RELEASES: Intention to nominate Rod Hills to be a member of the SEC. He will succeed Ray Garrett, Jr. who has resigned. Exchange of letters between the President and Stan Scott, who is leaving the White House to become Assistant Administrator of AID. No replacement yet for Scott. He will be replaced however.

ARMS/TURKEY: House scheduled to vote this afternoon on S. 2230 allowing resumption of arms sales to Turkey. President believes favorable House action on this measure is critical if vital U.S. and NATO security interests in the Eastern Mediterranean are to be restored. Favorable action on this measure will enable U.S. to begin repairing its security relationship with Turkey.

WPI: Went up 6/10ths of 1% in September. Statistics are still being analyzed and complicated seasonal adjustment factors for this month only are involved. No reaction to the increase.

AIRCRAFT OVER W.H.: There was an airplane flying over the White House during the arrival ceremony for the Emperor. Secret Service notified the FAA according to the usual procedure. The FAA is investigating and will be happy to answer any press queries. Phone number is 426-8521. (Plane carrying a sign backwards -- something about asking the Emperor to save the whales).

PIKE COMMITTEE: Secy. Kissinger has told the Committee that all papers relating to the Middle East/Sinai agreement have been turned over to the Cmte. What is being weighed is the desire to make public everything that can be made public, at the same time protecting the historic and traditional aspects of the documents.

MAYORS MEETING: President felt that his meeting yesterday with the Mayors was one of the best he has had in a long time. A large range of issues was discussed on the issues concerning each of them. It was a very favorable meeting. Mayors had a good grasp of grass roots concerns. One dozen specific matters out of that meeting that will be followed up at the White House.

EIA LEGISLATION: Will perhaps go up next week.

NEW YORK CITY FINANCIAL AID: President believes that the federal government giving financial aid to New York City would violate traditional federal system regarding certain responsibilities belonging to states and municipalities.

WASH. POST DAMAGES: President always deploras violence of any sort.



October 3, 1975

RECIPROCAL DINNER: Information will be posted on the board on the details of coverage, who, what, where, when, why and how.

SATURDAY - ELKINS, W.VA.: President will depart South Lawn by helicopter at 12:30 PM. He arrives Weimer Field, Elkins High School at 1:50 PM. He will have remarks which will be broadcast by loudspeakers all along the parade route. At the close of the President's remarks, he will get in his car (which is equipped with a "bubble top") and lead the parade. Parade route is 1 1/4 miles. This is the Mountain State Forest Festival Annual Parade. President will then go to Elkins-Randolph County Airport where he will depart at 2:45 PM, arriving the South Lawn at 4:05 PM. Lengthy discussion about how the press will travel to Elkins. It has now been decided that the press will travel by 1 pool helicopter, which will accompany the President. The rest of the press corps will travel by 5 Twin Beech aircraft. Bible will be out this afternoon, but a summary schedule will be out earlier than the bible. 100,000 for the parade.

FILING - ELKINS, W.VA. There is one road from the airport through town to the high school staging area. At the staging area, there will be 6 LD's, and 14 LD's at the courthouse. Few phones available at the airport. No phones in the wire cars, because there isn't a base station in that area that can transmit. Pappy has arranged for police escort from the high school staging area to the airport. There will be 2 telex machines at the staging area.

SATURDAY - NEWARK, N.J. - President departs South Lawn at 5:00 for AAFB and arrives at Newark Airport at 6:10. At 6:30, he arrives the Robert Treat Hotel to attend a GOP Fund raising reception and dinner. He will have remarks at 9:00 and departs immediately after speaking for Newark Airport, departing airport at 9:45, and arriving South Lawn at 10:50 PM. Further details later.

KNOXVILLE -- OCT. 7: President will attend another in a continuing series of White House Domestic Conferences. He will do a local TV and newspaper interview soon after arriving in Knoxville. He will also have a meeting with the Appalachian Regional Commission, which is comprised of the governors from the following states: Alabama, Georgia, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Ohio, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia. Don't have list of acceptances as yet, so don't know whether all of the governors will be present. Will discuss federal policies which relate to their regions. Meeting will last 1 1/2 hours and will be the format similar to the meeting with Mayors last week in Skokie, Illinois.

CHANCELLOR SCHMIDT: Will have a readout after the luncheon.



UNEMPLOYMENT FIGURE: There has been a drop from 8.4 in August to 8.3 in September. This is a gradual decline. There also has been an increase in employment for the month.

