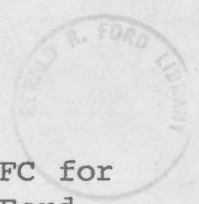

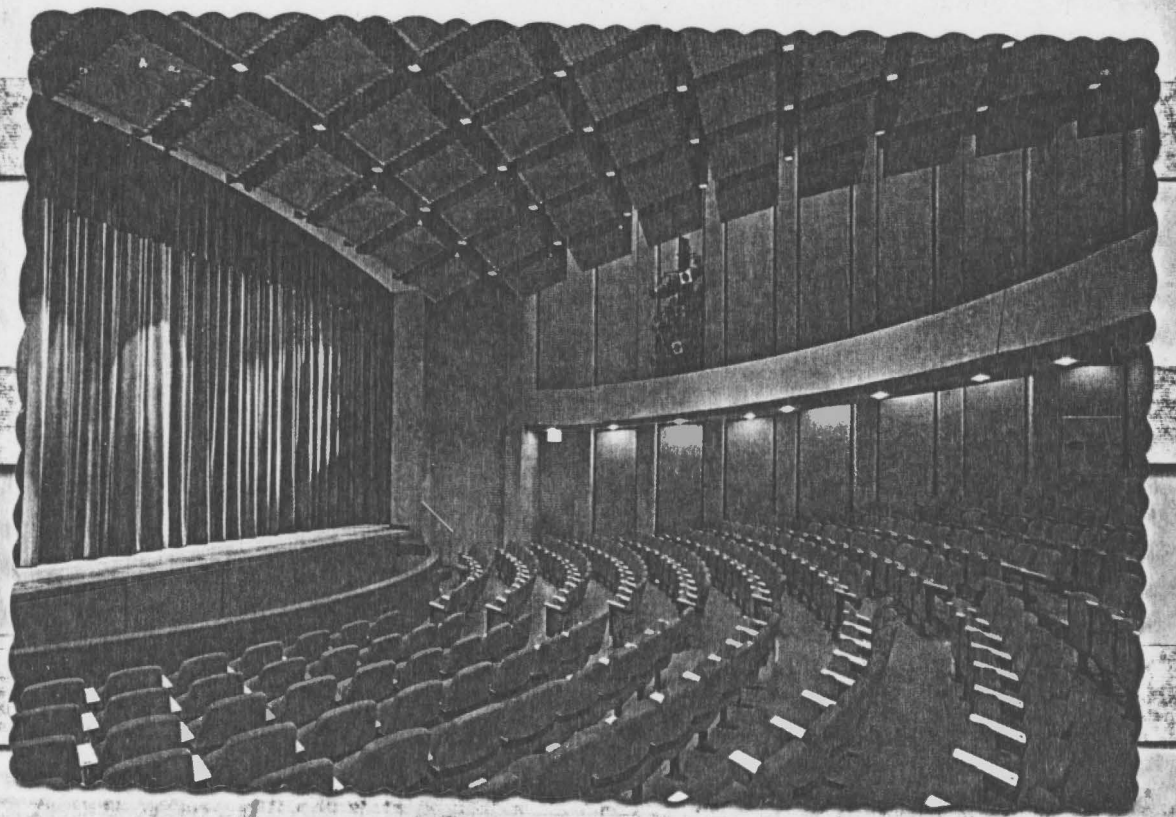

The downtown square was designed to provide open space and to serve as a center of community activities. Akron is the rubber capital of America and essentially a one industry city. Its growth came later than most Ohio urban centers during the period from 1910 to 1930.

One of the dominant political influences has been the United Rubber Workers, which is strongly Democratic.

Former GOP National Chairman Ray Bliss (who is still alive) helped elect a Republican to Congress from the 14th District in 1950. William Ayres served from 1950 to 1970 when he was defeated by Democrat John Seiberling, a lawyer for Goodyear. Seiberling has held the seat since then. He is a member of the House Judiciary Committee.

Kent State University and the University of Akron are both in this district. About 11 percent of the voters in the 14th are black.

CONGRESSMEN RINALDO AND FENWICK

Congressmen Rinaldo and Fenwick will be travelling from Andrews AFB to Morristown, New Jersey.

CONGRESSMAN MATT RINALDO: He represents New Jersey's 12 District, and was first elected to Congress in 1972. The 44-year-old bachelor from Union reportedly is interested in a statewide race. There are three GOP House members and 12 Democrats in the New Jersey Delegation.

Rinaldo, a Catholic, served in the New Jersey State Senate, where he authored a State revenue sharing law.

Rinaldo's district encompasses Union County, which includes the cities of Elizabeth and Plainfield. It is a predominately suburban area. Rinaldo won his seat when GOP Rep. Florence Dwyer retired. He generally is considered a liberal.

CONGRESSWOMAN MILLICENT FENWICK: She won her first term in 1974 to replace retiring GOP veteran Peter Frelinghuysen in New Jersey's 5th District. The district is a bedroom community for New York City. It ranks 11th in income among the country's 435 Congressional district.

Mrs. Fenwick is divorced, has two children and eight grandchildren. She began her political career in 1969 when she was elected to the New Jersey Assembly.

She is 66 years old. She attended the Foxcroft School in Middleburg, Virginia, Columbia University and the New School for Social Research. For a number of years, she was an associate editor of the Conde Nast Publications, which publishes Vogue among other magazines. She smokes a pipe.

In the last 18 months, the President has brought the country out of the bad shape it was in when he took office. He has set the economy on the right track and restored integrity to the Presidency.

For the Dodge Estate**

MADISON, N. J., May 25
(AP) — The Dodge Mansion
estate here is being offered
for sale to private interests
for \$13.5 million.

The Fidelity Union Trust
Company, executor of the es-
tate of the late Geraldine
Rockefeller Dodge, and Lau-
dauer Associates, a New
York real estate consultant,
are offering the Morris Coun-
ty property for sale in com-
pliance with the wishes of
Mrs. Dodge.



The "Mansion in May" project undertaken by a group of volunteers in New Jersey will raise about \$200,000 for the Morristown Memorial Hospital. This sets the record in the United States for amounts raised by a "designer showcase" project. (The projects record -- \$133,000-- was set by the same group two years ago with a similar project.)

Two hundred volunteers of the women's association of the hospital have spearheaded the project and have involved 2,000 volunteers in all. One hundred and twenty volunteers work at the house on a daily basis.

The setting is the once magnificent Geraldine Rockefeller Dodge estate (called "Giralda") a gloomy, run-down mansion and grounds which had been setting empty since Mrs. Dodge's death in 1973. Some 40 named designers primarily from New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania each took a portion of the house to decorate. They donated their time and material so that the majority of the \$5 attendance charge would go to Morristown Memorial Hospital.

The house has been opened during the month of May, with only four days to go after the day you see it. About 45,000 people will have been through it by that time.

The estate itself is amazing, one of the only two its size and grandure left in New Jersey. There are 340 acres on the estate, a huge carriage house now made into boutiques and a lunch room, and 35 rooms on the 3 floors of the mansion. Many of the major magazines-- House Beautiful and McCalls for example--are doing stories on the project this Fall.

NOTE: Mrs. Dodge was John D. Rockefeller's niece, the daughter of William Rockefeller, President of Standard Oil. She married Marcellus Dodge, Chairman of Remington Arms. Newspapers of the time called them the richest young couple in the United States. Dodge gave his bride "Giralda" as a wedding gift.
