Try to start your shift a half hour early. This will enable you to catch up on prior problems with the supervisor on duty and the nurse in charge.

Supplies needed should be reported to Terre Super. Only Jane Mantey and Terre Super are to order supplies through the Red Cross.

8:00 a.m. supervisor should advise the nursing home cook as early as possible, how many older children are on hand for meals that day. Meal schedule is: Breakfast 8:30 a.m.- Lunch 12:30 p.m., - Dinner 5:30 p.m.

Please emphsise cleanliness and neatness especially to volunteers who will care for children in "Isolation". All volunteers should clean up their rooms befor leaving their shift-including, hall, area outside their rooms. Remember no dirty bottles or utensils inside formula room.

8:00 am supervisor should make sure temeratures are taken of all the children.

Very small babies and children who haven't been eating regularly should be weighed and recorded daily.

Please stress that no one should remove I D. bracelets from the children's wrists or ankles.

If a child has to be admitted to the hospital, please be sure to advise Carol Westlake and Cheryl Markson immediately.

can inform the head nurse when the need arises. Because of the shortage of nurses, your services are very much needed to assist at times.

Do not hand out any medications! This can only be done by an RN or LPN.

ADMISSIONS

Once your are informed of incoming children, inform the Red Cross so they can pick the children up at the airport.

Before children come make sure a chart has been set up, a thermometer is ready and a place has been arranged for them.

When the child arrives have volunteers in room take child's temperature, weigh him or her, measure head circumferance(if a baby), and length or height. Also record all this on the green chart sheet and on wall sheet. Tape wall sheet to wall and give chart including all the children's papers to the Head Nurse.

DEPARTURES

Supervisors who have children departing during their shift should make sure volunteers wash and dress the departing children. Make sure the child has been fed if near meal time and fill and sack with needed extra bottles of formula. According to distance to travel and diapers if a baby. An extra change of clothes will be helpful also. The outside of the sack should be marked with the child's number and destination so it can easily be read.

The head nurse should have all the departing children's charts on the nurse's station counter ready to go with any needed notes, re: Medication, for the parents included. As the volunteers bring their departing children to the nurse's station they should remove the child's wall sheet. This will then be added to the child's chart.

Make sure children's numbers and names coincide with departing children's list.

A note must be left for Terre Super requading <u>all</u> discharges and admissions. Any room change or hospital admittances should also be recorded and left for Terre to bring up to date on the master list.

The nurses station has a census sheet. Please record room changes and other alterations so the nurses can find the kids for medications.

If the fire alarm goes off you will receive a call from Denver Burgler (534 5325) to verify if its a real emergency.



we operate.

The general headquarters of our nationwide, volunteer, non-profit, non-affiliated corporation is located in Denver. Under the guiding hand of the board and officers, we are divided into five areas of responsibility: (1) Life Support, (2) Public Relations and Fund Raising, (3) Adoptions, (4) Chapter Relations, and (5) Legal and Audit.

The officers area is the guiding hand, finance and the personnel office for Denver and Saigon. The phone (778-6144) is equipped with an inexpensive switching device which enables various people to act as "Secretary of the Day" from their homes. If calls are specific, they are referred to the officers or one of the five areas. 200-400 pieces of mail each week are answered by volunteer secretaries and every donor is sent a personal thank you.

Life Support has the monumental task of purchasing and/or shipping supplies (food, medicine, toys) to the many orphanages. They also coordinate

the Foster Orphanage Plan.

Public Relations and Fund Raising are the prospectors and image makers. The newsletter alone is a big job. We estimate the July newsletter took over 400 volunteer hours. Our printing is done by the Sioux Indians on the Pine Ridge Reservation at a fraction of the normal cost and a major advertising firm plans to help us raise funds.

The Adoption Agency also has a huge load to carry keeping our adoptions fair, equitable, and legal. Each week 250 hours are invested in helping

families and waiting children get together.

Chapter Relations has the formidable and unenviable task of making sure the right hand and the left hand work together. God bless them.

Legal and Audit insures compliance with all international, national,

state and corporate guidelines.

All this is an act of love and sharing. We ask no other thanks than knowing Rosemary's babies in her three, and soon to be five, homes and a medical facility and some children in the other orphanages are given a chance.

Write "G-350" in this blank. Return the card to INS with a \$3.00 fee.