PIKE COMMITTEE: The difference of opinion between the Secretary of State and the Pike Committee is between the Committee and the State Department. Nothing to say from here.

NEW YORK CITY: There hasn't been any change in Simon's comments since he testified to the Joint Economic Committee. White House cannot see that New York state will have difficult problems on its own credit applications as long as they act with reasonable prudence. There isn't any legal authority for the Government to bail out NYC. Federal government now contributes \$3 1/2 billion a year to NYC which is 25% of their annual budget.



RON NESSEN BRIEFING

October 6, 1975

KNOXVILLE, TENN.: 10:45 AM - Press check-in at Andrews AFB, 11:15 AM - press plane departure fm. AAFB, 12:30 PM - Press plane arrival at McGhee-Tyson Air National Guard base. 11:40 AM - President departs south lawn, 12:00 Noon Air Force One departs AAFB, 1:05 PM - Air Force One arrives McGhee-Tyson. President will be met by Kyle Testerman, Mayor of Knoxville and the base commander of the ANG base. The President will do a TV interview at the Hyatt-Regency hotel first and it will be piped into the press room and embargoed for 5:30 PM release. There will be 4 TV anchormen and 2 newspaper reporters interviewing the President. He will then go to the White House Conference where he will speak and take questions from the attendees. That is expected to run from 4:00 to 5:00. Then, he will meet with the governors of the ARC. That meeting is expected to run from 5:20 PM to 7:00 PM. The governors who have accepted are Tennessee, Georgia, Kentucky, N.C., W. Va., Ohio and Mississippi. We haven't heard from Maryland and Alabama. Regrets are Pa., Va., S.C. and N.Y.

DETROIT, MICH.: President will go to Detroit on Friday, October 10 to attend a GOP fund raising dinner. There will probably be other events laid on for this trip, but they haven't been finalized.

TAX CUT: President spending a good deal of time today with his economic advisers discussing the tax cut. He will indicate to the Ways & Means Committee by tomorrow what his view is on extending the tax cut. Call back to the office after the lunch lid comes off at 3:00 PM to see if we have anything to give you on the tax cut.

EIA: Legislation will be going up shortly and perhaps this week.

NEW YORK CITY: No change in the President's position. Simon was referring to a broad overall study of the federal role in municipal and state level payments across the country. Federal guarantee of loans to New York cannot be done by the Executive Branch of the government and it breaks down the traditional organization of the government regarding federal, state and local responsibility. The City can solve its own problems. President feels it is unfair to ask people across the country to bail New York City out.

JACK FORD/POT: The Ford family believes in being totally honest and the President feels his son was expressing a personal view and giving a frank answer. If you want any further reaction as to the President's view, ask him at a press conference. Same with the Jack Ford/Bianca Jagger photo which appeared on Sunday.

REAGAN: President has been asked how he felt about Ronald Reagan and he has said that he welcomes competition and has all of his political life and he expects to be the nominee. He doesn't feel there has been any lack of organization in the President Ford Committee.

TOMORROW: President will attend 200th Anniversary ceremony of the founding of the U.S. Navy. He will leave the White House about 11:30 a.m. and return about 12:45 PM. The ceremony will take place outside, near the Admirals quarters. At the Museum on the grounds of the Navy yard in the event of rain. Remarks will be piped back to the briefing room. White House pass, D.C. police pass and Senate or House gallery pass will be recognized. Open coverage at the event. Travel pool will accompany the President. Don't know if we will have a briefing tomorrow because of the ceremony. Will post that information later today.

FUTURE TRAVEL: President will go to Hartford, Conn. on Tuesday, Oct. 14 and Louisville, Ky. on Thursday, October 16. Both will be Republican fund raisers.

PUBLIC REACTION TO TAX CUT: As of 10:30 a.m. -- Telegrams letters and mailgrams -- 162 in favor, 13 opposed and 9 comments. Phone calls - 17 in favor, 7 opposed and one comment. Letters are really just beginning to come in.

NEW YORK CITY -- President still feels that N.Y.C. can solve its own problems.

SCHULTZ/COLBY: There is absolutely no truth to rumor that Schultz will replace Colby as Director of the CIA. The President has no plans to replace Colby. RN doesn't know of any other personnel changes that are planned. Any changes in the intelligence gathering community will be in the form of the President's legislative proposals.

