NO-FAULT INSURANCE

Committee on the Judiciary: Committee continued hearings on S. 354, to establish a nationwide motor vehicle accident insurance plan, and to require no-fault motor vehicle insurance as a condition precedent to operating a motor vehicle, receiving testimony from Lawrence T. Jones, who was accompanied by Robert Gilmore, Jr., and John Reid, all representing the American Insurance Association, New York City; Herman M. Rogers, representing the Pennsylvania State Bar Association; and Arthur H. Stoup, representing the Missouri State Bar Association.

Committee on Labor and Public Welfare: Subcommittee on the Handicapped concluded hearings on S. 2581, strengthening programs for assistance to the

Select Committee on Nutrition and Human Needs: Committee began hearings on proposals related to the implementation and continuation of federally funded supplemental food programs, receiving testimony today on the special supplemental food program for women, infants, and children from Senator Mathias; Dr. David Paige, Johns Hopkins University, School of Hygiene Public Health, Baltimore; Susan Tippet, Maryland Food Committee, who was accompanied by Carol Loomis, Department of Public Health, Annapolis; Mary Ann Mahaffey, Mayor's Committee on Hunger and Malnutrition, Detroit; William Clextan, Detroit Health Department; Dr. George Cunningham, California Department of Public Health; Jesse Gibson, Orange-Chatham Comprehensive Health Agency, North Carolina; Eleanor Josaitis, Charles Grenville and Father Charles Cunningham, all of Focus: HOPE, Detroit; and Dr. Raymond L. Standard, Director, Department of Public Health, District of Columbia Government.

House of Representatives

Chamber Action

Bills Introduced: 15 public bills, H.R. 11817-11831; 1 private bill, H.R. 11832; and 9 resolutions, H.J. Res. 845-850, and H. Res. 740-742, were introduced.

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Bills Reported: Reports were filed as follows:

S. 1529, to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to enter into agreements with non-Federal agencies for the replacement of the existing American Falls Dam, Minidoka project, Idaho, amended (H. Rept. 93-701);

H.R. 11088, emergency security assistance to Israel and Cambodia, amended (H. Rept. 93-702);

Conference report on S. 1435, to provide an elected Mayor and City Council for the District of Columbia (H. Rept. 93-703); and

H. Res. 742, providing for the consideration of H.R. 11088, emergency security assistance to Israel and Cambodia (H. Rept. 93-704).

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Job Training: House disagreed to the amendments of the Senate to the amendments of the House to S. 1559, to provide financial assistance to enable State and local governments to assume responsibilities for job training

and community services; and agreed to a conference asked by the Senate. Appointed as conferees: Representatives Perkins, Dent, Dominick V. Daniels, O'Hara, Meeds, Burton, Gaydos, Grasso, Badillo, Quie, Esch, Steiger of Wisconsin, Forsythe, Peyser, and Sarasin.

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Daylight Saving Time: House disagreed to the amendment of the Senate to H.R. 11324, to provide for daylight saving time on a year-round basis for a 2-year trial period, and to require the Federal Communications Commission to permit certain daytime broadcast stations to operate before local sunrise; and agreed to a conference asked by the Senate. Appointed as conferees: Representatives Staggers, Moss, Stuckey, Broyhill of North Carolina, and Ware.

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Vice-Presidential Nomination: By a yea-and-nay vote of 387 yeas to 25 nays, the House agreed to H. Res. 735, confirming the nomination of Gerald R. Ford, of the State of Michigan, to be Vice President of the United States.

H. Res. 738, the rule under which the resolution was considered, was agreed to earlier by a yea-and-nay vote of 389 yeas to 15 nays.

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
