It is my understanding that the National Bicentennial Conference will convene in Washington, D. C. February 24 and 25. This is the major program launching the National Bicentennial Observance insofar as Federal, State and local governments are concerned. Its significance is far reaching.

A schedule request for a Presidential address was submitted to the Scheduling Office in November, a copy of which is attached.

Because of the importance of this event and the opportunity it provides the President and his Administration to not only identify with, but set the tone of bicentennial observances, it should have unusually high priority in my opinion. This is a matter that I want to bring to the President's attention but wanted you to be aware of this background.

- A. Background: The official Bicentennial commemoration begins March, 1975. As an introduction to the nationwide commemoration, the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration is hosting a National Bicentennial Conference.

This Conference is the most important single gathering of individuals concerned with the implementation of Bicentennial activities and events across the nation. The participants constitute the nucleus of Bicentennial planning and programs both in the private sector and also in government.

Events connected with this three-day conference are as follows: Monday, February 24, there will be a registration period and the first meeting of the newly appointed Bicentennial Advisory Council. This is a get-acquainted meeting and a briefing session for the Council members. A list of those members which you appointed on January 20, 1975, is attached. On Monday evening, you and Mrs. Ford are hosting a White House reception for many of those attending this Conference. However, due to the extremely large number of participants, not all were invited and, therefore, it most likely would be best not to refer to this reception in your remarks.

The second day of the conference, Tuesday, February 25, is devoted to a number of ARBA presentations to the participants. The presentations include briefings on many of the international programs, a number of panels, the three television networks' closed circuit preview of upcoming Bicentennial programs, and a meeting of the Bicentennial Board. There are also some seventy exhibits on display at the



Conference, representing national Bicentennial programs. On Tuesday evening, the Bicentennial Administration is hosting a reception in honor of the Bicentennial Congress.

Wednesday, February 26, will be devoted to a series of panels and meetings between the Bicentennial Administration staff, the State Commission Representatives, and Regional Directors. The purpose of these is to interchange information about national Bicentennial programs.

Just prior to your address, the newly appointed Bicentennial Advisory Council will have met in executive session and elected its Chairperson and Vice Chairperson. These individuals will serve on the Bicentennial Board. On the platform, for your keynote address, will be representatives of each of the fifty state Bicentennial commissions, the territories, the District of Columbia, and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, excluding the representative from Samoa who was not able to attend. Additionally, ARBA Administrator John Warner and Deputy Administrator Marjorie Lynch will be on the platform, as well as Senator Ed Brooke, Chairman of the Bicentennial Board, and the newly elected Chairperson of the Bicentennial Advisory Council.

The music at the Tuesday morning event is being provided by the newly formed Department of Defense Bicentennial Band. This is their first appearance, and they and elements of their band will be touring the nation during the Bicentennial period.

You may want to give recognition to the following individuals who are scheduled to be in the audience: Reverend Doctor Edward R. Elson, Chaplain, United States Senate; The Honorable James E. Holshouser, Jr., Governor, State of North Carolina; The Honorable Joseph L. Alioto, President, U. S. Conference of Mayors, and Mayor of the City of San Francisco; The Honorable Stanley M. Smoot, President, National Association of Counties, Chairman, Board of Commissions, Davis County, Utah.
