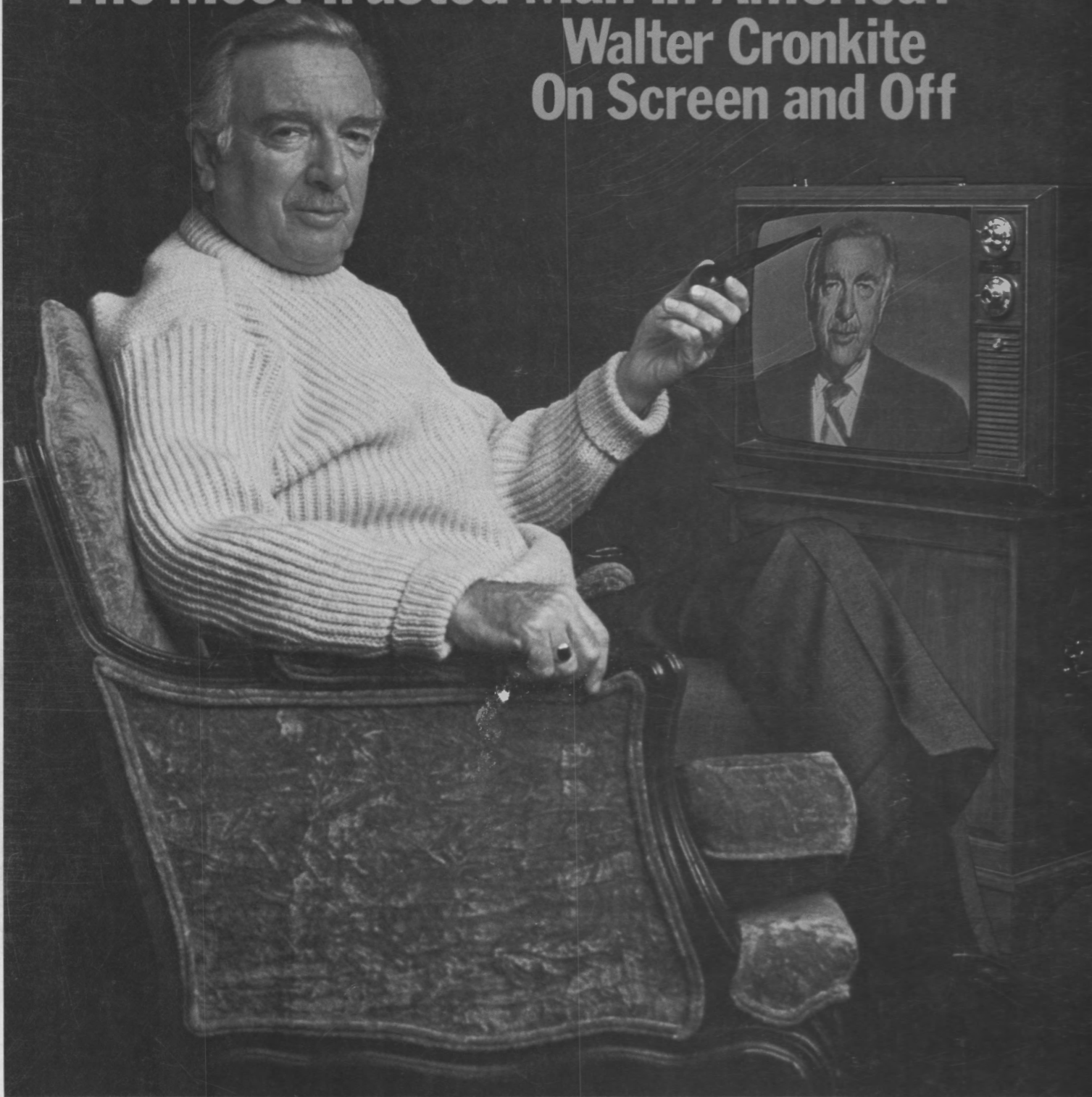

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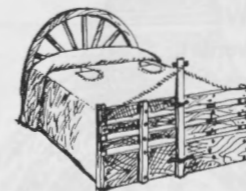

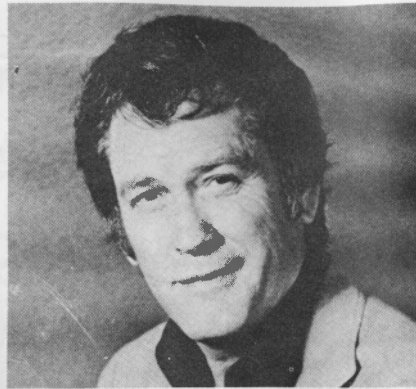
TV Police Woman series will be riding in classic cars. There will be two Rolls Royce Silver Ghost touring cars. It is rare to have two Silver Ghosts in the same state at the same time, not to mention the same city and the same parade. The 1939 4-door Packard touring car, with right hand drive was especially built for Juan and Evita Peron as their parade car.