EIA LEGISLATION: Will probably go up tomorrow.

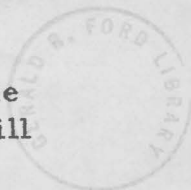
DETROIT TRIP: The President will have a Regional News Conference while he is in Detroit on Friday. Half the Questions from the White House Press Corps and half from the local media. Put a mark next to your name on the sign up sheet if you want to be included in question session. It will be at 4:15 PM in Cobo Hall.

MOYNIHAN/AMIN: President feels that Dan Moynihan said what needed to be said. He feels that is all he can contribute to the conversation.

SATURDAY: President will work in the office in the morning. Play golf at BTC on Saturday afternoon and then fly to CD to spend the night.

ARC/GOVS. MTG: President told the ARC governors yesterday that he felt full renewal for four years ought to be voted on with respect to the ARC. He will make specific recommendations on specific programs, keeping the governor's needs in mind.

TAX CUT: President feels his proposals are what the American people want. If the Congress goes along with the President's program, we will have a balanced budget within 3 years. He is asking for a ceiling of \$395 billion. That is an increase of \$25 billion over this year. President doesn't agree with Al Ullman's comments yesterday that the Congress can't cope with his proposal. They can and must pass this legislation. They found the instrument to pass a pay raise for themselves when they so desired, and they can find the instrument to pass his tax cut proposal.

SADAT: Sadat will visit the White House on October 26. This is the first visit of an Egyptian President while in office. Sadat was here in 1966 when he was President of the National Assembly.

SALT: Some progress has been made, but not any we can discuss.

DETROIT: Bible out later today. Put an X by your name on the sheet if you want to ask a question. Deadline for X's is 5:00 PM. Hope to have excerpts of the speech in Detroit which will be delivered about 9:00 PM.

MOYNIHAN/AMIN: RN clarified his remarks of yesterday -- He said that the President feels that Amin's attack on the U.S. and remarks about Israel were out of place and uncalled for. What Moynihan and Clarence Mitchell said needed to be said. The U.S. does believe that all of Amin's remarks do not reflect the view of the Org. of African Unity. US does consider the OAU to be an important regional organization.

OCTOBER 10, 1975

ECON. SUMMIT/PARIS: The President will join the heads of State of France, Germany, Great Britain, Italy and Japan for an Economic Summit, which is actually a spinoff of the Helsinki Summit, on November 15-17, 1975 outside of Paris. The exact location of the meeting has not been decided as yet. The French are the hosts and it is up to them as to the location. It is the United States feeling that Canada will also participate in the meeting, although they are not scheduled to at this point. George Schultz was the person who pursued the possibility of this meeting following the Helsinki Conference. It will be a very small meeting, with only two other persons from each country besides the head of the country. In the case of the U.S., the other persons will be the Secretaries of State and Treasury who will attend. There will be extensive preparations between now and the time of the meeting and those preparations will be chaired by Bill Seidman and his people. C'est magnifique!!!!

KING OLAV: He will present the President with a gold medal commemorating the 150th anniversary of Norwegian emigration to the U.S.

TAX CUT/CONGRESS: Congress has, in the past, imposed spending limits in the same bill with tax legislation. In 1967 and again in 1968, such legislation was passed. President considers this a 'can't do Congress', and the country needs a "can do Congress".

KENTUCKY TRIP: Trip was cancelled, as the President said last night at the PC, because local law enforcement officials, hosts for the dinner, and the Secret Service felt that, for security reasons, it would be best for the President not to go to Louisville.

SPENDING CEILING/TAX CUT: President has not asked Congress to wait until next October to cut spending, he has been asking them in his rescissions and deferrals messages throughout the year to cut spending. He isn't holding off any cuts in federal spending until after the election is nonsense. He has been asking for cuts since January. Spending must be related to revenues.

NEW YORK CITY: President accurately stated the Administration's views in Detroit regarding bailing out New York City. Can't sit in judgement of the Vice President's remarks at the Columbus Day Dinner. President agrees that Mayor Beame and Governor Carey are buckling down and making some very tough decisions regarding New York City. If the City and the state do what is necessary to restore the city's financial affairs, then there will be no need for Federal aid.

SALT: Is it true that the Soviet Union designated all of their SS18's as multi-warhead missiles in the SALT talks? Can't talk about specifics coming out of the SALT talks.

