Since he came into office one year ago, the President has either delivered in person or issued on paper close to one million words. All of these were either drafted by or edited by or approved by the Editorial Office. If you include correspondence sent out over the President's name, this count jumps to well over 10 million words.

Broken down, these fall into these categories:

- 450 speeches or remarks (totaling 270,000 spoken words alone)
- 75 proclamations
- 36 veto messages
- 59 bill signing statements
- 76 executive orders
- 134 written statements on various subjects
- 170 official communications to Congress, including messages on legislation, protocols, conventions, transmittal of reports, letters to the Speaker.
- 10 news conference statements
- 22 memos to heads of Federal departments and agencies
- 300 messages to heads of state
- 1,567 messages or greetings to organizations or groups in convention or meeting
- 19 magazine articles

Portrait of an Assassin, a book written in 1965 by a then obscure Congressman, Rep. Gerald R. Ford (Republican-Michigan), now President Ford, may be aired as a longie TV doc drama on CBS TV.

Network is in negotiations with MGM TV whose Pres. Harris Katleman, acquired rights to the tome from the President. Steve Mills, Ex. Producer of movies for TV at CBS TV confirmed the negotiations with the Culver Lot when contacted over the weekend.

Ford, a member of the Warren Commission, which investigated the assassination of Kennedy, wrote the 500 page tome, an exhaustive study of the Commission's findings with John R. Stiles and it was published by Simon and Schuster. One condition agreed to in the current negotiations is a stipulation that if the deal is made the doc will not air before the Presidential election in 1976, since Ford is an announced candidate for re-election.

REMARKS OF THE PRESIDENT
in the East Room

(4:25 P.M.)

Let me thank each and every one of you for the very warm welcome and I thank you for your attendance here and I think we ought to -- or I should say that we don't have to go through a long process of getting to know one another. I think I have known most of you and I suspect many of you have known me. So I think we start out with a good rapport in that we have a personal relationship.

Number two, I am familiar with the fine job that has been done by all of you, a fine job in my judgment, in the foreign field, a fine job in the domestic area. We are all familiar with the tremendous success of President Nixon in the field of foreign policy. I don't have to repeat the specifics. I happen to think we have done a lot better on the domestic scene than most people, or most critics give us credit for. And I think one of the highlights, one of the most successful programs, of course, was the general revenue sharing program and the others, block grant, special revenue sharing programs that have been started, and I hope will be broadened and continued.

I am not saying we don't have problems in foreign policy. We do. And it seems like we make great headway on one and another pops up, but with the defense establishment we have, with the, I think, outstanding leadership in the Department of State, we are going to meet those problems head on and I think successfully.

As I said last night, our main problem here at home is inflation, and I don't mean to discount the difficulties that we face in this area. I don't expect to give you any panacea and I know Herb Stein is not going to give me any one to give to the country, but we can have a program and we are going to carry it out and we are going to hope that the Congress will be cooperative with us in that endeavor, and the American people as well.

Now the main thrust of what I tried to say last night is primarily this, and I will simplify it and will try to put it in the context of the group I am talking to here now.

I started with the observation that we had a big job, talking to the American people, and we had a big job in talking to the Congress, but the best way I know to solve a problem and to get the job done is to work at it. And that means cooperation, that means some real dedication.

I think we in the Executive Branch can set an example. It is going to mean a lot of long hours. It is going to be a lot of unselfish giving. It is going to be the same kind of dedication that you gave President Nixon. It will be the same kind of dedication in the future that you have given in the past.

We, in my humble opinion, can meet the challenge and you can achieve that, if that is the right word, by, I think, a quotation from Thomas Jefferson, that the best way to be a part of Government is to be a part of it, and be a part of it in total -- your brain, your body, your heart, and if we combine those efforts in the future, we can lick those problems that do remain, whether they are inflation, unemployment, the problems of the disadvantaged, education, the whole spectrum, and I know that I can count on your help as President Nixon did.

And I can assure you that I will work with you, your departments, your agencies, your bureaus, what have you. If we do that, we don't have to worry about the pages of history writing anything but the best for the last five and one-half years and the next two and one-half.

I thank you. It is a pleasure to see you all and I hope to shake hands and say hello, and those who I don't know, I want to get better acquainted with.

Thank you very, very much.