Boysville residents, dressed in overalls and wearing felt and straw hats, will be pulling an old fashioned out-house to depict their entry, "Hillbilly Heaven".

There is also a float with seven live beautiful german shepherd dogs on it, sponsored by the German Shepherd Dog Club of San Antonio, Inc.

A total of 7,283 persons will be actually riding or walking in the parade. There are 30 vanguard units, 46 vehicles, 45 floats, 131 marching units, 18 banners, 50 bands, 5 pep squads, 4 special military marching units, 18 groups entered in the Amusement section, the super scoopers, and cavalades composed of 200 horses and 5 mules.

Since the original procession of horse-drawn carriages decorated with fresh flowers in 1891, this parade has grown to one of spectacular propor-

tion, with an estimated 400,000 viewers. The 400 member Battle of Flowers Association is the only all woman volunteer organization to present a parade every year.

Preceded by the vanguard at 12:20, the parade will start at Newell and Broadway streets at 1:30 p.m.

What's happening in the Trinity University drama department?

It's . . . "What's Happening?" It's show business, after all. But not as usual.

"What's Happening?"—a lively, variegated package of six shows playing in rotating repertory April 7-10—is the Ruth Taylor Theater's 1976 Spring Happening. The annual gala, now in its seventh staging, wraps up for each student everything he's been absorbing throughout the year," notes drama department chairman Paul Baker.

"It's the students' show all the way," says Anne Britton, faculty coordinator of the 12 student directors, their production crews and more than 80 cast members.

This is Britton's fifth year of supervising the sprawling show. The Happening, she explains, gives under-

graduates a chance to "take over the reins," from faculty directors who stage major productions in Theater One and Attic Two, from seasoned Dallas Theater Center pros who bring their polished productions to Trinity. I don't know of another university drama department in the country that gives undergraduates an opportunity like this," Britton points out. She described this year's show as "a potpourri of mystery, nostalgia, comedy, drama and the musical theater."

David May and Mark Olsen, directors of Patrick Morasco's "Child's Play" in the main theater, call it intense drama about a demonic power taking possession of students in a parochial school."

"Jean Anouilh's "The Lark," also onstage in Theater One, explores events leading up to Joan of Arc's trial through flashbacks and glimpses of Joan the person, rather than the saint.

"Backstage," in Attic Two, "starts where Broadway's 'A Chorus Line' leaves off," according to directors Kenny Schmidt and Oma Morey.

"Creation and The Fall of Man," a contemporary treatment of the allegory of creation, uses the script of the medieval morality play.

"For Richer, For Richer" in the Cafe Theater revives an old radio show that featured Clark Gable and was voted Best Radio Script of 1939.

On the adjacent patio, "Seasoned With MacLeish" dramatizes cuttings from the earthy, warm poetry of Archibald MacLeish focusing on the four seasons of man's life. Choreography and music underscore the play's strong emotion and vivid characterizations.

General admission for "What's Happening?" is \$2.50. Reservations are suggested, since audiences will be limited for each performance.

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During the winter of 1778-79, General Israel Putnam and his men wintered near Redding Center, Connecticut. **Take The Time — Visit Del Rio**

Hankering for something different? Come to friendly, informal Del Rio—a green oasis amid the plains of the Edwards Plateau.

Tourist accommodations are modern, plentiful and reasonable.

In-town sightseeing should include Whitehead Memorial Museum, housed in a restored trading post; Val Verde Winery, operated since 1883 by the same Italian family; and beautiful magnolia-shaded homes situated along canals dug a century ago.

San Felipe Springs are the third largest in Texas and feed 90,000,000 gallons of pure water each day into San Felipe Creek. The creek winds through the municipal golf course.

Twelve miles upstream from Del Rio, mammoth Amistad Dam impounds some 67,000 surface acres of international waters, making Amistad Lake the third largest international man-made lake in the world.

On the U.S. shore, the National Park Service provides or administers beaches, marinas, campgrounds and nature walks. Films and slides are shown free to visitors at Park Service Headquarters.