SPENCER: Ask Bo Callaway any questions you may have about Spencer going to the PFC. Total nonsense that Callaway is leaving the PFC.

GSA/CIA/NSA: No successor to announce to Sampson at GSA. No time frame on CIA reorganization. Nothing to say about NSA today.

SINAI AGREEMENT: President signed agreement at 2:10 PM

DRUG REPORT: Domestic Council will put out a task force report and Statement by the President on drugs at 3:00 PM today. We will have copies of it available on the press plane also.

ADDITION TO SCHED.: Gen. Haig will be in at 3:00 PM today to see the President. He is in town on other business and is routinely visiting the President as he has done several times in the past. Don't know what they will talk about.

ADVANCE TEXT: Doesn't look like we will have advance excerpts available of the President's speech this evening.

BUDGET CUTS.: Lengthy chronology about how the President arrived at the decision on where and how much to cut the budget. This is the same procedure every President goes through when deciding on the total figure for the annual budget. The only difference here is that a tax cut is attached to this one. The planning figures given each department and agency are not firm. The budget for the Defense Department is 27% of the total Federal budget, which is the lowest DOD budget since WWII.

From the 8th to the 19th of December the President will meet each day with officials of agencies and departments so that they can appeal their limit, if they think they are unfair or inaccurate. EPB has requested 22 meetings for a total of 22 hours with the President until December 20. Domestic Council has requested 34 meetings lasting a total of 26 hours. OMB has requested 23 meetings lasting a total of 25 hours. Congress ought to go on record now that it will pledge itself to an increase of only 7% in the next year in the budget.

RELEASES: Eckerd - GSA Administrator

POSTINGS: S. 824 -- Japan-United States Friendship Act has been signed.

P. M. THORN: The President has invited Prime Minister Thorn to Washington for an informal visit on November 12th. He will come to Washington from New York and the UN General Assembly. They will discuss international development and bi-lateral issues of mutual interest to both countries.

PRESIDENT'S COLD: A further update on this morning's report. RN saw the President this morning and he was dressed in white robe with tennis rackets on it, blue and white striped pajamas, slippers and socks. He also saw Rumsfeld and Dorothy Downton, who had a large stack of paper work with her. His fever this morning when the President examined him was down to 99.4 and he told Ron he felt much better. His head is not as congested. He is not as achy. Mrs. Ford also has symptoms of a cold -- nasal congestion, slight achiness, no fever. She is taking cold medication, aspirin and decongestant. Will have another report at 5:00 PM.

NEW YORK CITY: The President has not changed his position with respect to federal aid for the city -- if New York City got its fiscal affairs in order, there would be no need for legislation to give New York City federal aid. New York City has not been able to persuade the state that it will take those necessary steps. President feels that the majority of the people in the United States do not want Federal aid to New York City. In the last two weeks the letter and telegram count for federal aid to NYC is: 1,396 opposed to aid 1355 in favor of aid. However, those supporting federal aid to NYC are largely New Yorkers. Those opposing aid to NYC are not New Yorkers.

ECKERD/GSA: President feels Eckerd has had experience in an area that will help him in his new responsibilities. He has a reputation for being a good manager.

POSTINGS: President has signed H.R. 8121, H.R. 8561, H.R. 7706 and H.R. 6151

SS REPORT: The SS report on the Hartford incident was dated October 20, arrived at the White House on October 20 and D. Rumsfeld received it yesterday. Report will not be made public. President has not seen the report. If any changes are needed they will be made.

CPI - Went up 1/2% in line with expectations. Food prices went down.

PRESIDENTIAL ACTIVITY: President's activity today is as listed in previous posting. According to John Mashek's pool report on the photo session with the President, the President said he was feeling much, much better. He is very encouraged. The President said "Doctors can do almost anything.!" He said he watched the World Series up to the end of the 7th inning, and said it must have been an exciting 3 or 4 innings, after he stopped watching. Poolers thought his voice was a little husky and his eyes a little drawn. He was asked if he felt well enough to sign some legislation that might help New York. He said he did things not on how he felt, but what the facts were. There was no indication of any change in New York City, he said, and they must do what is necessary to meet the problems themselves. He was asked also about the NYTimes story and said he didn't know where it came from and he said that he had one or two communiques a day from Henry Kissinger. He was also asked about California next week and said "we haven't discussed plans beyond Saturday."

