c) To block an FMS or commercial sale of major defense equipment over \$7.0 million.
 - d) To terminate or restrict military assistance for a country which Congress determines to be in violation of internationally recognized human rights.
 - e) To disapprove transfer to third countries of defense articles provided under this and prior foreign assistance legislation.
 - f) To terminate military assistance for a country which the Congress finds has violated any condition of the assistance.
- 2) Detailed mechanism for annual general reports and for country reports on human rights practices of recipient countries, on the basis of which Congress may terminate or restrict assistance.
- 3) \$9.0 billion arms sales ceiling.
- 4) Restrictions imposed to impact on civil rights practices of foreign governments, including lack of flexibility by reason of too restrictive waiver authority.
- 5) Termination of grant MAP and MAAGs unless specifically authorized by Congress.

SECURITY ASSISTANCE BILL H.R. 11963

-- This is a \$3.5 billion Authorization Bill for FY 1976 primarily for the Middle East. It authorizes the funds needed to implement the Sinai Accord and to sustain momentum in Middle East peace negotiations which are now entering a difficult and critical period with respect to several important remaining issues on which we hope to make progress during 1976.

-- Of the \$3.5 billion, \$2.6 billion (70%) is for the Middle East, primarily Israel.

-- Supporting Assistance is authorized for Israel (\$755 million), Egypt (\$750 million), Greece (\$90 million), Jordan, Syria, Portugal and Zaire are also authorized assistance.

-- The Bill does not contain any authorization for military aid for Egypt or Syria. Israeli military aid is authorized at \$1.5 billion for FY 1976.

-- The balance in amounts between the Middle East countries is very delicate. The Authorization Bill reflects this balance and we understand that the Appropriation Bill will also. We strongly oppose any amendments which would alter this balance.

-- At the same time, the Administration has reservations regarding some provisions of the Bill. The Grant (MAP) Program has been reduced by more than 20% from the Administration's request to \$324 million. Such a reduction will create strains in our relationship with a number of allies.

-- There are also policy provisions to which we object, such as the annual ceiling on arms sales, legislative veto by concurrent resolution, a counter productive human rights program, the lifting restrictions on Vietnam and excessive reporting requirements.

-- These complex issues do not lend themselves easily to resolution in floor debate. We therefore favor passage of the bill in the hope that there will be further improvement in conference.

SECURITY ASSISTANCE BILL H. R. 11963

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-- The Bill does not contain any authorization for military aid for Egypt or Syria. Israeli military aid is authorized at \$1.5 billion for FY 1976.

-- The balance in amounts between the Middle East countries is carefully formulated to support our peace efforts. The Authorization Bill reflects this balance and we understand that the Appropriation Bill will also. We strongly oppose any amendments which would alter this balance.

-- At the same time, the Administration has reservations regarding some provisions of the Bill. The Grant (MAP) Program has been reduced by more than 20% from the Administration's request to \$324 million. Such a reduction will create strains in our relationship with a number of allies.

-- There are also policy provisions to which we object, such as the annual ceiling on arms sales, legislative veto by concurrent resolution, a counterproductive human rights provision, the lifting of trade and travel restrictions on Vietnam and excessive reporting requirements.

-- These complex issues do not lend themselves easily to resolution in floor debate. We therefore favor passage of this important bill, without additional restrictive amendments, in the hope that there will be further improvements in conference to produce an acceptable bill.

ADMINISTRATION POSITION ON S. 3439 AND H. R. 13680

HUMAN RIGHTS

In contrast to the vetoed bill, S. 3439 substitutes a policy statement for the outright prohibition of assistance to countries engaged in human rights violations and substitutes passage of a joint resolution to terminate assistance for the concurrent resolution procedure. The House bill retains provision for termination of assistance by concurrent resolution.

Administration Position

① The House version is constitutionally objectionable and the legislation will be vetoed if this provision is in the final bill. In respect to the Senate version, while a joint resolution meets the constitutional objections, the imposition of any sanctions against a sovereign nation as proposed is an awkward and ineffective device to promote human rights abroad which can often prove counterproductive. Nevertheless, the Administration will accept the Senate provision.

NUCLEAR TRANSFERS

S. 3439 contains a Symington amendment to prohibit assistance (except PL-480 disaster relief) to countries supplying or receiving nuclear fuel reprocessing or enrichment materials -- unless managed by multilateral controls "when available" and under IAEA auspices. There is no comparable House provision. *House may adopt similar provision*

Administration Position

The Administration opposes this provision and supports its deletion from the bill. Such a sweeping provision represents another attempt to impose a single criterion for the termination of U. S. assistance regardless of other important policy considerations. Moreover, it assumes that any country which meets the two conditions -- subscription to IAEA safeguards and multilateral control -- is acceptable to us as a recipient of reprocessing facilities.