Mexico's shore features a marina, a beach and playground, and an authentic replica of the Aztec raingod, Tlaloc.

Sailing, fishing, water-skiing, camping and archaeological sights attract about a million visitors each year. Tour boats, fishing boats, motors, licensed guides and fishing licenses are available at the marinas, long with supplies and refreshments. Behind the Dam, the Rio Grande is navigable up to 75 miles, the Devil's River up to 25 miles and the Pecos up to 14 miles.

To find a shopper's paradise, bright night life and the intriguing appeal of a foreign country, you need only to cross the International bridge to Ciudad Acuna, Mexico. Taxis are available, and many restaurants offer protected parking.

No passports are needed for American citizens visiting Ciudad Acuna, where most tradespeople speak English and U.S. currency may be used.

Admission is free, the public invited to join in the dialogue, and refreshments will be served.

Toward the end of the month, on April 25, there will be an evening showing of the Agatha Christie classic "Murder on the Orient Express." And on April 27 there will be an exhibition and sale of original graphics

from the Ferdinand Roten Galleries of Baltimore. Original works by Picasso, Miro, Matisse and others will be available, and at prices ranging from \$10 to \$100.

Paseo del Rio is a city park complete with walkways, foot bridges, tropical and native plants, trees and grasses plus shops and restaurants of all varieties. It is an intriguing place with a daytime and after dark scene to suit every taste.

Visitors and San Antonians alike acclaim the one and one-half mile barge ride as the highlight of any trip to the river. With accommodations for 40 adults, the round trip costs a mere \$1.00

For those inclined to walk along the river's shaded banks, there is much to see and all sorts of places to stop and browse. Included among the specialty shops and galleries down by the riverside are Riverside Coin Co., Kerr's Mexican Curios and La Sirena featuring antiques of the 17th to 19th centuries.

Diners along Paseo del Rio may enjoy a wide variety of foods. Those wishing to enjoy Mexican dishes may do so at Casa Rio, the first restaurant located on the river, or at La Paloma del Rio.

Something for everyone's taste can be found. Both patio and indoor dining is available for afternoon lunches and late night dinners. River Roost features Italian food, Little Rhein Steak House naturally specializes in fine steaks, The Kangaroo Court is San Antonio's only downtown seafood house. Ricardo's serves specialties from a well trained kitchen staff. And the 1836 Club & Restaurant features variety foods and entertainment.

For a touch of elegance, dine at the Fig Tree and for old-fashioned steaks and atmosphere visit The Stockman.

After dark, night-life lovers can find food, drink and live entertainment along Paseo del Rio. There is Club Mai Tai san, and Club B'wana Dik with an authentic African decor and the 1836 Club. The Landing is the original night spot on the river. Housed in the River Level of the Stockman Bldg. at Commerce St. Bridge, the Happy Jazz Band plays nightly except Sunday and Monday and the new Lewd Leopard features excellent piano bar entertainment nightly 'til 2 a.m.

