
It would be a great privilege for Lisa to be able to come to Washington to meet President Ford, and it would be appreciated if the President's schedule could be so arranged in the near future.

This is to strongly recommend reconsideration and approval of the schedule proposal for Rep. Bill Young to introduce Miss Lisa Lyons, Miss National Teenager to the President.

Rep. Young is extremely disturbed that the White House has not been cooperative in his requests. He has expressed his disgust and that of his colleagues to me personally. You will note that the Pageant Director went to Senator Talmadge because this request of Rep. Young was not approved. Senator Talmadge has made a similar request.

If you want to stop this as an annual meeting with the President, I strongly suggest that it not be done this year. We owe a cooperative effort to get Rep. Young off the hook on this because of the precedent. After the meeting with the President this year the Pageant Director should be advised that this will not be an annual event and should not be so billed. This would satisfy Rep. Young and take us all off the hook from a similar Congressional request for the winner this year.



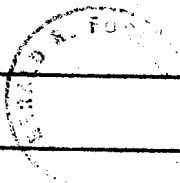

Vern Loen:

Nancy Kennedy suggested that you review the attached schedule proposal (which had been pulled and put in inactive file) to determine if you wish to resubmit it. *Bill Young says YES TO RESUBMIT.*

The reason for this question is that Senator Talmadge wrote to the President on behalf of the sponsor of the Pageant to see if arrangements could be made to bring in Miss National Teenager, Lisa Lyon, who is a resident of Cong. Young's former District.

Apparently the hdqtrs of the Pageant are in Atlanta. However, and I quote the following from Mrs. Shaffer's letter:

"Unfortunately, the Florida group has not been able to do too much and we are left floundering. I have contacted Congressman C. W. Bill Young and President Ford's personal attorney, Bill Cramer of New Port Richey, Florida, which is Lisa's home."

If a new proposal is put in on behalf of Mr. Young -- we will just tell the Senator that there has been a request pending but the President's schedule is such that we have not been able to confirm anything to Mr. Young.


I recently received the enclosed letter and brochures from Ms. Sybil Shaffer, National Director of the Miss National Teen-Ager Pageant.



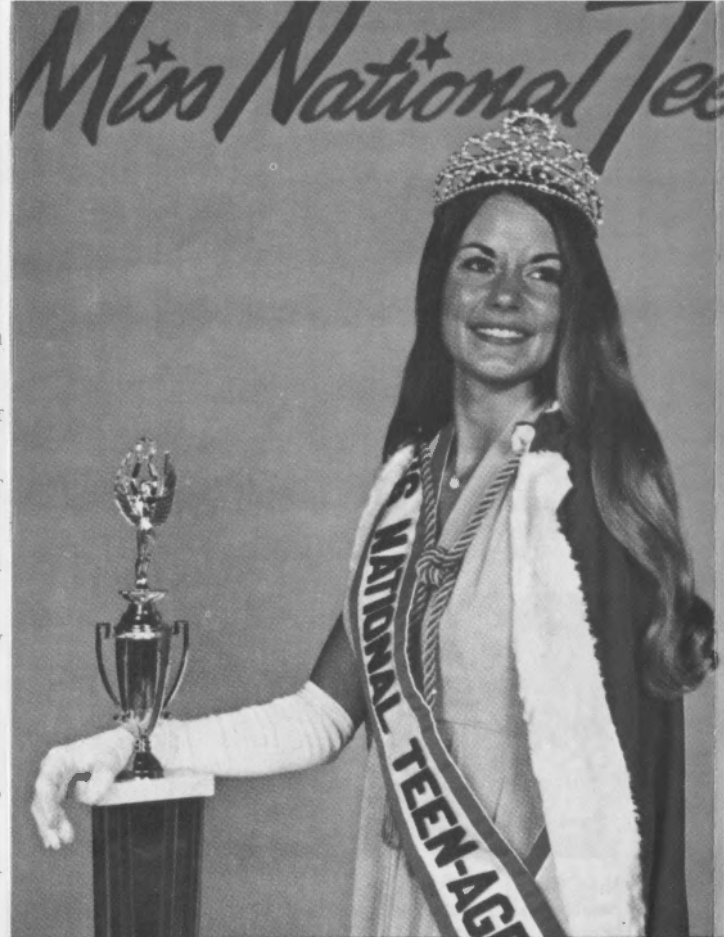

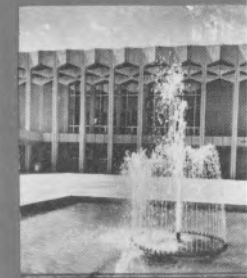

Miss Teen-Ager Visits Here

If Sharon McLarty ever begins to feel worthless, she can always recall one person who thought she was worth 400 camels.

