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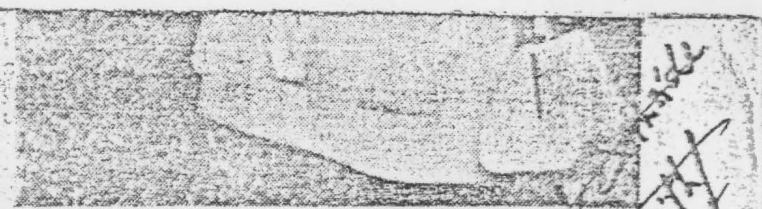

Ford's Breakfast Is Do-It-Yourself

 Washington—“Of course he will,” Mrs. Betty Ford said yesterday when asked if the President would continue to cook his own breakfast in the White House.

“All he needs is a toaster,” she explained in her first news conference as the First Lady. The 5-minute exchange of questions and answers on the South Lawn of the White House left a few press corps tempers as hot as the midday sun in which reporters stood a full hour before Mrs. Ford appeared.

She finally walked out, a bit nervous but gracious nonetheless.

Mrs. Ford was flanked by two huge magnolia trees at the diplomatic entrance to the executive mansion as the questions began. What did she think of her new home?

“But it isn't my house—it's the house of the people of the United States. It is a very beautiful house,” she said.

“I am looking forward—I am thrilled to death at the thought of moving in.”

She spoke slowly, smiling into the sun between questions.

They covered every room,

she said. Redecoration will be limited to minor changes in the living quarters upstairs. She mentioned her daughter, Susan, 17, as an arbiter of possible redecorating.

After a decade of women offspring inhabiting the mansion, must a masculine room be created for the Ford sons? “Oh, there is a masculine room there,” she said.

The activity throughout the morning—perhaps the cause for the delay of the press conference first slated for 11 a.m.—was an attempt to decide who gets what room, she said.

The family hopes to move in by Monday from their suburban Alexandria, Va., home, she said.

Would she be active in volunteer programs? Yes, just as she has been since the age of 20, the 56-year-old first lady replied. “My specialty is in the field of the arts,” she said.

Once a Martha Graham dancer and a model, she seriously considered dance as a lifetime career.