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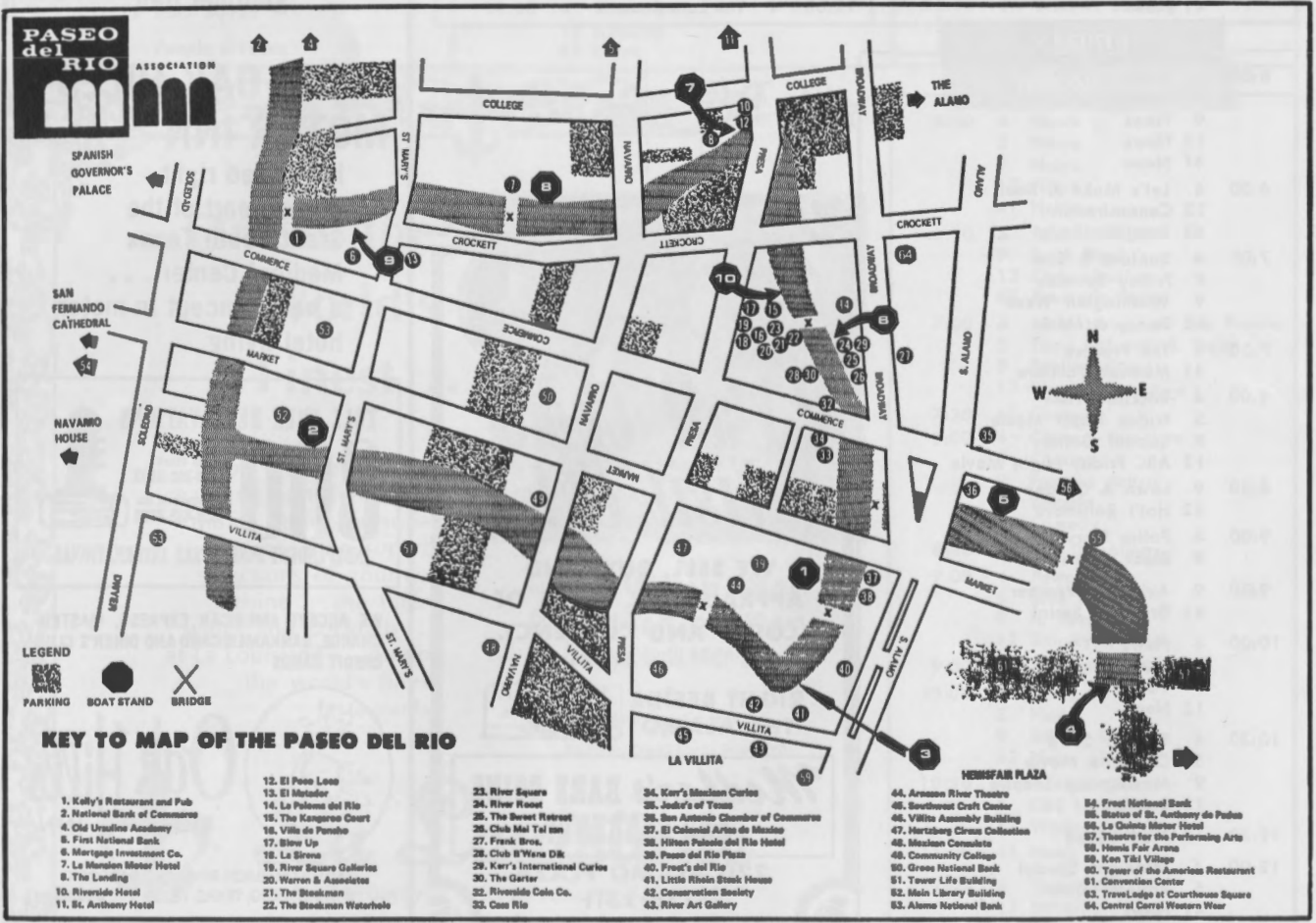
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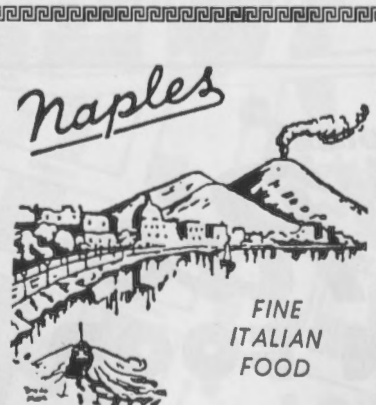

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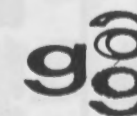
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## THE SIEGE AND BATTLE OF THE ALAMO

humiliating defeat, the tyrant Santa Anna and the first of his mighty troops entered San Antonio on February 23, 1836.

The defending Texans, under the command of William B. Travis and James Bowie, numbered only about 187 citizen-soldiers, as compared with Santa Anna's army of 5,000. Resolved to halt the Mexican general in his march on the colonies, the Texans took their stand behind the thick walls of the Alamo, then an abandoned mission. Santa Anna's defense-weakening siege of the Alamo began on February 23 when the Texans replied to his request for surrender with a cannon shot.

The siege lasted thirteen days, from February 23 to the morning of March 6 when the Mexican forces stormed over the walls of the old mission, and overwhelmed the stalwart defenders who, ammunition exhausted, resorted to hand-to-hand fighting with crude weapons. Each and every Alamo defender died fighting, including Bowie on his sick bed, and Davy Crockett at the post assigned him by Travis. All bodies were burned at Santa Anna's order. The only survivors were 16 women and children non-combatants. Mexican losses numbered almost 1,600.

The Alamo is administered by the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. (Open weekdays 9 to 5:30; Sundays 10 to 5:30. Closed December 24 and 25.) Admission free.

Before visiting the Alamo, we recommend a visit to a theatre opposite the Alamo. A 30 minute MultiVision presentation using 10 projectors on a 30 foot screen. This dramatic experience will bring into perspective all events and will make your visit to the shrine more meaningful.

"Remember the Alamo" is one of the most significant battle cries in the history of any nation. The story of the Alamo tells of much more than just a battle; it is a heroic epic of valor, sacrifice—and tragedy.