She can also be thankful her 15-year-old brother thought she was worth even more than that because he declined the offer.

The pair was touring the Middle East, a trip Sharon won along with the Miss National Teen-Ager Crown in 1972, when the unexpected offer came.

"My brother and I love each other, but when I found out a camel was worth \$900, I felt a little insecure," she jested.

Travel is the biggest prize of the pageant.

"The traveling is an education in itself," said Sharon, a little over a month after she traded in her crown for a red, white and blue Six Flags Over Georgia hat.

The hat is a part of her new job — recruiting specialist and special event coordinator for the hosts and hostesses at the

amusement center — which emphasizes traveling.

"Once you start traveling, it's hard to stop," said the 18-year-old beauty queen.

She is touring college campuses to drum up interest in the hosting jobs at Six Flags. Anyone 16 or older is eligible for the summer jobs, but she is working to get the average age up to about 19 or 20.

Once she rounds up the crew, it will be her responsibility to see they have fun while they work.

Raft trips, dances, informal get-togethers will be planned for the summer workers.

During her reign as Miss National Teen-ager, she traveled over 100,000 miles, encountering several confidence-building situations, such as a private interview with President Nixon.

"He made me feel like I'd lived there all my life," the bubbly brunette said.

She gave him her speech, "What's Right With America," a requirement of the pageant.

"What's right about America?" she asks at the end of her speech "L-O-V-E. Love is the abiding force of America."

"Sure, there is some hate," she added informally during the interview, "but there's a lot of love." She even found love on a television give-away show.

In May Sharon was a guest on "The Dating Game" and won a 17-day cruise to Italy, Spain, France and North Africa with a law student.

"Daddy!" cried Betty Nightingale. She could control herself no longer.

"Dad!" she called again, for there was nothing else to say that September night when she was crowned the second Miss National Teenager.

Leading the pack of photographers who rushed to Atlanta's Civic Auditorium's forestage was one more proud than professional. He was Betty's father, of course.

The majority of the 51 girls in the pageant (one from each state and the District of Columbia) had a combination of qualities that seem to be representative of average, American youth.

Each contestant was endearingly grateful for what she had — a good education, a healthy and attractive body and a "great family" (as one after another told the judges).

Yet, each wanted something more — a chance to grow, develop, achieve and really LIVE.

That's the way it is with Betty. Her family runs a potato farm near Fort Fairfield, Maine, a business she helps with when she is not in school. She loves her life there and constantly referred to it during her stay in Atlanta.

Yet, it had always been important to her to keep developing her majorette, modeling and dramatic abilities, and now these things had changed her life.

There were television appearances, greetings and praises of family and friends when she arrived back home in her prize-award red Pinto, a motorcade that included a representative from the governor and the family priest and her senior year to be finished off at double speed in order for her to be able to spend next spring traveling around the United States and abroad.

Betty's life would definitely never be the same again.

"You grow up over night," says Mississippi's Sharon McLarty after her first year as the first Miss National Teenager.

Although she had poise and personality a year ago, there was a multitude of experiences during her reign that moved her closer to maturity. She had traveled, spoken before large gatherings, and she had met the President.

Sharon's parents praised the contest. Her father, I.W. McLarty, an agronomy specialist from Amory, Miss., said, "This last year has contributed more to her development and education than any other year." He has seen his daughter visit more foreign countries than he would have dreamed possible.

To Betty's father, the most obvious boon from the contest would be that his daughter would now be able to attend college as she would not have been able to do otherwise.

To the contestants who didn't win, there were other benefits. There was the chance to concentrate on "What's Right About America," the essay that each girl was asked to
