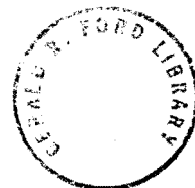
I look forward to the success of your efforts to establish a community development corporation to serve the hassidic community in Brooklyn.

## Accomplishments

After ten years as a principal in a successful food manufacturing business, I decided to make community activities a full-time occupation by offering my business talents to the anti-poverty groups in a neglected neighborhood.

Within a year I was able to establish a citywide reputation for the Williamsburg Community Corporation, then one of the lesser-known poverty-area groups which are elected annually by residents. I, and its new executive director, concentrated on economic-development and manpower-training programs, because they offered the greatest chance for self-sufficiency.

Two months after joining the corporation, I helped lure a manufacturing company back into New York City from the suburbs--one of the very few examples--with a four-tier mortgage for \$1,200,000 placed with two state agencies, one federal agency, and an institutional lender. This feat was reported in every New York newspaper and on every television station.

Then I helped a local electrical contracting firm obtain a \$1.8 million contract from the Transit Authority, tripling its local hiring. I helped keep one of New York's largest employers from relocating out of Williamsburg and the city. I helped ICBO (Inter-racial Council of Business Opportunities) finance a minority-owned pipe manufacturer for half a million dollars. I initiated the first MESBIC (Minority Enterprise Small Business Investment Company) in Williamsburg.

In all so far, I formulated and helped finance more than \$7 million dollars of projects for this area, creating 2,271 jobs, with 2,500 more still in process. These jobs were filled by the black, Hispanic, Chassidic and white other-ethnic residents of North Brooklyn.

I also helped develop or expand fifteen minority-owned businesses, and established a special citywide business-loan program among five banks. I helped establish twelve training projects with private companies totaling \$2.1 million for 700 jobs in the area. And I helped guide the expansion of a 24-hour medical emergency center in Williamsburg.



Williamsburg Community Corporation became famous, at least among the 22 other poverty areas, for its sophisticated economic structure. Washington and university-based developers made it an essential stop on a New York tour of economic-development projects. The two outstanding projects on this tour, which I helped initiate and execute, were that of a "vertical industrial park" and a training program to staff an entire municipal hospital.

In the first case, the community corporation leased a decaying factory building of six acres (one on each floor) from the city and obtained a \$1.3 million grant from the U. S. Department of Commerce for reconstruction. When finished, the building will house 500 jobs; employers will obtain modern space in the midst of a plentiful supply of labor at \$1-a-square-foot gross costs; the city will have an income of \$75,000 a year from an abandoned structure, plus direct taxes that exceed \$200,000 a year; and the community development corporation will earn \$100,000 a year. This project will pave the way for a new form of redevelopment of the inner cities.

In the second case, I shouldered the responsibility for training local residents for the 2000 additional jobs that will open when the state finishes building a 12-acre, \$98,000,000 medical center for all of North Brooklyn, including Williamsburg, Bushwick, Greenpoint, and northern Bedford-Stuyvesant. Almost half the jobs are in professional and technical categories, like nurses and specialized laboratory technicians, requiring at least two years of university-level training. These are jobs rarely within the reach of the poor.

At this writing, a pilot program is being launched to train 75 bilingual nurses, 21 bio-medical technicians and 28 X-ray technicians. When the training is completed, North Brooklyn will reap the benefits of an extra \$20,000,000 a year payroll (which will create hundreds of other jobs); black, Hispanic, and other ethnic organizations will have set a pattern of working closely together for a common purpose; and the employment of local residents as professional staff will probably alter the fundamental nature of health-care delivery to the poor. It is one of the most ambitious training programs in the nation.