It began in 1836.

For several months, fierce skirmishes and battles had raged around San Antonio, where was centered Texas' fight for independence from Mexico—rather from the tyranny of the Mexican President-Dictator, General Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna. This was a fight whose cause was supported both in principle and in fact by conscientious Mexican patriots of all classes, as well as liberty-seeking Texans.

The scales of war were precariously balanced in favor of the Texans after an important victory over General Martin Perfecto de Cos, brother-in-law of Santa Anna, who was forced to surrender the Battle of Bexar (San Antonio) in December, 1835. Determined to revenge this

### MILITARY INSTALLATIONS

**BROOKS AFB**—The home of the Aerospace Medical Division, the US-AF School of Aerospace Medicine and Headquarters for the Air Force Human Resources Laboratory.

The School of Aerospace Medicine whose history dates from 1917 conducts research in biotechnology seeking ways to enhance man's capabilities and performance as part of a variety of Air Force systems.

**FORT SAM HOUSTON** — Home of the United States Army in San Antonio since 1870. Comprised of over 3,000 acres with some 1,500 buildings, it is the home of Headquarters Fifth US Army, Headquarters US Army Health Services Command, Academy of Health Sciences, US Army, Headquarters US Army Readiness Region VII, Brooke Army Medical Center, Headquarter, Fort Sam Houston, Headquarters US Army Fourth Recruiting District, and several smaller units. Located 10 minutes from downtown San Antonio, this "open" historic Army post is an outstanding tourist attraction the year round. Within the walls of the Fifth US Army Quadrangle, with its clock-tower in the center, deer, fowl, and other wild life lazily roam. Within this reservation, the US Modern Pentathlon contenders to national and international competition train. On this reservation, the birth of military aviation occurred on March 2, 1910.

**KELLY AIR FORCE BASE**—Established in 1917 during World War I, seven miles southwest of downtown San Antonio. It is the largest aircraft maintenance and supply depot

operated by the U.S. Air Force. Repaired here are such planes as the C-5 and B-52. Located at Kelly are the Headquarters of the San Antonio Air Materiel Area and USAF Security Service. Take Kelly Field bus.

**LACKLAND AIR FORCE BASE**—is the U.S. Air Force's largest training complex. A broad variety of programs — basic military training for male and female airmen, officer pre-commissioning trainees, technical and professional skills including marksmanship, combat security and even schooling of sentry dogs and their handlers for all the armed forces — support the aerospace mission. Among its "tenant" units are the Air Force's largest hospital, and an English language school for allied foreign military personnel. Take Lackland bus.

**RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE**—The show place of the Air Force—is located 3 miles east of the Austin Highway, 18 miles from downtown San Antonio. Dedicated in 1930, its unique design and picturesque Spanish architecture with its photogenic building, called the "Taj Mahal," have helped to make it world-famous as a training center.

Randolph is home of the 12th Flying Training Wing which is host to the Air Training Command Headquarters (ATC) and Air Force Military Personnel Center (MPC). The Air Force Recruiting Service of (ATC) recruits all Air Force personnel. The Air Force military personnel center promotes & reassigns the 700,000 personnel on active duty.

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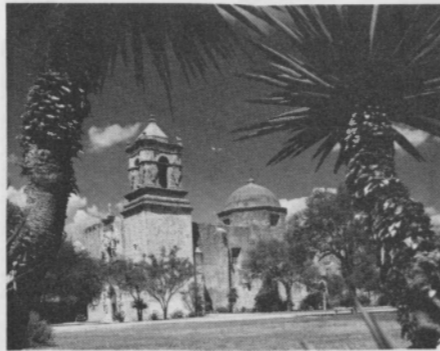

## THE OLD SPANISH MISSIONS



SAN JOSE . . . QUEEN OF THE MISSIONS

### MISSION SAN JOSE

Mission San Jose y San Miguel de Aguayo was founded on February 23, 1720, by Venerable Father Antonio Margil de Jesus. It was founded by the Order of Friars Minor, commonly known as Franciscans. San Jose is a beautiful example of Spain's endeavor to civilize and colonize the New World through the establishment of Missions. Known as "Queen of the Missions," Mission San Jose is now a state and national historic site. Admission: Adults, 50 cent; children 6 to 12, 15 cents. Open from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. April through September, and 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. October through March. One can spend several hours touring the buildings and displays and taking pictures. The outer wall includes restored Indian houses and a granary. A flour mill constructed in 1792 has also been restored. The church has a beautifully carved stone facade, and the sacristy contains the fabled "Rosa's window."

