"To imply a connection between the question of the oil to tariff deferral legislation and the nomination of a STR is not accurate, and any mis aderatanding could do an injustice to the scale involved."

In elaborating, Hersen said the individual to be named STR has been selected but would not divulge same. Neither would be confirm or deny the AP story that the STR would be Secretary of Commerce Frederick Dent. But he did say AP erred in reporting that Willard Rockwell would replace Dent at Commerce. "I have not heard that name for that job," he said.

Nessen did concede that Long-as well as ranking Finance committee

Republican Carl Curtis, Momen claimed—had indeed opposed Silberman's
