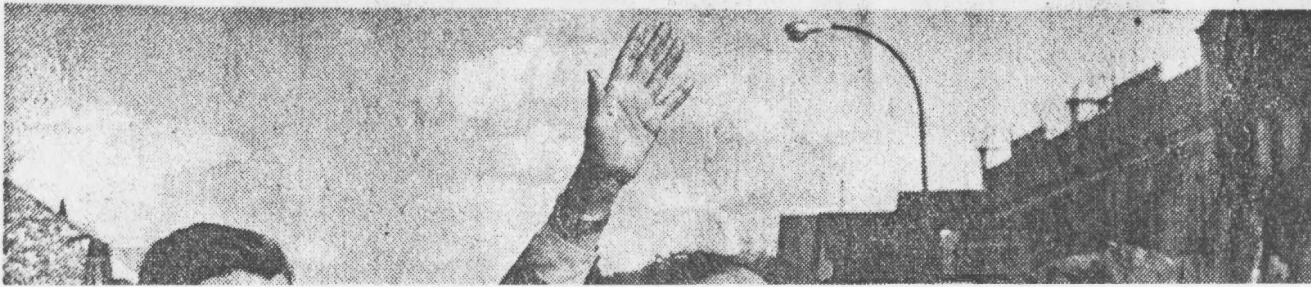

Waukegan aboard his chartered plane, "Minnesota Rita." He went immediately to a press conference, where he blasted the President for his treatment on Eastern Europe, citing the presence of 31 Soviet army divisions in countries there.

According to the candidate, the countries are only independent as long as they go along with the Soviet Union. If they don't, "They will have their independence and autonomy taken away as in Czechoslovakia."

In answer to a question, he said the political picture is turning around to his candidacy. Then, in the same answer he took a shot at the President for avoiding questions using the White House as a "unker."

### "Happy Days"

At the Hotel Statler Hilton before the parade, he arrived to the pounding rhythm of the Commodores marching unit from the Perry Project who swung into the old Franklin D. Roosevelt theme, "Happy Days are here again."

In a talk to a Women in Politics luncheon, he was flanked by a variety of local politicians, as well as Mrs. Rita Grangle, wife of the county chairman, and Mrs. Elizabeth Moynihan, wife of the Democratic and Liberal candidate for U.S. Senate, who later marched in the parade.

With obligatory references to Gen. Pulaski, Mondale pounded away at the jobs issue and inflation. To the luncheon and to a

later rally in the Terrace Room, he said, "Once again the Republicans have loused up the economy."

Referring to the local employment picture, he told the crowds, "Unemployment is three times higher than when they took office." Mondale went on, "The average inflation rate under the Republicans is three times as high as under Kennedy and Johnson."

Using the somewhat evangelistic tone of the Democratic campaign, the senator asked, "Why is it we are so afraid of the American way of dealing justly and fairly with each other?"

He also attacked the President for failing to invite exiled Russian author Alexander Solzhenitsyn to the White House.

Speaking to the Democratic rally, he asked them to "do the little extra." Mondale explained, "New York is crucial to the election and I think we're ahead. In fact I know we are. Ford has been helping us each day."

At the Pulaski parade reviewing stand, the Ford campaign was obvious. Mrs. Betty Ford pinned a "Keep Betty in the White House" button on Mondale.

As the senator entered the GOP lion's den on stage, he was greeted by Rep. Jack F. Kemp, R-Hamburg, County Executive Edward V. Regan, Mrs. Ford and Republican State Chairman Richard M. Rosenbaum.

Immediately after the parade, Mondale flew to New York City.

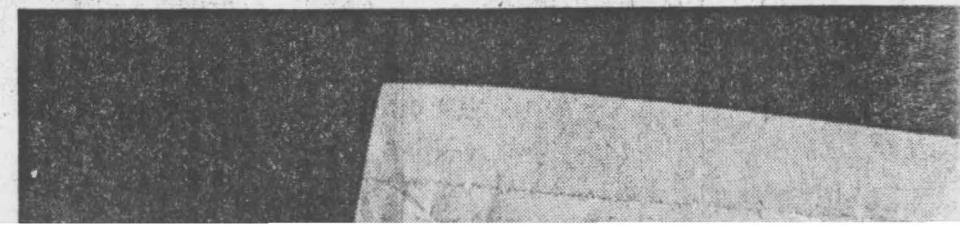

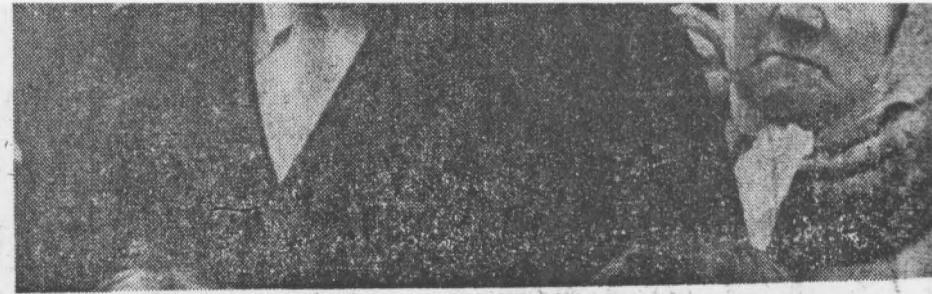