### MISSION CONCEPCION

Mission de Nuestra Senora de la Purisima Concepcion de Acuna was so named in honor of the Virgin and Juan de Acuna, Marquis de Casa. It is familiarly known as Mission Concepcion. Tradition has it that the corner stone was laid in March, 1731. It is located on the left bank of the San Antonio River, about two miles from downtown San Antonio.

The architecture is plain, though massive and imposing. Prominent are twin towers with a strong Moorish influence.

Open daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Admission: Adults, 35 cents; children, 15 cents.

### MISSION ESPADA

The small Mission, ecclesiastically styled the Mission San Francisco de la Espada, is on the San Antonio River about nine miles from the business district and was established at about the same time as the other Missions. It was named in honor of St. Francis of Assisi, the founder of the Monastic order of Franciscans. The tower has three arches and bells are hung in each. Three times each day they are heard by all in the vicinity. The door of the chapel is uniquely Moorish in character. Open daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Admission: Adults, 35 cents; children, 15 cents.

### MISSION SAN JUAN

Mission San Juan Capistrano, called Mission San Juan, is located on the right bank of the San Antonio River, six miles from the center of town.

Erected in 1731, this Mission differs from all others in the plainness and simplicity of its architecture.

Little remains to tell of its former greatness. In recent years the ruins of the church and monastery have been restored, but the walls and monks' quarters have yielded to the decaying hands of time. Open daily from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Admission: Adults, 35 cents; children, 15 cents.

## BRACKENRIDGE PARK

**BRACKENRIDGE PARK SKYRIDE**—There's something new in the San Antonio sky! It's the \$400,000 Brackenridge Park Skyride that takes passengers on a breathtaking ride that reaches heights of 92 feet above the magnificent Sunken Gardens. The round trip covers nearly one-half mile giving passengers a view of the beautiful San Antonio skyline . . . captivating Brackenridge Zoo . . . the gorgeous terrain of the Hill Country to the north of the city . . . and the campus of Trinity University including Alamo Stadium. The gondolas travel directly over the lush tropical growth of the lovely Sunken Gardens. (Take N. St. Mary's bus.)

**TEXAS RANGER MUSEUM** is located in the memorial building next door to Witte Museum in Brackenridge Park at 3800 Broadway. This Museum is dedicated to that "Special Breed" of men, The Texas Rangers. Unique in law enforcement annals as the only force ever to repel marauding indians, deal summary justice to bandits and other law-breakers, and bravely defend their beloved "Lone Star" soil in three wars. Relive this famed history thru the many courageous individuals who have served "THE RANGERS" in history and the near-past!

Review The Texas Rangers exciting history from their inception in 1823 . . . see the arms and other equipment of many famous Texas Rangers. Texas wouldn't be Texas without the Ranger tradition. Open Tue. thru Sat. 10-4, Sunday 1-5. Admission 25c, children under 12 free.

**WITTE MEMORIAL MUSEUM** in Brackenridge Park is one of the largest and most important museums in the south and southwest. It is dedicated to science, history, and art. The wide scope of its displays covers many subjects. The Geology of Texas, Texas Paleontology, American Indians, Archaeology, Latin American Cultures, the Fiesta Costumes, Texas History, Stamps and Coins, historic house restorations on the museum grounds, beautiful collection of oil and water color paintings, porcelain, glass, and the McFarlin Treasure Room. Not to be missed is the Lone Star Hall of Wildlife and Ecology highlighting five great areas of Texas. Open Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Small voluntary donation: 50c adults, 25c children, under 12. (Take Broadway bus.)

**CHINESE SUNKEN GARDENS**—Walks and rock bridges pass around and over the pools containing aquatic and semi-tropical flowers. Near the Gardens is the outdoor theatre patterned after the Creek open-air style.

**THE SAN ANTONIO ZOO** — 87 acres of exhibits, among the largest in the United States. Open every day of the year—during Daylight Saving Time from 9:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m., the rest of the year from 9:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Admission: 85 cents for adults seventeen and over; 15 cents for children from one year through sixteen; infants free. Since the site of the Zoo was originally a stone quarry most of the animals are kept in barless pits, closely resembling their natural habitat. The Hixon tropical bird house is new, and there is a reptile house and an aquarium, a penguin house and a monkey island. Weather permitting, during warm weather shows are given daily: elephants at 11, 2 and 4.

