Kissinger came back briefly to say that there will be a meeting with the 5 GIA oversight Congressmen tomorrow (Thursday) to discuss the GIA-Ghile affair, presumably to determine whether covert political operations should be continued. The five include Speaker Carl Albert, Sen. Mike Manafield, High Scott, Rep. Thomas O'Neill (D-Mass) and Rep. John J. Rhodes (R-Ariz.), the latter two respective party leaders in House.

On back-round only -- Dr. Klasinger said he was confident covert operations of Gills type could be defended on antional security grounds. An "overwhelming case" could be made that national security could be damaged if these operations were dropped (not in Chils but generally). Asked if this wash't endorsing policy of intervention in other countries, Klasinger said that was a philosophic question worth debating.

As the motorcade left heliped area, a few (maybe 30) folks standing along roadside applanded. Klasinger rode with President to UN. In front of building Ambassador Scali and UN protocol officer welcomed President (see Pible for details).

In UN electrical area, pundemonium took over. A security breakdown or breakup led to massive justling at elevators, screaming, pushing. Credenicals were laughable. Secret Service and UN security men showed none of the cooperation for which Ford appealed in his speech.

After his elevator stuck and he walked the last flight of stairs to the 12th floor of the U. S. mission, the Rxmxmdmmn spoke for about five minutes, paying tribute first to Mm U. N. ambassador John Scali, then Secretary Kissinger again. Of Scali, he said, "Je have in Ambassador Scali, the 14th ambassador, an outstanding representative of our gavernment government. I'm proud of him."

Of Kissinger, the President said, "We are lucky and fortunate to have Secretary Kissinger as our Secretary of State and the head of our National Security Council."

After leaving the building, the President stopped outside briefly to shake hands with construction workers on he the sidewalk in front of a construction site adjacent to the U.S. mission.

On return flight, the President talked with Secretary and Mrs. Kissinger, Sen. Stuart Symington and Counselor John Marsh.