\$9.0 BILLION CEILING

The House bill retains a \$9.0 billion annual ceiling on arms sales. There is no comparable Senate provision.

Administration Position

② The Administration strongly opposes the House provision and strongly supports its deletion. This arbitrary, self-imposed ceiling would be an impediment to our efforts to obtain the cooperation of other arms-supplying nations in negotiating mutual restraints in conventional weapons proliferation. Moreover, it would require that individual transactions be evaluated, not on their own merits, but on the basis of their relationship to the volume of other, unrelated sales.

DISCRIMINATION

The Senate bill substitutes a requirement for a Presidential report within 60 days and passage of a joint resolution to terminate a specific transaction in instances of discrimination for the automatic termination contained in the vetoed bill. The House bill retains a statement of policy but has dropped the sanctions entirely.

Administration Position

The Administration strongly opposes the Senate version. It prefers and can accept the House version. The Administration opposes the basic premise of the Senate provision -- that is, the U.S. Congress through threat of sanctions, can change the domestic policies of sovereign foreign governments. As we have seen in the recent past, such provisions more often prove counterproductive.

KOREA FUNDING LEVELS

③ The House bill contains a Fraser amendment limiting military assistance to Korea to a total of \$290 million for the period FY 76-TO-FY 77 (in comparison to a budget request of \$490 million) and economic assistance to \$175.0 million (versus an overall request of \$281.0 million). There is no comparable Senate provision; however, an amendment is anticipated on the Senate floor.

Administration Position

The Administration strongly opposes the Fraser amendment and the legislation will be vetoed if it is not deleted. Cuts of this magnitude would

have a serious adverse effect on all of our Korean programs. It would impede the progress of the Korean force modernization plan and adversely affect U. S. farm exports to that country.

REVIEW OF MILITARY SALES

The Senate bill expands the scope of the 1974 Nelson-Bingham amendment, whereby Congress can disapprove FMS sales over \$25 million by concurrent resolution, to include all FMS and commercial sales of "major defense equipment" over \$7.0 million. The House bill extends coverage only to FMS sales of such equipment over \$7.0 million.

Administration Position

The Administration opposes any expansion of the existing Nelson-Bingham provision, particularly the extension to cover commercial sales.

ASSISTANCE TO CHILE

The Senate bill contains a Kennedy amendment to impose a total embargo on military assistance or sales to Chile after October 1, 1976. The House bill contains a Buchanan amendment to terminate military assistance but to permit cash sales. The House bill further contains a Fraser amendment to limit economic assistance to Chile to \$25 million in the TQ and FY 77.

Administration Position

The Administration prefers the House version which, while terminating any U. S. assistance in purchasing military equipment, would permit cash sales, particularly of spare parts for U. S. equipment already in that country. Furthermore, the Administration strongly opposes the ceiling on economic assistance and supports deletion of the Fraser amendment. Depriving the Chilean people of urgently needed economic assistance will contribute little to the enhancement of human rights in that country.

FUNDING LEVELS

Both the House and Senate bills adopted unchanged the funding levels for FY 76 and the TQ contained in the conference report on S. 2662. For FY 77, the House bill contains the funding levels requested by the President; however, the Senate bill makes cuts in MAP, FMS and the security supporting assistance levels.

Administration Position

The Administration seriously regrets the deep cuts in our MAP program for FY 76 made in both House and Senate bills. In respect to FY 77 it urges support for the House levels which are consistent with the President's budget requests. One exception: the Administration supports Senate deletion of funds for Greece and Turkey, since assistance for these countries should be separately authorized by the bilateral base agreements.

NUCLEAR TRANSFERS (~~SYMINGTON~~ AMENDMENT): This amendment to the Senate bill would reduce the President's ability to respond flexibly to foreign policy problems. It overlooks the possibly adverse consequences of an automatic aid cut-off, as well as certain potential safeguards outside the multinational and IAEA framework. It requires a punitive U.S. posture that could discourage cooperation by other nations, and at the same time fails to account for the economic justification for nuclear transfers and prior political commitments such as the NPT. The amendment does not address the problem posed by countries that develop unsafeguarded facilities without outside help.