## Spanish Governor's Palace



This is the only remaining example in Texas of an aristocratic early Spanish home. Over the entrance, on the original keystone is carved the imperial double-headed eagle of the Hapsburg coat of arms and the date 1749. From the entrance hall is seen the gracefully winding stairway in the rear and a window overlooking the garden. The family chapel holds devotional relics—paintings of saints, images and a beautifully carved Virgin. The walls of the palace are of nearly three-foot thick adobe and the floor of native flagstone or tile. The palace is open weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sundays 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission: adults 35 cents; children under 14 years, 10 cents.

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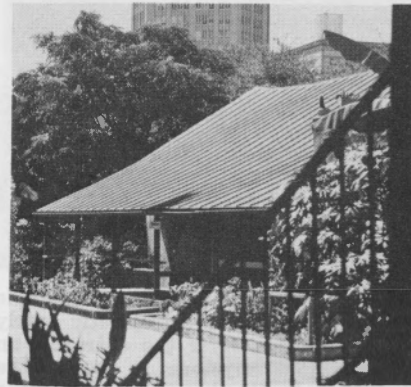

**LA VILLITA**

Villita (Little Town) is one of the oldest residential sections of this city and is typical of mid-18th Century Spanish settlements. It is open daily from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. There is no admission charge. Lush tropical plants like the banana and bougainvillea mingle within the walls of this quiet place. The La Villita enclosure consists of various art and craft shops, including a glass blower, weavers and ceramic shop. A number of Spanish-American houses, some with German trimmings, have been preserved there, including the Cos House, an ancient adobe, accurately restored. Here the surrender of Perfecto Martin de Cos, commander of the Mexican forces who were defeated by Texans in 1835, was signed.

## Welcome To YANAGUANA

That was the name of our town when Fr. Damion Massanet arrived here in 1691.

The Franciscan priest, traveling with a Spanish expedition, renamed the village and the river that ran through it to San Antonio de Padua because of the party's arrival here on the feast day of St. Anthony de Padua, June 13, 1691.

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## OTHER POINTS OF INTEREST

**BLACK MADONNA SHRINE**—The largest grotto in the world of four famous Madonnas—Our Lady of Czestochowa (Black Madonna), Our Lady of Fatima, Our Lady of Lourdes and Our Lady of Guadalupe. Built in a style of Polish Gothic, also museum to commemorate Poland's Christian Millennium 966-1966 A.D. located at 138 Beethoven Street off Rigsby. Open daily 10-5.

**ESPADA MISSION ACEQUIA AQUEDUCT**—9044 Espada Road, built 1731 by Franciscans, the five-mile acequia was once part of an integrated irrigation system serving San Antonio's five missions. In remarkable state of preservation, the 120-foot-long Spanish Aqueduct is the only still functioning structure of its kind remaining in the United States. National Historic Landmark. No admission charge.

**NAVARRO HOUSES** — 228 South Laredo Street (at Nueva Street). Limestone structures circa 1850. Home of Jose Antonio Navarro, famed Texas patriot and signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence. Main house is Texas Colonial Renaissance. Two-story store and office building is notable for quoin stones. Kitchen is typical Republic of Texas domestic architecture. Owned, restored and maintained by San Antonio Conservation Society. House museum open daily 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. No admission charge.


**STEVES HOMESTEAD**—509 King William Street—Museum of Victorian era. One of the finest examples of fashionable old German residences, circa 1876. Owned and maintained by San Antonio Conservation Society. Open daily 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. with special group tours available at other hours by appointment. Admission 75 cents adults; 25 cents children. Telephone 225-5924.

**OLD SAN ANTONIO EXHIBIT** — Bolivar Hall, La Villita. Life-size diaramas depicting colorful scenes from phases of Texas history. Authentic costumes and furnishings. Owned and maintained by San Antonio Conservation Society. Open daily 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Closed Mondays, Christmas and New Year's. No admission charge, donations appreciated.

**OLD URSULINE CONVENT** — 300 Augusta Street. San Antonio's only remaining example of French country architecture, original buildings circa 1851. This was the location of the second Ursuline community in Texas established solely for the education of young girls. Complex entered on National Register of Historic Places. Buildings are used by the Southwest Craft Center Creative Arts School for public instruction of arts and crafts. Visitors welcome. No admission charge.

**YTURRI-EDMUNDS HOME AND MILL**—257 Yellowstone St.—One of the few adobe-brick structures (circa 1840-60) remaining in San Antonio. Restored Grist Mill in operation. Owned and maintained by San Antonio Conservation Society. Open Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., with corn grinding demonstrations at 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Tuesdays. Open for group tours by appointment. No admission charge. Telephone 534-8237.