NYC: Mail, phone and telegram count from October 2 to 22 at 11:00 AM -- 1,659 in favor of federal aid to NYC. 1,970 opposed to Federal aid to NYC. President said he never told anyone what was reported in the NYT story -- There has been no indication by the President to anyone that he felt that way. President's opinion about New York City having to get its own fiscal affairs in order has not changed.

PRESIDENT'S DEPOSITION: All queries about the President giving a videotape deposition in the Fromme case should be referred to the Justice Department - Public Information Office 739-2028. Cannot comment on litigation matters.

SADAT: Full schedule has not been announced and we don't know when it will be announced.

SALT: Kissinger still says that two or three issues remain to be settled with respect to the SALT talks and he expects those to be resolved within the coming months and it will then take six weeks to negotiate the summit meeting.

NYC BONDS: Lengthy discussion about why stories are incorrect which say that the bond market has collapsed. Yesterday the State of Maryland and Fairfax County sold municipal bonds. Both sold them at the lowest interest rate since February 1973. Their bond sales support the President's position on New York City's bond market and it is supported by the President's economic advisers.

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES: The FY '75 budget called for funds to support a total of 1,968,100 federal employees. (non military) Less than a month after taking office the President announced that he wanted it reduced by 40,000 by the end of the fiscal year (June 1975) to 1,928,100. June 30 '75, the number had been reduced to 1,914,352. That is 53,748 below the budget level. The summer months should not be compared with the other months, because summer interns and summer replacements for vacationers are on the rolls for that period only. According to Dom Bonafede's article, that are 617 employees on the White House staff (that figure includes all full time employees, plus consultants, summer interns, part time employees and the President himself, plus summer replacements). Actual figure on September 1, 1974 -- 547; September 1, 1975 -- approximately 550; estimated November 1, 1975 figure will be 536. On October 1, 1975 there were 544. Permanent operating people and staff in the White House (does not include summer interns, summer replacements or part time ) September 1, 1974 534; September 1, 1975 - 512; October 1, 1975 - 504; estimated November 1, 1975 - 497. Goal by January 1, 1976 - 485. Operating people are the civil service, of the White House, operators, secretaries, clerical people. In September, 1974 245; September 1, 1975 - 247. Staff offices of the White House include the Press Office, Baroody's office, etc. September 1, 1974 - 289; May 1975 - 287; September 1, 1975 - 265; estimated November 1, 1975 - 257. Domestic Council, and some other agencies are in the Executive Office of the President and are statutory agencies set up by the Congress. Domestic Council, OMB, CEA, CIEP, NSC have separate budgets. OMB is getting those figures and we will give them out when we have them.

ENERGY PROGRAM: Senate passed an energy bill last night which the President is generally pleased with. He believes it is step forward toward alleviating the unemployment and other economic hardships that would come from expected shortages of natural gas this winter. President hopes the House will pass legislation promptly which he can consider.

CHINA TRIP: Kissinger will have to meet with the President before we will have any information on the President's trip.

CALIFORNIA: No change in the plan -- President will go to California next week. Not going to New Mexico. Don't know if or what other stops will be added to California trip.

TODAY'S SCHEDULE: President slept late this morning. Had breakfast this morning at 9:00. Dr. Lukash is encouraging him to take walks outside his office on the grounds. He had a meeting in the residence with Don Rumsfeld and then came to the office at 10:30. At 11:30, he taped a Veterans Day message. ABC pool network will distribute it. Will be for release at 6:00 PM Sunday night for morning papers. There will be a photo of the 1:45 PM Economic Meeting President called Sparky Anderson last night and reached him at a party for the team and also talked to Johnny Bench, Pete Rose and Joe Morgan. They talked for about 10 minutes. Dr. Robert Marston, President of the University of Florida was called day before yesterday by the President, expressing regret that his cold prevented him from coming. Schlesinger going instead.

MONDAY: President will lay the wreath on the tomb of the Unknown Soldier at at 9:00 AM on Monday. He will leave the South Grounds at 8:45 AM and will return to the White House at 9:20 AM. NEW YORK CITY: President's position has not changed. Justice Department and U.S. Attorney's Office in New York have responsibility and authority to investigate allegations by Sen. Buckley if they feel it is necessary. President is confident that the Attorney General will take appropriate action.

