## THE WHITE HOUSE

The President today announced his intention to nominate seven persons to be members of the National Science Board, National Science Foundation, for terms expiring May 10, 1982. They are:

Raymond L. Bisplinghoff, of Rolla, Missouri, Chancellor of the Missouri School of Mines. He succeeds Herbert E. Carter whose term has expired.

Lloyd Miller Cooke, of White Plains, New York, Director of Urban Affairs and University Relations, Union Carbide Corporation, New York, New York. This is a reappointment.

Herbert D. Doan, of Midland, Michigan, Director and President of Doan Associates. He succeeds Robert Charpie whose term has expired.

John R. Hogness, of Seattle, Washington, President of the University of Washington. He succeeds Roger W. Heyns, whose term has expired.

William F. Hueg, Jr., of St. Paul, Minnesota, Deputy Vice President and Dean, Institute of Agriculture, Forestry and Home Economics, University of Minnesota. He succeeds Frederick P. Thieme whose term has expired.

Marian E. Koshland, of Lafayette, California, Professor of Bacteriology and Immunology, University of California, Berkeley, California. She succeeds David M. Gates whose term has expired.

Alexander Rich, of Cambridge, Massachusetts, Professor of Biophysics, Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He succeeds Frank Press whose term has expired.

The National Science Board consists of the Director of the National Science Foundation, ex-officio, and twenty-four members appointed by the President.

The Chairman and the Vice Chairman are selected by the Board.