**SAN ANTONIO MUSEUM OF TRANSPORTATION**—HemisFair Plaza. See the world famous Transportation Hall which houses classic and antique automobiles, carriages, stage coach, hearses, the old horse-drawn pumper mule trolley car, World War I "Jenny" Airplane, street car and the famous Herff miniature train.



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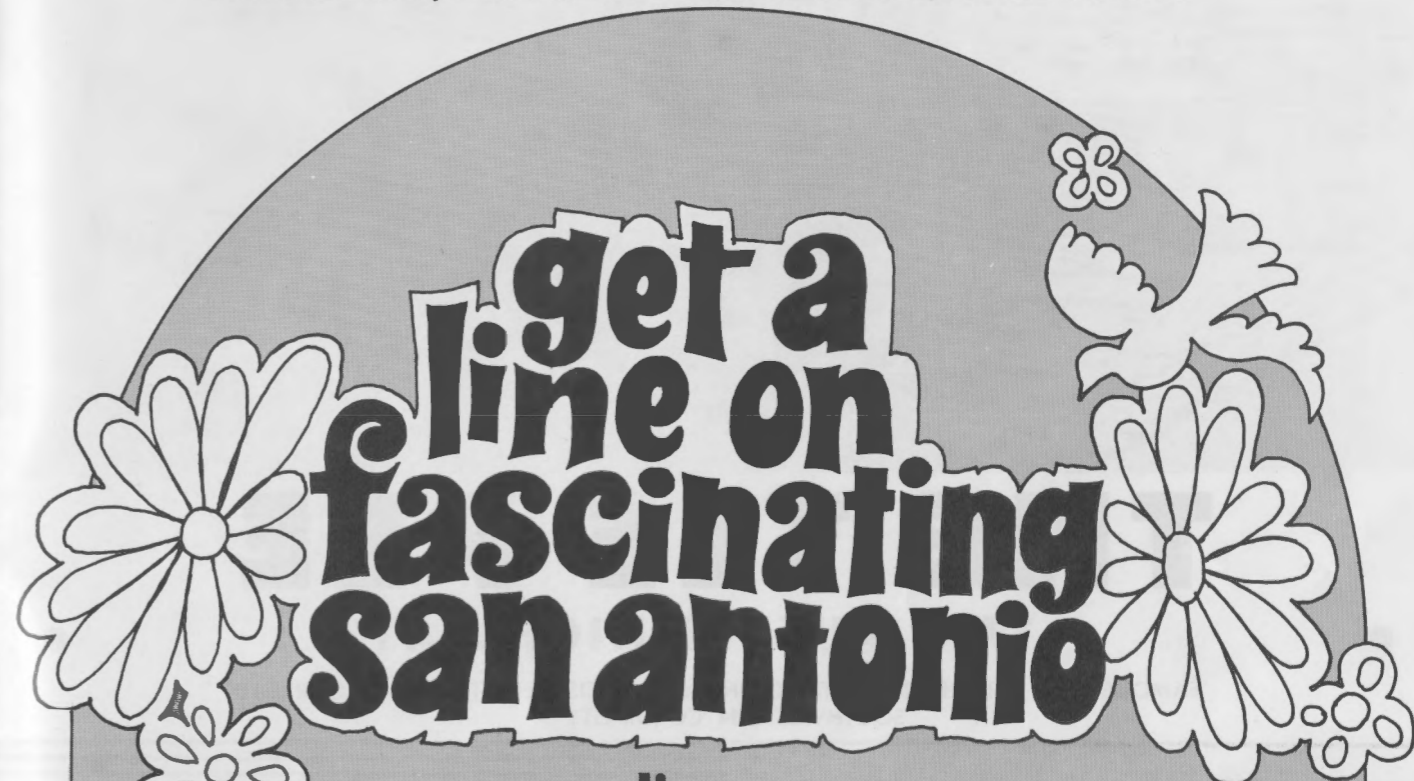

Thank you very much.

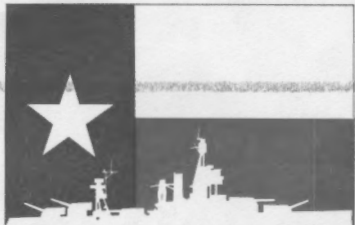

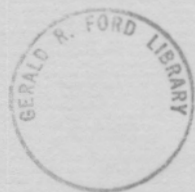