TAX CUT/WAYS & MEANS CMTE.: What the Democrats voted for was to reduce the size of the tax cut that the President wanted. President feels the tax cut is too small. President is convinced that the American people want a bigger tax cut, and that once the Members of Congress receive that assurance from their constituents, they will pass the tax cut. All Republicans and 4 Democrats voted for it.

HATCH ACT REVISION: As proposed in the House bill, the President is opposed to that bill. The original contention of the Hatch Act needs to be upheld, and it wouldn't be with the House revision.

TRAVEL: The only travel next week is the California trip. L.A. and S.F. San Francisco fund raiser is a luncheon speech on the 30th.

CHINA TRIP: The purpose of the trip is another step in following the process of the Shanghai communique in strengthening our relations with China. President will meet with Secy. Kissinger, who is returning this afternoon, at 9:30 tomorrow morning -- possibly this afternoon, but definitely at 9:30 a.m. tomorrow.

SADAT MEETING: Met in the Oval Office for 1 hour. Secretary Kissinger and Fahmi were both there. They discussed a number of agreements in the fields of cultural, health and P. L. 480 assistance which will be signed at 3:00 PM today at the State Department. (P. L. 480 will be 500,000 tons of wheat and 4,200 tons of tobacco to Egypt in 1976, totaling \$75 million.) U.S. views on Palestine are well known. U.N. resolution on Zionism did not come up in today's meeting or yesterday's meeting. (lengthy discussion about why the President's meeting with Sadat didn't include discussion on Zionism. RN said that the thrust of these meetings is directed toward continuing the momentum in the M. E. toward a permanent peace settlement and the bilateral relations between the two countries. The President's views are publicly known regarding Zionism.) Military assistance was discussed today.

LEBANON: Embassy has evacuated from the building its non essential personnel. In addition, the American Ambassador has suggested that dependents and non-essential government personnel leave Beirut. Secondly, the private Americans should leave Beirut. U.S. is following the events closely and we are coordinating with other governments in the area to determine what the U.S. can do to help. This situation was discussed by Sadat and Ford.

MIDDLE EAST AID: Package will go up this week. No specific date on it as yet.

CALIFORNIA TRIP: Baggage should be left in 87 EOB up to 10:30 AM tomorrow morning. Tentative departure of a press bus from the National Press Club will be 1:00 PM. Press plane will depart AAFB 1:45 PM.

NATIONAL PRESS CLUB SPEECH: President will deliver a speech tomorrow at 12:00 noon at the Press Club on New York City. Will have an advance text tomorrow morning. No Q's and A's afterward because the President will have to catch a plane.

FUTURE TRAVEL Sunday - November 2 - President will travel to Jacksonville, Fla. to meet with Sadat in two head to head meetings. Don't have any exact schedule yet. PACKARD RESIGNATION: Packard has indicated his desire to resign as Chairman of the Finance Committee, but wants to continue to be of assistance to the campaign. We can't release a copy of his letter because it has not as yet been responded to.

CHINA TRIP: No indication on the timing of the trip.

FAMILY OF MAN AWARD: Mrs. Ford will receive for the President in New York City on Friday.

JACKSONVILLE TRIP: President will depart South Lawn at 9:15 AM -- Depart AAFB at 9:35 AM -- President arrives Jacksonville Naval Air Station at 11:15 AM. He will go by boat (motor launch) to Epping Forest where Sadat is staying at the home of Roy Mason. There will be a 2 hour working luncheon at the residence. Will then go by motorcade to a nearby home which the President is borrowing for 1 1/2 hours of free time. He will have a TV interview during that period with a group of stations in Florida which will be for release on Monday night. Sadat then comes to the President's house for 1 1/2 hour head to head meeting beginning at 4:00 PM. President then has another 1 1/2 hours of free time before going to a dinner hosted by Gov. Askew at the San Jose Country Club. Dinner begins at 7:30 (1/2 hour reception) Actual dinner starts at 8:00 PM. Dinner concludes at 9:30 Sadat departs at 9:50. President Ford leaves immediately for an 18 minute drive back to the JNAS wher he will depart at 10:15, arriving at AAFB at 11:50 PM and arriving WH at 12:10 AM. There will be a toast by Gov. Askew at the dinner. No response by Sadat or Ford. Sadat will have another meeting here at the WH next week, possibly Wednesday with the President. Ther will be a press area at the San Jose Country Club and filing facilities will be somewhat limited. The main press area will be at the Deerwood Country Club where the President will be (near it anyway).
